The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) strongly supports Governor's Message 516 nominating Dawn Chang as the Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department), for a term to expire on December 31, 2026.

Dawn Chang brings a lifetime of experience and expertise in Hawai'i land use and community building to the Department. As the Senior legal counsel in the Land/Transportation Division of the Attorney General's Office, Ms. Chang guided the Department for fifteen years in the areas of real property law, administrative law, Native Hawaiian rights, water rights, and environmental law. She advised the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the Commission on Water Resource Management, and the Island Burial Councils. During her tenure, Ms. Chang used her broad legal understanding - from ceded lands to historic preservation law to real property transactions - to help multiple Department Chairs, Deputies, and staff achieve the Department's mission of conserving Hawai'i's unique and limited natural, cultural, and historic resources. Ms. Chang also assisted the Department in litigation when necessary.

In 2001, Ms. Chang formed her own company, Hōʿākea LLC, dba Kuʿiwalu, and provided consultation to landowners, developers government agencies, and organizations, often facilitating community meetings or working to build relationships between land developers and the Hawaiian community. In 2012, Ms. Chang became part of the Accord3 Network. As a seasoned team member, she provided

In 2016, Ms. Chang was appointed to the Land Use Commission by Governor Ige and confirmed by the Senate. She was reconfirmed for a second term, and resigned when Governor Green appointed her as Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

Ms. Chang attended St. Andrew's Priory, in Honolulu, and went on to get a master's in social work from the University of Hawaii. She received her Juris Doctor from the Richardson School of Law and is a member of the State Bar and the Native Hawaiian Bar Association. Ms. Chang does pro bono arbitration with the Hawai'i Judiciary Court Annexed Arbitration Program, and she is a member of ACCORD3.0, specializing in facilitating controversial issues. She is a former Board Member of the Historic Hawaii Foundation, the KEY Project, and the Girl Scouts of Hawaii.

From her work in the Department, and outside of the Department, Ms. Chang understands the Department's strengths as well as its issues. Additionally, she has proven management, facilitation and strategic planning skills, and is not afraid to find common ground in the face of controversy, and seek fair compromises. As the Department navigates significant challenges related to climate change, increasing use of our state lands, existential threats to our native forests and ocean environment, and increasing pressure to develop conservation land, all with limited funding, the Department will need the leadership Ms. Chang is uniquely qualified to provide.

On behalf of Historic Hawai'i Foundation, I am writing in **support for GM 516, confirming Dawn N.S. Chang at the Chairperson of the Hawai'i Department of Land and Natural Resources** for a term to expire December 31, 2026.

The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) is responsible for managing and protecting Hawaii's natural, cultural, historic and scenic resources. As one of the 12 primary divisions of the Department, the Historic Preservation Division is responsible for administering the State's program for the identification and treatment of historic properties and cultural resources.

Hawaii's current practice is to designate the Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources as the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO). The SHPO is responsible for the state's comprehensive historic preservation program [HRS §6E-5] and to meet the federal requirements of the National Historic Preservation Act [16 U.S.C. 470a(b)—State Historic Preservation Programs]. The Hawai'i SHPO is appointed by the governor and "shall be appointed on the basis of professional competence and experience in the field of historic preservation and shall be placed in the department (of land and natural resources) for the purposes of the state program."

The State Historic Preservation Officer is the single most important person related to historic preservation in the state. The State appoints its SHPO to be the decision-maker and advocate related to the sites, buildings, landscapes, districts and objects that are significant to the history of Hawai'i. The position is critically important for establishing and implementing a comprehensive historic preservation program that both initiates preservation actions (through planning, inventories, education, incentive and regulatory systems) and responds to proposals that may affect historic

properties (through review of development proposals, capital improvements, tax credits and permits).

The historic, cultural and natural resources of Hawai'i are its greatest legacy and irreplaceable treasures. Decisions that affect their protection, use, interpretation and perpetuation have irreversible and dramatic consequences. Historic Hawai'i Foundation strongly supports measures that lead to better decision-making and implementation to safeguard these resources.

Historic Hawai'i Foundation (HHF) is a statewide nonprofit organization established in 1974 to encourage the preservation of sites, buildings, structures, objects and districts that are significant to the history of Hawai'i. It is governed by a Board of Trustees elected by the general membership.

