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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HOSPITAL SUSTAINABILITY PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the hospital 2 sustainability program established in 2012 has served a critical role in strengthening Hawaii's health care system. In the 3 eleven years since the program's inception, the hospital 4 5 sustainability program has helped acute care facilities treat 6 the State's most vulnerable patients, especially low-income individuals requiring hospital services. The program has been 7 8 carried out in a public-private partnership to ensure patients 9 in Hawaii have access to quality, affordable care.

10 The legislature further finds that, even with the program, 11 hospitals in the State face major financial challenges. These 12 challenges are due in part to the continuing health and 13 financial pressures related to the coronavirus disease 2019 14 pandemic and health care workforce shortage. The federal and 15 state governments jointly finance medicaid by statutory formula. 16 The federal government pays between fifty per cent and 17 seventy-four per cent, with a state's per capita income

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determining the percentage. States with lower per capita
 incomes relative to the national average receive higher federal
 matching rates. Federal rules mandate that a state must pay the
 state's share from public funds that are not federal funds.

5 The legislature further finds that provider fees exist in forty-nine states and the District of Columbia as a means of 6 drawing down federal funds to sustain medicaid programs amid 7 8 rising state budget deficits, increasing health care costs, and 9 expanding medicaid enrollment. Provider fees, which are 10 collected from and agreed to by specific categories of 11 providers, may be imposed on nineteen different classes of 12 health care services, including inpatient and outpatient hospital and nursing facility services. Public funding to help 13 14 financially sustain Hawaii's hospitals should continue by 15 assessing a provider fee through the hospital sustainability 16 program, which is currently scheduled to be repealed in 2024.

17 The legislature therefore finds that, in Hawaii, a provider 18 fee for hospitals has resulted in a substantial increase in 19 medicaid payments without placing additional constraints on the 20 State's budget. The additional federal funds obtained via the 21 hospital sustainability program allow hospitals in the State to

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1	continue	to serve uninsured or underinsured patients in a timely
2	and effec	tive manner, thereby maintaining access to care for
3	medicaid	recipients, and helping to ensure the overall
4	sustainab	oility of the health care system in Hawaii.
5	The	purpose of this Act is to preserve access to health
6	care for	medicaid recipients and strengthen the hospital
7	sustainab	ility program by:
8	(1)	Amending the definition of "private hospital";
9	(2)	Clarifying the uses of the hospital sustainability
10		program special fund;
11	(3)	Increasing the hospital sustainability fee cap for
12		various facilities;
13	(4)	Requiring the department of human services to consult
14		and negotiate with the hospital trade association in
15		the State regarding hospital sustainability fee
16		participation and rates;
17	(5)	Clarifying the circumstances under which the hospital
18		sustainability fee shall be discontinued and the
19		distribution of remaining funds;
20	(6)	Repealing the sunset dates of Act 217, Session Laws of
21		Hawaii 2012, and Act 123, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014,

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1 thereby making the hospital sustainability program 2 permanent and permanently exempting the hospital 3 sustainability program from the central service and 4 administrative expenses assessments; and 5 (7) Appropriating funds out of the hospital sustainability 6 program special fund. 7 SECTION 2. Section 346G-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended to read as follows: 9 "[+]\$346G-2[+] Findings and declaration of necessity. It 10 is the intent of the legislature to establish a special fund 11 within the state treasury to receive revenue from the imposition 12 of a hospital sustainability fee to be administered by the 13 department of human services, which shall use the revenue from 14 the fee and associated federal medicaid matching funds 15 exclusively to make [direct] payments to hospitals and for other 16 purposes as [set forth] described in this chapter." 17 SECTION 3. Section 346G-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by amending the definition of "private hospital" to read 19 as follows: 20 ""Private hospital" means all currently operating 21 hospitals, except for hospitals that are:

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1 SECTION 5. Section 346G-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsections (c) and (d) to read as follows: 3 The hospital sustainability fee for inpatient care "(c) 4 services may differ from the fee for outpatient care services 5 but the fees charged to the hospital shall not in the aggregate 6 exceed [five and one-half] six per cent of the hospital's net patient service revenue. The inpatient hospital sustainability 7 fee shall not exceed [five and one-half] six per cent of net 8 9 inpatient hospital service revenue. The outpatient hospital 10 sustainability fee shall not exceed [five and one-half] six per 11 cent of net outpatient hospital service revenue. Each fee shall 12 be the same percentage for all affected hospitals, subject to 13 subsection (d).

14 (d) The department shall exempt federal hospitals and 15 public hospitals from the hospital sustainability fees on 16 inpatient services and outpatient care services.

