HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE HAWAII STATE CENTER FOR NURSING TO CONVENE A WORKING GROUP TO STUDY THE POTENTIAL IMPACTS TO THE STATE OF JOINING THE MULTI-STATE NURSE LICENSURE COMPACT.

1 WHEREAS, according to the federal Bureau of Labor 2 Statistics' Employment Projections 2021-2031, the registered nurse workforce is expected to grow from 3,130,600 registered 3 nurses in 2021 to 3,326,000 registered nurses in 2031, which is 4 an increase of 195,400 registered nurses or 6.2 percent; and 5 6 7 WHEREAS, the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics also projects the average annual number of openings for registered 8 nurses from 2021 through 2031, after factoring in retirements 9 10 and workforce exits, to be 203,200 openings per year; and 11 WHEREAS, according to the Hawaii State Center for Nursing, 12 13 there are 15,072 licensed registered nurses who live and practice in the State; and 14 15 WHEREAS, according to the Healthcare Association of 16 17 Hawaii's 2022 Healthcare Workforce Initiative Report, there were approximately 1,000 unfilled registered nurse positions in the 18 19 State; and 20 WHEREAS, during and following the emergence of the COVID-19 21 pandemic, hospitals, nursing facilities, and other health care 22 23 practices faced nursing shortages, which continue to exist; and 24 25 WHEREAS, shortages in the local nursing workforce require 26 health care facilities to recruit traveling nurses, which can be 27 costlier than hiring a local workforce; and 28 29 WHEREAS, the State and health care systems have invested and continue to invest in growing the local nursing and health 30 care professional workforce through expanded educational 31 opportunities, incentives, and other investments; and 32

1 2 WHEREAS, as of January 2023, there were 39 states that are 3 members of the multi-state Nurse Licensure Compact; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Nurse Licensure Compact would enable nurses to practice in person or provide telenursing services to patients 6 located across the country without having to obtain additional 7 8 licenses; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the Nurse Licensure Compact would allow a nurse to 11 work across state borders and provide vital services in the 12 event of disaster; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the Nurse Licensure Compact would also allow military spouse nurses to seamlessly continue working without 15 having to obtain new licenses each time they relocate, thus 16 expanding the nursing workforce; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, according to the Hawaii State Center for Nursing, 16 percent of registered nurses plan to retire in the next five 20 21 years; now, therefore, 22 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 23 24 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, that the Hawaii State Center for Nursing is 25 requested to convene a working group to study the potential 26 impacts to the State of joining the multi-state Nurse Licensure 27 28 Compact; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the working group is requested to consist of the following members: 31 32 33 (1)The Director of the Hawaii State Center for Nursing, 34 or the Director's designee, who shall serve as 35 chairperson of the working group; 36 37 (2)The Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, or the 38 Director's designee; 39 40 (3) A representative of the Regulated Industries 41 Complaints Office of the Department of Commerce and