Ms. Chang formerly served as a trustee for Historic Hawai'i Foundation for five years (May 2011- April 2016). But, for the position of Chair of the BLNR, Dawn Chang's same record shows a very clear imbalance towards corporate agendas and no interest in the preservation or protection of "Aloha Aina". The kuleana of this particular BLNR position requires much more respect, passion, and na'au inclinations for the protection, wise management and conservation of Hawaii's resources. She has no demonstration of such on record.

EXAMPLE: Excerpt from her submitted resume: 2001-2022 Ho'ãkea LLC dba Ku'iwalu, Principal Principal and owner of a woman-owned, Native Hawaiian business that specializes in strategic planning and facilitating culturally sensitive issues for public and private sector projects. Kuiwalu has worked with private developers including Kobayashi Group, Howard Hughes Corporation, General Growth Properties, Turtle Bay Resort, Travaasa Hana Hotel, Outrigger Hotels, and Disney Aulani.

Turtle Bay Resort Controversies:

I first saw Dawn Chang when she appeared on the scene for the Turtle Bay Resort controversy on and around 2010. Dawn Chang was hired by Replay Resorts, a Canada-based resort development firm, to obtain the necessary developmental permits from the Honolulu City Council.

Dawn Chang was the principal of Kuiwalu, a small consulting firm specializing in culturally sensitive issues with developers and Native Hawaiian families on Native Hawaiian burials.

She portrayed herself as a woman leader and also a Hawaiian who understood and felt for the local people.

In this Turtle Bay project here, Dawn Chang was hired to do a job. She did her job.

The Kuilima/Turtle Bay record repeatedly shows that upon receiving land entitlements, corporations such as Oaktree Capital Management and The Blackstone Group were able to exploit and flip their new vested interests **on paper** for significant monetary gains without putting a stick in the ground.

Dawn Chang would continue to do many similar jobs for such corporations and developers in Hawaii. It's her choice of livelihood. It's her free agency, of course.

Many lifelong environmentalists, conservationists, and related fields have voiced their opposition based on her record and their interactions with her. Some of her actions are very alarming in relation to fit this DLNR position's kuleana.

Her record does not instill much trust in this nominee to advocate for the public good and manage the natural but finite resources of Hawaii.

Even if the nominee promises to be independent of her past, it will still be a very hard sell because there are OTHER more qualified nominees who can fill this very important position.

Testimony of KAHEA: THE HAWAIIAN-ENVIRONMENTAL ALLIANCE in opposition to the nomination of Dawn Chang as Chairperson Department of Land and Natural Resources (GM 516)

To the Senators of the Water and Land Committee,

KAHEA: The Hawaiian-Environmental Alliance (KAHEA), a Hawai'i nonprofit established in 2000, like hundreds of other commenters, strongly opposes nomination of Dawn Chang as Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources and thus opposes GM 516.

Chang's firm, Ku'iwalu routinely worked with big developers who have gentrified Ala Moana, Kaka'ako and Waikīkī, displacing Kānaka Maoli today, and unearthing iwi kupuna laid to rest many generations ago. Ku'iwalu, was often tasked with creating "community engagement opportunities" designed to diffuse oppositional views.

We are disappointed in Governor Green's nomination of Dawn Chang for DLNR Chair. As someone who has facilitated harmful development by diffusing community concerns through consultation processes that are confusing, time consuming, and impotent, she is not the right choice to lead this agency. Developers who have contracted with her to move projects along will enjoy a real advantage over people who are speaking out for the environmental community and native Hawaiian cultural concerns.

Perhaps most relevant to our work at KAHEA is Chang's preparation of the University of Hawai'i's (UH) 2009 Comprehensive Management Plan (CMP) for Mauna Kea and the 2021 audit of the CMP. In 2004, Mauna Kea Anaina Hou, the Royal Order of Kamehameha, Sierra Club, and Kū Ching sued BLNR and UH for approving the Keck Outrigger project. In 2007, the Third Circuit Court agreed with the plaintiffs and ordered that UH/ BLNR could not approve new telescope construction until they developed a truly "comprehensive" plan for Mauna Kea.

As the document was being developed in 2009, community members explained to Chang that while they wanted to, they could not trust the process and dialogue with her and others in good faith because of the many years of lies and broken promises on the part of UH and DLNR. "Dawn made a big performance, ensuring everyone this plan was different. It wasn't different," recalls KAHEA Board President Jon Osorio.