17 Children's hospitals, psychiatric hospitals, and 18 rehabilitation hospitals may be assessed hospital sustainability 19 fees on inpatient and outpatient services at a different rate 20 than other private hospitals. The department [may also exclude 21 any facility from the hospital sustainability fee if it is

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1	determined that its exclusion is required to meet federal
2	standards of approval.], upon good faith consultation and
3	negotiations with the hospital trade association located in the
4	State, may modify, add to, or exclude facilities included in the
5	assessment if necessary to obtain or maintain approval of the
6	waiver by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, if the
7	modification, addition, or exclusion is consistent with the
8	purposes of this chapter."
9	SECTION 6. Section 346G-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended to read as follows:
11	"§346G-6 Hospital sustainability fee assessments. (a)
12	Hospitals shall pay the hospital sustainability fee to the
13	department in accordance with this chapter. [The fee shall be
14	divided and paid in twelve equal installments on a monthly
15	basis.]
16	(b) The department shall determine, upon good faith
17	consultation and negotiations with the hospital trade
18	association located in the State, the prospective fee rate for
19	the applicable fiscal year.
20	[(b)] <u>(c)</u> The department shall [collect, and each hospital
21	shall pay, if so required,] impose the hospital sustainability

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fee on a monthly basis. The hospital shall pay the hospital 1 2 sustainability fee [no later than the sixtieth day] within sixty 3 days after the end of [each] the calendar month[+] that the 4 department imposed the fee; provided that if required federal 5 approvals have not been secured by the end of a calendar month, the fees for that month shall be paid within ten days after 6 7 notification to the hospitals that the required approvals have 8 been received."

9 SECTION 7. Section 346G-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10 amended to read as follows:

II "[+]\$346G-7[+] Federal approval. The department shall
seek waivers and any additional approvals from the Centers for
Medicare and Medicaid Services that may be necessary to
implement the hospital sustainability program[-;], including
approval of the contracts between the State and medicaid managed
care health plans."

17 SECTION 8. Section 346G-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

19 "(a) If a hospital fails to pay the full amount of any
20 hospital sustainability fee when due, there shall be added to
21 the fee, unless waived by the department for reasonable cause, a

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1 penalty equal to [prime plus] two per cent of the fee that was 2 not paid when due. Any subsequent payments shall be credited 3 first to unpaid fee amounts beginning with the most delinquent 4 installment rather than to penalty or interest amounts."

5 SECTION 9. Section 346G-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
6 amended by amending its title and subsections (a) and (b) to
7 read as follows:

8 "\$346G-10 Private hospital payments through enhanced
9 [rates] payments to medicaid managed care health plans. (a)
10 The department shall use moneys [solely] from the hospital
11 sustainability program special fund solely to fulfill the
12 requirements of section 346G-4(c).

(b) In accordance with title 42 Code of Federal Regulations part 438, the department shall use revenues from the hospital sustainability fee and federal matching funds to enhance [the capitated rates paid] payments to medicaid managed care health plans [for the period of July 1 through December 31, 2021, and calendar years 2022 and 2023], consistent with the following objectives:

20 (1) The [rate-enhancement] enhanced payments shall be used
 21 exclusively [for increasing] to increase

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1 reimbursements to private hospitals, [to] support the availability of services, and [to] ensure access to 2 3 care [to the] for medicaid managed care health plan 4 enrollees; 5 (2) The [rate enhancement] enhanced payments shall be 6 [made-part of the monthly capitated rates] paid by the 7 department to medicaid managed care health plans, which shall provide documentation to the department 8 9 and the hospital trade association located in [Hawaii] 10 the State certifying that the revenues received under 11 paragraph (1) are used in accordance with this 12 section; 13 The [rate enhancement] enhanced payment rates shall be (3) 14 actuarially sound and approved by the federal 15 government for federal fund participation; 16 (4) The rate enhancements shall be retroactive to July 1, 17 2012, or the effective date approved by the federal 18 government, whichever is later. Retroactive rate 19 enhancements shall be paid within thirty days of notification by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid 20

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1		services provided to medicaid patients, with the
2		intent to use the sustainability funds to supplant the
3		planned or permanent reduction in reimbursement rates;
4	(3)	The department or any other state agency uses the
5		money in the hospital sustainability program special
6		fund for any use other than the uses permitted by this
7		chapter; or
8	(4)	Federal financial participation to match the revenue
9		from the hospital sustainability fee becomes
10		unavailable under federal law; provided that the
11		department shall terminate the imposition of the
12		hospital sustainability fee beginning on the date the
13		federal statutory, regulatory, or interpretive change
14		takes effect.
15	(b)	If [collection of] the hospital sustainability fee is
16	discontin	ued [as provided in this section], any remaining moneys
17	in the ho	spital sustainability program special fund shall be
18	distribut	ed [pursuant to section 3466-4(c).] to hospitals within
19	six month:	s of the date of discontinuation in the same
20	proportion	ns as received from the hospitals."

There is appropriated out of the hospital sustainability program special fund the sum of \$ 11 or so 12 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 13 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the purposes of the hospital sustainability 14 15 program. 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 17 of human services for the purposes of this Act. 18 SECTION 14. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 19 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 20 SECTION 15. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.
