## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE OFFICE OF PLANNING AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT, AMONG OTHER EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENTS, TO IMPLEMENT THE UNITED NATIONS COMMITTEE ON THE ELIMINATION OF RACIAL DISCRIMINATION'S RECOMMENDATIONS.

WHEREAS, the United Nations (UN) created the International 1 Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial 2 Discrimination, which was adopted in December 1965 by UN General 3 Assembly 2016 and entered into force in January 1969; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the UN Charter is centered on the principles of 6 dignity and equality inherent in all human beings and all 7 citizens of the world, and committed to promoting and 8 encouraging universal respect for and observance of human rights 9 and fundamental freedoms for all; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights 12 proclaims that all human beings are born free and equal in 13 dignity and rights, and everyone is entitled to all the rights 14 and freedoms set out therein, without distinction of any kind, 15 in particular as to race, color, or national origin; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, the UN has condemned colonization in all its forms and all practices of apartheid, segregation, and discrimination, 19 as enshrined in multiple declarations from the Declaration on 20 the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples 21 and the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples; and 22 23 WHEREAS, the term "racial discrimination" means any 24 25 distinction, exclusion, restriction, or preference based on race, color, descent, or national or ethnic origin that has the 26 purpose or effect of nullifying or impairing the recognition, 27 enjoyment, or exercise, on an equal footing, of human rights and 28 fundamental freedoms in the political, economic, social, 29 30 cultural, or any other field of public life; and 31



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WHEREAS, states should adopt immediate and effective 1 measures, particularly in the fields of teaching, education, 2 culture, and information, with a view to combating prejudices 3 that lead to racial discrimination and to promoting 4 understanding, tolerance, and friendship among nations and 5 6 racial or ethnical groups, as well as to propagating the purposes and principles of the Charter of the United Nations, 7 the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, and the United 8 Nations Declaration on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial 9 Discrimination; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the United States appeared at the UN Committee on 12 the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (CERD) 107th Session on 13 14 August 11 and 12 at Palais des Nations in Geneva, Switzerland; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, the eighteen expert members of the UN CERD adopted dozens of recommendations based on the six-hour interaction 18 19 between the United States government and CERD rooted on discussions with directly impacted peoples and civil society 20 representatives; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, the CERD members selected three specific recommendations around human rights for the United States 24 25 government to report on at the 110th Session, which were centered around indigenous peoples, migrations, and reproductive 26 rights; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, the realization of the recommendations will 30 improve and produce a positive impact in Hawai'i and the United 31 States; and 32 WHEREAS, Hawai'i should update and undertake new creative 33 curriculum around human rights and justice; and 34 35 WHEREAS, Hawai'i is an island state with a multicultural 36 37 population from around the world that recognizes the ancestral wisdom of cherishing the natural environment; and 38 39 WHEREAS, Hawai'i was considered as a potential host site for 40 the UN headquarters to serve as a global diplomatic hub; and 41 42

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WHEREAS, Hawai'i recently hosted its 18th annual Human 1 2 Rights Day to illuminate important and imminent issues at the international and island levels and review all recommendations 3 ranging from the UN human rights mechanisms and global 4 5 environmental and climate agreements; and 6 7 WHEREAS, Hawai'i was designed as America's first human 8 rights state by House Resolution No. 194, which was adopted by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-seventh Legislature 9 of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2014; and 10 11 12 WHEREAS, Hawai'i was the first state to conduct a voluntary local review at the UN and will conduct its historic second 13 voluntary local review at the UN's High-level Political Forum on 14 15 Sustainable Development and Sustainable Development Goals Summit at UN headquarters in New York and share its local strategies 16 regarding the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals through the 17 18 Aloha+ Challenge; and 19 20 WHEREAS, civil society, nonprofit associations, and non-21 governmental organizations can generate solutions and share 22 strategies providing concise, complete contributions to realize human rights in Hawai'i and Moananuiākea; and 23 24 WHEREAS, Hawai'i maintains momentum in cultivating a culture 25 of human rights, rule of law, sustainable development, and 26 global justice, partnering with city and county councils, as 27 well as leadership from state agencies and elected public 28 officials, to maintain the human rights movement in Hawai'i; now, 29 30 therefore, 31 32 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the 33 House of Representatives concurring, that the Office of Planning 34 and Sustainable Development, among other executive departments, 35 is requested to implement the recommendations of the United 36 Nations Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination; 37 38 and 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 40 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the President of the 41



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United States; Vice President of the United States; Speaker of 1 the United States House of Representatives; Majority Leader of 2 the United States Senate; United States Department of State, 3 Social Presidential Envoy for Climate; United Nations' Secretary 4 General; United Nations' High Commissioner for Human Rights; 5 Hawai'i's congressional delegation; Governor; and Director of the 6 Office of Planning and Sustainable Development. 7 8 9