After a court ruling in 2012 neutered the CMP, essentially saying it did nothing to reduce the existing significant adverse impacts of telescope development on the summit of Mauna Kea, those same people Chang had given false assurances to, were done giving UH the benefit of the doubt. The next major encounter was in 2014 when Kia'i Mauna disrupted and ultimately stopped the groundbreaking ceremony for the Thirty-Meter Telescope, ushering in a new era in the movement to protect Mauna Kea. In this way, the botched CMP process is one of the sparks that ignited the Kia'i Mauna movement.

Perversely, the 2021 audit of the CMP, also performed by Chang's Ku'iwalu consultancy, found "there is an absence of genuine consultation with the Native Hawaiian community that has resulted in greater mistrust of UH." What Chang laid at the feet of UH in her 2021 report were the logical consequences of decades of farcical community consultation, including through her own consulting work. Today, the CMP remains beleaguered by litigation (SCOT-22-0000502). Hawaiian cultural practitioners' challenge to UH and BLNR's "update" to the CMP is before the state supreme court.

The Director of DLNR chairs the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) which makes decisions on a wide range of issues including land uses (like the Army leases which end in 2029) and Conservation District Use Permits (which projects, like the one the Thirty-Meter Telescope, need to obtain in order to build on conservation lands). The Director of DLNR is also the chair of the Commission on Water Resources Management (CWRM). CWRM works on important issues like groundwater contamination at Red Hill and setting standards for keeping enough water in our streams to support healthy ecosystems including native aquatic life and cultural practices like kalo farming. The DLNR Director also serves as the chief historic preservation officer who is in charge of, amongst other things, the protection of iwi kūpuna. This is particularly concerning given Ms. Chang's past contracts with developers who have desecrated burials at places like Kawaiaha'o Church and the Ke'eaumoku Wal-Mart.

In a <u>Dec 29, 2022 Hawai'i News Now story</u>, Ms. Chang states that she will disclose any potential conflicts and will even appoint someone other than herself to the newly formed Mauna Kea Stewardship Oversight Authority. Where will the opportunities for public oversight be when she chooses a delegate? With a substantial client list of some of Hawai'i's most controversial projects, we can expect lots of disclosures, delegations and recusals. How then, can we expect Ms. Chang to provide the sorely needed leadership DLNR deserves?

The grounding was located near a marine sanctuary and required immediate action. I have conducted various marine salvage operations for over 25 years here in Hawaii, ranging from large naval ships such as "Port Royal" to smaller commercial and recreational vessels. In every situation DLNR plays a major role in the removal process and face difficult decisions, however as acting Chairperson, Dawn was put in a predicament unlike previous DLNR Chairpersons I have worked with; dealing with a vessel of this size and value with no insurance.

While working with various chairpersons throughout my salvage career, maritime emergencies often serve as a litmus test. Some have done well and others have not. For thirty three years, our continuous successful civic engagement has been the primary NGO advocacy for Hanauma Bay at the community, City, State and Federal levels.

Earlier this year, we were a signatory on a joint letter of concern sent to Governor Green and Interim Chair Chang about decisions made late in the Ige Administration which have left the Hawaii Coral Restoration Nursery, and DLNR, without critical institutional knowledge or the leadership of any State employee with expertise or experience in the natural resource management and restoration of Hawaiian corals.

We are also concerned that two FY22 federal earmark projects listed below will be changed without engagement with the many community stewards and leaders that provided written support for them as funded:

\$286,156 to facilitate moving of the Rare Hawaiian Coral Ark, which is comprised of 50 known species, to a better-hardened, existing facility and provide dedicated support for its care <u>https://www.hirono.senate.gov/congressionally-directed-spending</u>. Friends of Hanauma Bay was directly responsible for initially engaging with Hawaii's US Congressional Delegation to successfully gain support for this project, so we have a

specific vested interest in ensuring it is completed as funded.

We have further asked that outside oversight, and the incoming DLNR Chair, reassess the direction the department has taken over the last three years to prioritize outsourcing management and restoration of Hawaiian corals to entities inexperienced with Hawaiian corals and who are not accountable to Hawaii residents, community stewards, and Hawaii's marine wildlife for their work. These decisions have created unhelpful trust issues between community stewards and DLNR, to the detriment of Hawaiian corals which are keystone species in our marine ecosystems.

We need objective, strong, and decisive leadership willing to act now upon these concerns and change the direction of DLNR. We look forward to working to restore that broken trust with the confirmed DLNR Chair, whoever that may be.

Senator Inouye and members of Committee on Water and Land,

In 2015 then Senator Josh Green said in his opposition to the nomination of Carleton Ching to lead the Department of Land and Natural Resources, "We need a Director of DLNR who has a proven record of fighting to protect and preserve our natural and cultural resources, not a career lobbyist for the development industry who has a record of calling for the elimination of cultural and environmental protections."

