HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS TO COMPLETE A COMPARATIVE STUDY OF ITS POLICIES ON YOUTH EMPLOYMENT AND FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR YOUTH EMPLOYMENT UNDER THE FAIR LABOR STANDARDS ACT AND EXAMINE POLICIES THAT WILL BROADEN WORK-BASED LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS.

1 WHEREAS, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations 2 maintains responsibility for the regulation and maintenance of 3 employment for minors under the age of eighteen pursuant to 4 chapter 390, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 5

6 WHEREAS, only fifty-one percent of Hawaii's public school 7 graduates from the class of 2021 went on to post-secondary 8 education in the first fall after graduation, leaving nearly 9 half of Hawaii's youth in need of post-secondary plans; and 10

WHEREAS, high school graduates with no post-secondary plans traditionally struggle to enjoy the same economic gains, quality of life, and general levels of success as high school graduates who enroll in and complete post-secondary education or certified post-secondary apprenticeship programs within four years of graduation from a secondary education institution; and

18 WHEREAS, only a small subset of Hawaii's youth have access 19 to fulfilling, hands-on work-based learning opportunities with 20 compensation; and

WHEREAS, positive work-based learning experiences have been shown to improve college-going rates and educational outcomes, particularly for at-risk and disadvantaged youth who are statistically less likely to make formal plans for careers or education after completing their secondary education; and



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WHEREAS, resources exist across the State for students to 1 participate in public and private work-based learning 2 opportunities; and 3 4 WHEREAS, there is a need for the Department of Labor and 5 Industrial Relations to implement systems that make work-based 6 learning more accessible to Hawaii's youth; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, the State has the responsibility to ensure that all of its policies and procedures are ready and waiting to meet 10 the needs of a high-leverage, statewide work-based learning 11 12 program for Hawaii's youth; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the State must continue to protect the safety and 15 well-being of its youth in any workplace; and 16 WHEREAS, the United States Department of Labor does not 17 require states to issue employment certificates or age 18 19 certifications for minors engaging in work; and 20 WHEREAS, thirty states do not require the issuance of an 21 employment certificate and age certification for a minor 22 23 engaging in work; and 24 WHEREAS, unlike those other states, Hawaii currently 25 requires an employment certificate and age certification for a 26 minor engaging in work; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, revisiting and studying Hawaii's current requirements are important to set a foundation for collective 30 31 action, public- and private-sector partnerships, and other means of promoting work-based learning opportunities and labor 32 standards that protect youth, provide students with an ample 33 choice of industries in which to gain experience, and ensure 34 streamlined processes that enable more employers to offer 35 36 experiences to students; now, therefore, 37 38 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 39 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 40 Labor and Industrial Relations is requested to complete a 41 comparative study of its policies on youth employment and 42 federal requirements for youth employment under the Fair Labor 43
