SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO DEVELOP AND ENFORCE NON-SEX SEGREGATED DRESS CODES FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL FORMAL EVENTS.

WHEREAS, in the school year 2021-2022, an East Oahu public 1 high school had sex-segregated dress codes for formal events 2 such as homecoming and graduation; and 3 4 WHEREAS, students of the East Oahu public high school 5 expressed their concerns in a student-made petition about the 6 sex-segregated dress codes for public school formal events; and 7 8 WHEREAS, the current sex-segregated dress codes for public 9 school formal events uphold the false idea that the definitions 10 of sex and gender are the same; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the current sex-segregated dress codes for public 13 school formal events uphold negative sex-based stereotypes; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the current public school sex-segregated dress 16 codes do not uphold Title IX of the federal Education Amendments 17 of 1972, codified as title 20 United States Code section 1681 et 18 seq., which prohibits discrimination based on sexual orientation 19 and gender identity and protects those who do not conform with 20 sex-based stereotypes; and 21 22 WHEREAS, the current public school sex-segregated dress 23 codes do not uphold Act 110, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, which 24 prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex, gender identity, 25 and expression in the State; and 26 27 WHEREAS, the current public school sex-segregated dress 28 codes do not uphold the First Amendment to the United States 29 Constitution, as contained in the United States Bill of Rights, 30 which protects the right of expression; and 31 32

WHEREAS, the development of non-sex segregated dress codes 1 2 will help make public school formal events more inclusive to māhū, gender non-conforming, and transgender students; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the development of non-sex segregated dress codes 5 would affirm students with a diversity of gender expressions 6 rather than alienate them; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, the Honolulu Youth Commission adopted Resolution 22-020, urging the Board of Education to push for non-sex 10 segregated dress codes for public school formal events; now, 11 therefore, 12 13 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, 15 that the Board of Education is urged to work with schools and 16 17 youth leaders to develop and enforce non-sex segregated dress codes for public school formal events to create a positive and 18 safe space for all students; and 19 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 21 Resolution be transmitted to the Chairperson of the Board of 22 Education, Superintendent of Education, and Chair of the 23 Honolulu Youth Commission. 24 25 26 OFFERED BY: BESCO 27