Eight years later, Governor Green has nominated Dawn Chang to head the Department of Land and Natural Resources, which oversees the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD). This is the same Dawn Chang who advised her client to circumvent the law, resulting in the disturbance of hundreds of burials and protracted litigation. State law recognizes burials as significant historic sites subject to the historic preservation review process.

On August 16, 2005, Dawn Chang submitted a scope of services to Kawaiaha'o Church in support of its multipurpose center construction project. She explicitly acknowledged that "it is very likely that known and unknown archaeological, historical and cultural resources, including native Hawaiian human burial remains will be discovered on the Project site." As a former deputy attorney general for SHPD, Dawn Chang promised to advise the Church "on all pertinent historic preservation and cultural resource related laws and administrative rules." Her scope of work included educating Hawaiians "about the benefits and <u>necessity</u> for the Project." *See*

On December 29, 2005, Chang emailed the leader of the Church's construction project, writing, "I thought I might pass some of my thoughts to you as the Church proceeds forward on the construction plans." Chang advised the Church that the preparation of an archaeological inventory survey would "be costly" and "take considerable time." She counseled the Church, "Most significantly, any human remains found during an archaeological inventory survey will be considered 'previously identified." As such, she warned, "you may not be able to relocate the human remains." She proposed a solution. She wrote, "We may want to ask SHPD to reconsider" the requirement to prepare an archaeological inventory survey. "My recommendation is that once you have a conceptual redesign of the improvements, we schedule an informal meeting with SHPD to discuss these changes and request a revised mitigation plan from SHPD." She let the Church know that she had "several productive meetings" with SHPD "on other matters." *See*

On March 7, 2006, Dawn Chang emphasized that if the burials remain in place "this might have an impact on the ability to use this site depending on the location of the burials and the proposed use."

On May 1, 2006, Dawn Chang advised the Church that it would be "much better off" without an archaeological inventory survey. In an email to Chang, the head of the Church's project summarized, "As you mentioned, with an approved monitoring plan, any discovery will be considered by SHPD as an inadvertent find, requiring them to render a quick approval on relocation."

Dawn Chang calls herself a "process person." In this case, however, she advised her client to choose a process that excluded Hawaiian descendants of the burials from meaningful participation in decisionmaking.

As the Intermediate Court of Appeals observed after reading these same emails, Dawn Chang "advised Kawaiaha'o Church that preparation of an AIS would be costly and take considerable time. In particular, the consultant advised that any human remains found during an AIS would be considered 'previously identified,' a designation that would require publication of notices and consultation with lineal and cultural descendants, involve the OIBC, and could preclude the relocation of human remains and require their preservation in place." *Hall v. Department of Land and Natural Resources*, 128 Hawai'i 455, 459, 290 P.3d 525, 529 (ICA 2012). The Church and SHPD violated the law.

Dawn Chang's emails speak volumes. She advised her client to circumvent the law, arranging a behind closed door meeting with regulators to fast-track the project. As a former deputy attorney general, she should have known better. She should not run the Department of Land and Natural Resources, which is charged with enforcing the law and protecting historic sites.¹

• *Kilakila `O Haleakalā v. Bd of Land & Natural Res.*, 131 Hawai`i 193, 317 P.3d 27 (2013) (BLNR erred in authorizing a 142-foot-tall building in the conservation district without first providing for a contested case hearing);

• Blake v. County of Kaua'i Planning Comm'n, 131 Hawai`i 123, 315 P.3d 749) (2013)(the court has jurisdiction to consider case involving destruction of historic sites);

• *Ching v. Case*, 145 Hawai'i 148, 449 P.3d 1146 (2019) (BLNR breached its constitutional trust duties by failing to reasonably monitor or inspect state land at Pōhakuloa); and

• *Carmichael v. Bd. of Land & Nat. Res.*, 150 Hawai'i 547, 506 P.3d 211 (2022) (continuation of revocable permits is subject to HRS chapter 343).

