## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO REVIEW VARIOUS PROGRAMS AND SUBJECT MATTER AREAS FOR IMPLEMENTATION IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

WHEREAS, the Board of Education has a constitutional 1 mandate to formulate statewide educational policy over the 2 3 public school system set forth by Article X, Section 3, of the Hawaii State Constitution; and 4 5 WHEREAS, providing Hawaii's keiki with high quality 6 educational experiences is of paramount importance to ensuring 7 success for Hawaii's future generations; and 8 9 WHEREAS, reliable transportation promotes school attendance 10 and ensures all keiki have access to high quality education 11 across the State; and 12 13 WHEREAS, reliable transportation methods such as bicycles 14 provide numerous benefits, including physical exercise, fewer 15 financial expenses, greater flexibility than public 16 transportation, and no carbon dioxide emissions; and 17 18 WHEREAS, Act 306, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, authorizes 19 the Department of Transportation to issue rebates for electric 20 bicycles and electric mopeds for individuals who are eighteen 21 22 years or older; and 23 WHEREAS, teenagers in high school would particularly 24 benefit from subsidized bicycles as students must commute 25 between home and school, may work part-time jobs, and often lack 26 the financial resources to purchase a motor vehicle or other 27 modes of transportation; and 28 29 WHEREAS, providing subsidized bicycles through a bicycle 30 grant program would alleviate low attendance rates and chronic 31 32 tardiness, and allow students to spend more time in the classroom learning; and 33



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1 WHEREAS, civic education helps develop critical thinking 2 skills that are vital to the functioning of a democratic nation, 3 including how to recognize social problems, evaluate possible 4 solutions, separate evidence-based claims from opinions, and 5 6 taking action; and 7 WHEREAS, in 2018, the Board of Education adopted the Hawaii 8 Core Standards in social studies, which outline content, 9 concepts, and inquiry skills students need to reason, wonder, 10 and think about the vastness and richness of the human 11 condition; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, the Hawaii Core Standards in social studies also 15 integrate and encompass the democratic values, civility, and 16 global perspective needed to support the development of critical 17 thinking and habits of mind that are the hallmark of a mature, community-minded citizen; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, the proliferation of disinformation, misinformation, digital discrimination, and online hate speech 21 22 have become larger, pervasive threats to modern society; and 23 24 WHEREAS, disinformation and online hate speech have been 25 linked to outbursts of violence in the real world; and 26 27 WHEREAS, engaging students in the pursuit of active and informed citizenship will connect students to the world through 28 29 informed instructional experiences that are led by teachers who 30 are committed to active civic participation; and 31 32 WHEREAS, implementing civic education and media literacy 33 programs teaches students to not only acquire knowledge but develop the skills to engage in the workings of a democracy and 34 practice of democratic citizenship while also being cognizant of 35 the danger of disinformation, misinformation, digital 36 37 discrimination, and online hate speech; and 38 39 WHEREAS, financial education is a lifelong learning process 40 that empowers individuals to plan for their futures; and 41

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WHEREAS, historically, the education system has assumed 1 that students learn important financial skills from their 2 3 families; and 4 WHEREAS, not all students are being taught the financial 5 skills they will need to be successful later in life; and 6 7 WHEREAS, the lack of financial literacy poses a significant 8 barrier for individuals seeking to achieve financial prosperity 9 and stability, especially for younger individuals who are 10 preparing to become heads of households, investors, 11 entrepreneurs, business leaders, and responsible citizens; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, the creation of a financial literacy curriculum would not only prepare Hawaii's keiki in economic and financial 15 matters, but would also promote the development of fiscal 16 responsibility and financial management skills; and 17 18 WHEREAS, sign language is a powerful communication tool for 19 those with hearing or speech disorders, autism spectrum 20 disorders, dyslexia, specific language impairments, Down 21 22 Syndrome, and other disabilities; and 23 WHEREAS, American Sign Language, or ASL, is a vital part of 24 the linguistic heritage of the State that benefits and enriches 25 hearing-impaired and non-hearing-impaired individuals; and 26 27 WHEREAS, Act 152, Session Laws of Hawaii 2016, recognizes 28 29 American Sign Language as a world language for public school language requirement purposes; and 30 31 WHEREAS, while fluency in American Sign Language is a 32 marketable skill, the lack of American Sign Language courses in 33 Hawaii public schools makes it difficult to meet the needs of 34 hearing-impaired students in their studies and educate students 35 who are interested in studying American Sign Language; and 36 37 WHEREAS, public school students with deaf siblings or other 38 family members would also benefit from the opportunity to 39 acquire American Sign Language skills in an educational setting, 40 41 as it would improve their ability to communicate with deaf family members; and 42

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1 2 WHEREAS, developing additional programs in American Sign Language will create accessible education for all students in 3 the public school system; and 4 5 WHEREAS, creating programs within public education that go 6 7 beyond traditional academic subjects will prepare Hawaii's keiki to become well-rounded citizens while also preparing them to 8 accomplish future academic, career, and life goals; now, 9 therefore, 10 11 12 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the 13 House of Representatives concurring, that the Board of Education 14 15 is requested to review various subject matter areas for consideration in public school curriculum; and 16 17 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, specifically, the Board of Education is requested to consider the following programs and 19 curriculum for implementation in public schools: 20 21 22 (1)Bicycle grants; 23 (2) Media literacy; 24 25 26 (3) Civic education; 27 (4) Financial literacy; and 28 29 30 (5) American Sign Language; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the 33 34 Board of Education and Superintendent of Education. 35 36 37 OFFERED BY: Michelle A.
