
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS TO PROVIDE AND PRODUCE UPDATED ACTUARIAL STUDIES REGARDING THE LIFESPAN PROBABILITIES OF SURVIVING DEPENDENT BENEFICIARIES FOR THE PURPOSE OF APPLYING HAWAII'S WORKERS' COMPENSATION LAW.

1	WHEREAS, the purpose of the workers' compensation law is to
2	compensate workers and their dependents fairly and equitably in
3	the event of work-related disability or death; and
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5	WHEREAS, chapter 386, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS)
6	establishes Hawaii's workers' compensation law; and
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8	WHEREAS, section 386-41, HRS, makes distinctions among
9	dependent surviving spouses, dependent surviving children,
10	dependent surviving parents, and dependent surviving
11	grandparents of deceased lawfully covered employees for purposes
12	of calculating various weekly benefit amounts; and
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14	WHEREAS, section 386-41, HRS, also makes a distinction
15	between wholly dependent and partially dependent parents for
16	purposes of calculating weekly benefit amounts; and
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18	WHEREAS, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations
19	is tasked with implementing chapter 386, HRS, including section
20	386-41 thereof; and
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22	WHEREAS, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations
23	customarily conducts an administrative hearing to determine in
24	certain cases whether a surviving beneficiary was wholly or
25	partially dependent on the deceased employee; and
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27	WHEREAS, according to its oral testimony before the Senate
28	Committee on Labor and Technology concerning Senate Bill
29	No. 1115 (2023) on February 15, 2023, the Department of Labor
30	and Industrial Relations asserted that it continues to base its



calculations for different generations of surviving 1 beneficiaries using an actuarial table created in 1963; and 2 3 WHEREAS, longevity and generational dependency trends may 4 well have changed significantly over the course of sixty years, 5 resulting in unreasonable and unfair distribution of benefits by 6 current parameters; now, therefore, 7 8 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 9 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 10 Session of 2023, the Senate concurring, that the Department of 11 Labor and Industrial Relations is requested to research current 12 actuarial data and population studies for the purpose of 13 creating updated materials for assessing appropriate benefit 14 amounts for dependent surviving spouses, dependent surviving 15 children, dependent surviving parents, and dependent surviving 16 grandparents, as well as establishing updated standards for 17 distinguishing wholly dependent beneficiaries from partially 18 19 dependent beneficiaries; and 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Labor and 21 Industrial Relations is requested to deliver to the President of 22 the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the 23 Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Labor and Technology, and 24 the Chairperson of the House Committee on Labor and Operations a 25 report summarizing the results of its research, along with 26 recommendations for revising the differing amounts of weekly 27 benefits to surviving beneficiaries based on relationship status 28 and degree of dependency, if any, and further suggest necessary 29 legislation for implementation of any necessary adjustments; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the requested report be 32 delivered to the aforementioned persons no later than thirty 33 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2024; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this 36 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of Labor 37 and Industrial Relations. 38 39 40 41 OFFERED BY:





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
