SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THAT THE CHIEF INFORMATION OFFICER REVIEW WHETHER ALL DEPARTMENTS, AGENCIES, AND OFFICES OF THE STATE HAVE UP-TO-DATE TECHNOLOGY TO REDUCE CYBER THREATS AND HELP PROTECT THE STATE AGAINST CYBERATTACKS.

WHEREAS, the frequency, scale, and sophistication of 1 cyberattacks against key infrastructure and government systems 2 have been on the rise in recent years; and 3 4 WHEREAS, many of these cyberattacks lead to data breaches 5 of highly sensitive and personal information, such as the major 6 security breach suffered by the United States (U.S.) Marshals 7 Service on February 17, 2023; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the U.S. Marshals Service is a division of the 10 United States Department of Justice that provides for the 11 protection of judges and court personnel, transportation of 12 federal prisoners, and operation of the federal Witness 13 Protection Program; and 14 15 WHEREAS, according to United States Department of Justice 16 officials, hackers attacked the computer system through 17 ransomware and stole law enforcement data that included returns 18 from the legal process, administrative information, and 19 personally identifiable information relating to U.S. Marshals 20 Service investigative targets, third parties, and certain U.S. 21 Marshals Service employees; and 22 23 WHEREAS, recent significant cyberattacks on other 24 governmental entities include the ransomware attacks on various 25 governmental institutions of Costa Rica throughout April and May 26 of 2022, and the attack on Vanuatu's government servers and 27 28 websites in November 2022; and 29 WHEREAS, the ransomware attacks on the Costa Rican 30 government not only caused losses of tens of millions of dollars 31 32 a day to the country's import/export industry for months, but



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also widespread disruptions to the country's social security 1 fund and health care system, causing Costa Rica to be the first 2 nation to declare a national emergency due these attacks; and 3 4 WHEREAS, Vanuatu is an archipelagic state in the Pacific 5 with a population of just over 315,000 people and the 6 cyberattack to this nation took down virtually all of the 7 government's digital networks, including but not limited to its 8 emergency systems, medical records, vehicle registrations, 9 driver's license databases, and tax systems, thereby causing its 10 agencies to conduct their work on paper and by using personal 11 email accounts for months following the attack; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the ongoing cyberwarfare between Russia and 14 Ukraine, which has resulted in skewed election results, theft 15 and destruction of data, blackouts, and other forms of data 16 breaches and service disruptions, demonstrates the magnitude of 17 chaos that can be caused by cybercriminals, not only to key day-18 to-day operations, but also to major institutions and 19 infrastructure; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the growing state of cyber threats and speed at 22 23 which cyber criminals target government entities require that the State have up-to-date technology to lower the chances of a 24 possible data breach or worse; now, therefore, 25 26 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 27 28 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, that the Chief Information Officer is requested to review 29 whether all departments, agencies, and offices of the State have 30 up-to-date technology to reduce cyber threats and help protect 31 the State against cyberattacks; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all departments, agencies, and 34 offices of the State are requested to cooperate with and assist 35 the Chief Information Officer to determine whether any and what 36 upgrades are needed to current technology to reduce the chances 37 of falling victim to cyber threats, including but not limited to 38 disruptive hacks, ransomware attacks, data breaches, and digital 39 40 scams; and 41



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chief Information Officer is requested to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation and the prioritization of projects to upgrade the technology of the State, to the Legislature prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2024; and

9 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor and Chief Information
10 Officer.
