SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH'S SOLID WASTE SECTION TO DEVELOP A PLAN OF INITIATIVES FOR IMPROVED WASTE DIVERSION BY WORKING WITH THE COUNTIES TO ADDRESS EACH COUNTY'S UNIQUE NEEDS ACCORDING TO ITS GEOGRAPHY, POPULATION, AND INDUSTRY MAKE-UP.

WHEREAS, the Hawaii 2050 Sustainability Plan defines 1 sustainability as meeting the needs of the present without 2 compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own 3 needs; striking a balance between economic, social and 4 5 community, and environmental priorities; and respecting the culture, character, beauty, and history of the State's island 6 7 communities; and 8 9 WHEREAS, Act 324, Session Laws of Hawaii 1991, was enacted 10 in 1991 to establish the landfill waste diversion goal of twenty-five percent by 1995 and fifty percent by 2000; and 11 12 WHEREAS, in 2020, the United States Environmental 13 14 Protection Agency set its national landfill waste diversion goal to be fifty percent by 2030; and 15 16 WHEREAS, from 2018 to 2022, the State's average waste 17 diversion rate was 24.8 percent, more than half the waste 18 19 diversion goal set in 1991; and 20 WHEREAS, from 2018 to 2022, the State's average waste 21 diversion rate, in addition to the incineration rate, was 54.3 22 23 percent, meeting the State's and United States Environmental Protection Agency's diversion goals of fifty percent by 2000 and 24 2030, respectively; and 25 26

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WHEREAS, with current infrastructure, facilities, and 1 deployed technology, the State would not be able to meet its 2 3 landfill diversion goals without the use of incineration; and 4 5 WHEREAS, incineration, or the use of waste-to-energy 6 technology, is a promising strategy for reducing the State's solid waste from landfills, while extracting energy and valuable 7 8 materials for recycling; and 9 10 WHEREAS, each county's solid waste management agency has autonomy within its county to negotiate, collect, recycle, 11 reuse, or dispose of waste within the county in a manner that 12 13 reflects that county's unique needs; and 14 15 WHEREAS, part III of chapter 342G, Hawaii Revised Statutes, authorizes each county to develop county integrated solid waste 16 management plans and requires that these plans be submitted for 17 public review and comment and state review; and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, these county waste management plans are guidelines that offer direction and an implementation plan but do not 21 penalize or enforce losses if a county fails to meet the goals; 22 23 and 24 25 WHEREAS, the State's current role in this process is to 26 integrate the counties' goals and provide a framework for what 27 counties should accomplish, as well as to recognize challenges that each county faces; and 28 29 30 WHEREAS, many of the counties' waste management plans 31 incorporate existing county documents, such as Hawaii County's 32 Zero Waste Plan and Maui County's Recycling Initiative, and 33 these existing plans may be reviewed and incorporated statewide 34 based on feasibility; and 35 36 WHEREAS, given the public's support, the State's 37 initiatives may be more effective if each county's goals are incorporated into combined goals for all levels of government; 38 39 now, therefore, 40 41 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 42 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the

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1 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of Health's Solid Waste Section is requested to develop a plan of 2 initiatives for improved waste diversion by working with the 3 counties to address each county's unique needs according to its 4 5 geography, population, and industry make-up; and 6 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Health's 8 Solid Waste Section is requested to: 9 10 (1)Evaluate the viability, particularly the economies of 11 scale, of shipping waste from multiple counties to be 12 recycled or incinerated in another county, given 13 current county infrastructure, facilities, and deployed technology; 14 15 (2) Evaluate the viability of shipping waste from multiple 16 counties to be recycled or incinerated in another 17 county with the development of additional 18 infrastructure and facilities, which are appropriately 19 20 zoned by the State, through a public-private 21 partnership or otherwise; 22 23 (3) Estimate the statewide legacy landfill capacity if an 24 inter-county recycling and incineration program were 25 to be established with and without any additional 26 state infrastructure and facilities; and 27 28 (4) Submit a preliminary report of its findings and 29 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to 31 the convening of the Regular Session of 2024 and a 32 final report no later than thirty days prior to the 33 convening of the Regular Session of 2025; and 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; Director 36 37 of Health; Director of Business, Economic Development, and 38 Tourism; Mayor of each county; Director of the City and County of Honolulu Department of Environmental Services; Acting County 39 40 Engineer of the County of Kauai Department of Public Works; 41 Director of the County of Maui Department of Environmental

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Management; and Director of the County of Hawaii Department of Environmental Management.