I. Introduction

- A. Brief historical information Kawaiaha'o is the first Christian Church in Hawai'i and was built between 1836 and 1842. Kawaiaha'o is rich in Hawaiian royalty. It was in Kawaiaha'o Church in 1843 that Kamehameha III uttered the phrase, "Ua mau ke ea o ka aina I ka pono" (The life of the land is perpetuated in righteousness). The church is listed on both the State and National Register of Historic Places.
- B. Statement of the project While the Project involves lands that have been previously developed, it is also situated within a known cemetery and it is very likely that known and unknown archaeological, historical and cultural resources, including native Hawaiian human burial remains will be discovered on the Project site. Kawaiaha'o Church (Client) desires to be very sensitive to the existing and potential historic and cultural resources that may be discovered on the Project site. It is the goal of the consultation services provided by Ku'iwalu to develop and implement a proactive plan to ensure that these resources are managed in the most culturally appropriate manner while ensuring that the construction activities proceed in a timely and efficient manner.
- C. Consultation Team Ku'iwalu brings unique expertise to this Project through its Team's years of experience in the area of working with the Island Burial Councils, State Historic Preservation Division, Department of Health, native Hawaiian organizations, and members of the native Hawaiian community. Our expertise is in the areas of community outreach (i.e. consultation process), legal understanding of the burial and historic preservation laws, and hiring and supervising archaeological firms in the area of archaeological monitoring for construction related activities. Ku'iwalu desires to work with clients who are interested in making positive contributions to Hawai'i's communities and have a respect for the protection and preservation of native Hawaiian cultural resources. III. Community Relations

Many groups have emotional ties to Kawaiaha'o Church because of its history and the role it plays in the greater community. Aside from the Church's congregation, native Hawaiians, political leaders and all those with an attachment to local history may feel they are stakeholders in the Church. Groups concerned with historical preservation and the character of downtown Honolulu, as well as those who live, work, or own property near the Church will have a keen interest in any physical changes to and development on the church property. Therefore, in addition to the communications described in the consultation process, the Team will:

- A. Develop a database of these diverse stakeholder groups and select an approach for educating each group about the benefits and necessity for the Project and anticipate and preemptively respond to their anticipated concerns.
- B. Develop a proactive and reactive approach for dealing with media issues related to the Project. Assist Church leaders to identify likely issues and develop a strategy to respond to each issue in a culturally and politically appropriate manner. Issues and messages to particular stakeholders will have to be individually tailored and delivered by appropriate channels.
- C. Assist in the development of the range of communications channels required, including news media, newsletters, direct mail, public notices, and other publications. This planning will include the development of initiatives to deal with commercial impacts that may affect neighborhood businesses because of constraints on access, parking or traffic congestion during construction.

- D. Provide assistance to the Client on appropriate responses to media inquiries, including media training for the Client on how to speak to the media in the event of a crisis situation or for informational purposes. Aloha Don

While you may not have specifically asked for my review or recommendations, in light of the change in design I thought I might pass some of my thoughts to you as the Church proceeds forward on the construction plans. You may have already been advised on these matters but I thought I'd pass them on to you in case you had not considered it.

SHPD initially required an archaeological inventory sruvey (Feb. 10, 2004 letter from Holly McEldowney), however, in light of the changed design (minimizing excavation, we may want to ask SHPD to reconsider this requirement. Having SHPD reconsider this requirement may be quite significant for several reasons. 1) It will be costly to do the inventory survey (equipment, archaeoligical services, etc.) 2) The survey may take considerable time, however arch archaeologist will be in the best position to provide a schedule. 3) Most significantly, any human remains found during an archaeological inventory survey will be considered "previously identilied." While I would like to be optimistic that any human remains discovered on the project site will fall under the jurisdiction of DOH, in the event it is not, than the designation of discovery as previously identified will be significant. it will require at a minimum publication notice of potential descendants, consultation with lineal and cultural descendants, consulalitation with Oahu Island Burial Council, and decision by SHPD. In general, construction will be not be permitted to proceed until this process is completed. Under the best of cases, this process could be expeditious (several months) or it could take a much longer time and affect your construction schedule. And, after the process you may not be able to relocate the human remains. Obviously, I am portraying the potentially worst case scenario, however, you need to be prepared for that and calculate that into your construction schedule and costs. 4) Increased cost in the event construction is delayed.

2. My recommendation is that once you have a conceptual redesign of the improvements, we schedule an informal meeting with SHPD to discuss these changes and request a revised mitigation plan from SHPD. Ku'iwalu has had several productive meetings with the new SHPD administrator (Melanie Chinen) and the Cultural Division Chief (Sunny Greer) on other matters and am more than willing to coordinate a meeting with SHPD and the appropriate members of the Church.

