## HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING THE GOVERNOR TO INITIATE A CLEMENCY PROGRAM FOR INDIVIDUALS WHO HAVE BEEN PROSECUTED FOR CANNABIS-RELATED OFFENSES.

1 WHEREAS, the war on drugs has been found to be destructive and devasting to immigrant, indigenous, and low-income 2 individuals, families, and communities; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the same findings were made about the impact on 5 the war on drugs in Hawaii in the 2010 "The Disparate Treatment 6 of Native Hawaiians in the Criminal Justice System" report from 7 the Office of the Hawaiian Affairs; and 8 9 10 WHEREAS, mass incarceration is significantly worsened by 11 the war on drugs, which includes the criminalization of cannabis 12 possession; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the prosecution of cannabis offenses has deprived people of accessing higher education, housing, employment, 15 individual liberty, and the right to vote; and 16 17 WHEREAS, on October 6, 2022, President Biden pardoned six 18 19 thousand five hundred people convicted between 1992 and 2021 of 20 federal cannabis possession, as well as thousands more who were convicted of cannabis possession in the District of Columbia; 21 22 and 23 24 WHEREAS, President Biden also urged governors throughout the country to follow his lead and provide similar legal relief 25 26 for those who have entered the criminal justice system for cannabis convictions; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, as of January 2023, numerous states and the District of Columbia have decriminalized and legalized adult-use 30 31 recreational cannabis, including Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Maine, Maryland, 32



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1 Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, 2 Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, 3 4 Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia, and Washington; and 5 6 WHEREAS, in enacting programs to legalize adult-use 7 recreational cannabis, many of these states have instituted expungement or other forms of clemency and record clearance for 8 individuals who have been prosecuted for cannabis-related 9 10 offenses; and 11 12 WHEREAS, Illinois enacted the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act in 2019, which allowed the state to automatically grant 13 clemency to residents who were convicted for possessing up to 14 15 thirty grams of cannabis, and authorized a person to petition a 16 court to rescind the charges if they were convicted of 17 possessing between thirty and five hundred grams of cannabis; 18 and 19 WHEREAS, in 2019, New Hampshire enacted House Bill 399, 20 which provided an opportunity for those convicted of offenses 21 involving the possession of three-quarters of one ounce of 22 23 cannabis or less to petition the court to have their convictions 24 annulled: and 25 26 WHEREAS, Washington vacated misdemeanor cannabis convictions in 2019, and Delaware implemented a measure in 2017 27 28 that provided for automatic expungement of both conviction and 29 arrest records for those who were charged or convicted of 30 certain cannabis offenses prior to December 18, 2015; and 31 32 WHEREAS, in November of 2022, Governor Brown of Oregon announced her intent to pardon over forty-seven thousand 33 Oregonians with low-level cannabis convictions; and 34 35 WHEREAS, the Oregon pardon program will eliminate barriers 36 for thousands of people seeking employment, housing, and 37 38 educational opportunities who would have otherwise been 39 ineligible; and 40 WHEREAS, The Last Prisoner Project, a leading national 41 nonprofit organization dedicated to cannabis criminal justice 42





reform, has stated that the Governor has the legal authority to 1 undertake a targeted relief and clemency program for individuals 2 in Hawaii who have been prosecuted for cannabis-related 3 offenses; and 4 5 WHEREAS, The Last Prisoner Project and Hawaii Innocence 6 Project are prepared to assist the Governor and Attorney General 7 in facilitating a clemency program for people who have been 8 9 prosecuted for cannabis related offenses; now, therefore, 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 11 12 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, that the Governor is urged to initiate a 13 clemency program for individuals who have been prosecuted for 14 15 cannabis-related offenses; and 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor is urged to seek 17 18 the assistance of The Last Prisoner Project and Hawaii Innocence Project in implementing a clemency program for individuals who 19 20 have been prosecuted for cannabis-related offenses; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 23 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Attorney General, 24 Director of Public Safety, Executive Director of The Last Prisoner Project, and Co-Directors of the Hawaii Innocence 25 Project. 26 27 28 29

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
