A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the department of 2 transportation manages and spends more taxpayer dollars than 3 nearly any other state agency. Most departments of 4 transportation throughout the country have robust mechanisms to 5 ensure funds are best spent, including publicly transparent 6 processes to evaluate, select, and track projects; oversight 7 commissions of expert stakeholders to independently monitor, evaluate, and provide guidance to the department and 8 9 policymakers; and regular robust reporting that meaningfully 10 measures and assesses overall progress toward public policy 11 goals.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to amend the composition and duties of the state highway safety council to make the council an independently led group of expert stakeholders that may review the department of transportation's efforts to ensure transparency and provide guidance to the

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department and legislature to help achieve state transportation 1 2 goals and outcomes. 3 SECTION 2. Section 286-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows: 4 5 "§286-5 State highway safety council. (a) There is 6 established the Hawaii highway safety council. [The-director of 7 transportation shall serve as its chairperson.] The council 8 shall be chaired on an annually rotating basis by a member 9 appointed by the president of the senate and a member appointed 10 by the speaker of the house of representatives. In addition to 11 the member appointed by the president of the senate and member 12 appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, the 13 following or their designated representatives shall be members 14 of the council: the chief justice, the attorney general, the 15 director of health, the superintendent of education, the 16 chairperson of the state public charter school commission, the 17 executive director of the state public charter school 18 commission, the president of the University of Hawaii, the 19 chairperson of the University of Hawaii at Manoa department of 20 urban and regional planning, the co-chairpersons of the Hawaii 21 climate change mitigation and adaptation commission, the

2	the chief energy officer of the Hawaii state energy office, the		
3	chairperson of each of the county highway safety councils		
4	established under section 286-6, and [not] no more than [twenty]		
5	<u>twelve</u> other persons who shall be appointed by the governor <u>for</u>		
6	a three-y	ear term as follows:	
7	(1)	One member from an organization representing senior	
8		citizens;	
9	(2)	One member from an organization representing	
10		bicyclists;	
11	(3)	One member from an organization having a focus on	
12		micro-mobility;	
13	(4)	One member from an organization having a focus on	
14		transportation, planning, and improvement;	
15	(5)	One member from an organization having a focus on	
16		reducing the cost of transportation for low-income	
17		communities;	
18	(6)	One member from an organization representing labor and	
19		construction;	
20	(7)	One member from an organization representing trucking	
21		and cargo carriers;	



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1	(8)	One member from an organization having a focus on the
2	•	electrification of transportation;
3	(9)	One member from an organization having a focus on
4		expanding trees and foliage and reducing urban heat;
5	(10)	One member from an organization representing the
6		automobile manufacturing industry; and
7	(11)	Up to two members on the basis of their interest in
8		[highway] transportation safety[-] and related state
9		goals.
10	<u>(b)</u>	The state highway safety council shall [advise]:
11	<u>(1)</u>	Review programs, projects, plans, and strategies
12		related to improving safety in ground transportation
13		in the department of transportation;
14	(2)	Ensure transparency and oversight in programs,
15		projects, decisions, and spending related to ground
16		transportation in the department of transportation;
17	(3)	Establish metrics and benchmarks for the department of
18		transportation to ensure progress on state goals
19		related to ground transportation, safety, and other
20		related goals;

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1	(4)	Review projects in development and make
2		recommendations for how each project might be
3		improved, if warranted, to better meet state goals,
4		before project plans and designs are finalized;
5	(5)	Provide direction to the department of transportation
6		and make recommendations to the legislature as
7		necessary to ensure progress on state goals related to
8		ground transportation, safety, and other related
9		goals;
10	(6)	Advise the governor, legislature, and public on
11		matters relating to the programs [and], activities,
12		projects, outcomes, and recommendations of the State
13		in the field of [highway] transportation safety[-];
14		and
15	(7)	Submit an annual report to the department of
16		transportation that reflects the work,
17		responsibilities, and recommendations of the council.
18	<u>(c)</u>	The members of the council shall serve without pay but
19	shall be	entitled to reimbursement for necessary expenses while
20	attending	meetings and while in discharge of their duties."

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SECTION 3. Members of the state highway safety council who 1 are appointed and serving on the council before the effective 2 date of this Act shall continue to serve any remaining time left 3 4 in their terms; provided that their respective expertise aligns 5 with the council membership requirements pursuant to this Act. 6 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 8 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.
