## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

## REQUESTING THE AUDITOR TO ASSESS THE SOCIAL AND FINANCIAL EFFECTS OF MANDATING HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR AMBULANCE AND COMMUNITY PARAMEDICINE SERVICES.

WHEREAS, a substantial number of transfers to a hospital 1 provided by an emergency medical services ambulatory service are 2 for health conditions that are not considered to be an 3 emergency, which can result not only in wasted health care 4 resources but can also potentially prevent the delivery of life-5 saving services to other individuals who may truly be 6 experiencing a life-threatening emergency; and 7 8 WHEREAS, community paramedicine is a model of community-9 10 based health care in which paramedics function outside their customary emergency response and transport roles in ways that 11 facilitate more appropriate use of emergency care resources; and 12 13 WHEREAS, an important advantage of community paramedicine 14 is the ability to treat patients at home without transport to a 15 hospital or clinic, which enhances access to primary care and 16 support services, especially for medically underserved areas; 17 18 and 19 WHEREAS, community paramedicine services can also improve 20 access to preventative care, help triage patients, and alleviate 21 the overburdened hospital and emergency departments, which in 22 turn can help decrease health care costs; and 23 24 WHEREAS, reimbursement for community paramedicine services 25 is essential to the Community Paramedicine Program's 26 sustainability; and 27 28 WHEREAS, section 23-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, requires 29 that "[b] efore any legislative measure that mandates health 30 insurance coverage for specific health services, specific 31 diseases, or certain providers of health care services as part 32



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of individual or group health insurance policies, can be 1 considered, there shall be concurrent resolutions passed 2 requesting the auditor to prepare and submit to the legislature 3 a report that assesses both the social and financial effects of 4 the proposed mandated coverage"; and 5 6 7 WHEREAS, section 23-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, further provides that "[t]he concurrent resolutions shall designate a 8 9 specific legislative bill that: 10 11 (1)Has been introduced in the legislature; and 12 (2) Includes, at a minimum, information identifying the: 13 14 15 (A) Specific health service, disease, or provider that would be covered; 16 17 18 (B) Extent of the coverage; 19 (C) Target groups that would be covered; 20 21 22 (D) Limitations on utilization, if any; and 23 (E) Standards of care. 24 25 26 For purposes of this part, mandated health insurance coverage shall not include mandated optionals."; and 27 28 29 WHEREAS, section 23-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, further specifies the minimum information required for assessing the 30 social and financial impact of the proposed health coverage 31 32 mandate in the State Auditor's report; and 33 34 WHEREAS, S.B. No. , introduced in the Regular Session 35 of 2023, would mandate insurance coverage for ambulance services 36 and community paramedicine services rendered statewide by emergency medical technicians or paramedics; now, therefore, 37 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 40 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Auditor is 41 42 requested to conduct an impact assessment report in accordance



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with sections 23-51 and 23-52, Hawaii Revised Statutes, of 1 mandating health insurance coverage for ambulance services and 2 community paramedicine services rendered statewide by emergency 3 medical technicians or paramedics as proposed by Senate Bill 4 , Regular Session of 2023; and 5 No. 6 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is further 7 requested to include in its assessment the impact of section 8 1311(d)(3) of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care 9 Act (PPACA) on Senate Bill No. , or similar legislation, 10 11 that includes but is not limited to the additional cost of any benefits beyond the essential health benefits of Hawaii's 12 qualified health plans under the PPACA; and 13 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is also requested to determine how many qualified health plans are available in 16 Hawaii, including plans offered by health maintenance 17 organizations; the individual or group enrollment in these 18 19 plans; and the actuarial cost of the defrayment to the State for ambulance services and community paramedicine services; and 20 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Auditor is requested to submit a report on the Auditor's findings and recommendations, 23 including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later 24 25 than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2024; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 28 29 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Auditor and 30 Insurance Commissioner, who is requested to transmit copies to each insurer in the State that issues health insurance policies. 31 32 OFFERED BY: 33 34

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