3. Ku'iwalu will continue to work with Kai to seek a timely resolution to the jurisdiction issue as well. The new design may dictate the outcome of these discussions too. We will keep you informed on these discussions.

Should you have any questions don't hesitate to contact me. We can always discuss this matter further when we meet in January.

Harvey and Peter,

I believe I mentioned to each of you that SHPD and HCDA are aware of our project and had already responded to our request for review. In fact, HCDA issued a Certificate of Appropriateness and SHPD also gave their approval subject to a few mitigation items.

To bring you up to date on where we currently stand, I have attached a copy of the HDCA and SHPD documents we've received (through AM Partners). I also included a summary that I put together myself to outline what needed to be done.

However, SHPD and HCDA are not yet aware of the major change we've decided on for our project, i.e. no underground parking facility. At some point soon, we will have to approach them about it. I suppose that will come when we start zeroing in on the Schematic Design with the architect.

I would appreciate your reviews of these documents, paying particular attention to the mitigation issues which includes a survey and inventory of the possible discovery of buried human remains. After reviewing, We can begin discussions on the mitigation requirements and how they will be accomplished. We have already started on some items. For example, a professional photographer has already taken black and white photos of the buildings. Also, a professional surveyor is completing the property boundary map. We have looked for but not been able to find construction drawings of the buildings that are to be demolished.

HCDA also requested that the radius of the property at the corner of King Street and Kawaiahao Lane be changed. We haven't taken any action with that, awaiting further information from our surveyor and clarification from HCDA. (Harvey, we may need your help on this one.) We do not understand why the City wants us to revise the street corner. The existing corner does not seem to present any problem with automobile traffic so why do they want the change? Additionally, the present property wall will be affected. There is the question of who will bear the cost for the revision. In the past, when the City requested conversion of Church property to build their roads (e.g., Kawaiahao Lane and Street and Punchbowl widening), they paid all expenses.

You can see that their are a few issues that need to be discussed and decided on. Some are design problems while others may require legal assistance.

I would appreciate any comment you may have on what we need to do at this point. If necessary, we can convene a meeting to discuss the issues and agree on a plan of action.

Happy New Year to all! Should be an exciting 2007. I'm looking forward to it.

to support our request in order to eliminate the disturbance of human remains in the Queen Street Lot.

Archaeological Monitoring

I spoke to Hal Hammatt this morning about getting together to discuss development of a monitoring plan for our MPC project. He agrees that it is a good idea to do so but seemed to lean more toward an inventory survey. (We want to stay away from that, if possible, in orderto avoid complications) I told him that I would try to get some of us together to discuss the monitoring plan. As you mentioned, with an approved monitoring plan, any discovery will be considered by SHPD as an inadvertent find, requiring them to render a quick approval on relocation.

Before arranging for such a meeting, however, I would like for us to develop the protocol for handling any inadvertent finds. Is this something that can be developed by Kuiwalu, working closely with the Chair of our Na Iwi Committee, Alan Kaopuiki. I think we would then be better prepared to discuss the monitoring plan with Dave Shideler of CSH.

Also, keep in mind that we don't have a General Contractor yet. All we have are the Project Manager (CM&D) and the Architect (Franklin Wong). The GC will not be onboard until mid-May, at the earliest.

Finally, it is certainly our intent to involve Kuiwaiu in our discussions with SHPD. You're knowledge and familiarity with their staff is an invaluable asset for us.

Jurisdiction

Hopefully, DOH and SHPD will issue a statement on their position very soon. Our first live test of the matter will be the trenching of the Likeke Hall parking lot for a sewer line that will extend from the bookstore to the back of the office building, left on the back road then out to Kawaiahao Street. That will probably take place around early to mid-June.

Thank you for the update.

David, I'm sure is already considering this in his analysis, but if there is a likelihood that burials will be discovered, I would suspect that SHPD would require that an archaeological inventory survey be completed before any construction work begins rather than only archaeological monitoring during construction. If this is the case, than any burials discovered during an archaeological inventory survey would fall under the decision making authority of Oahu Island Burial Council in consultation with recognized lineal and cultural descendants. My experience with the burial councils is that if we discover 20, or even 5, it may be considered a "concentration of human burial remains" which supports preservation in place rather than relocation. Thus, this may have an impact on the ability to use this site depending on the location of the burials and the proposed use. TATA A

Uncle Tin Hu, Alan Kaopuiki and I met yesterday with Dr. David Shideler of Cultural Surveys Hawaii (CSH) to go over our plans to convert a section of the KC cemetery near the Queen Street gate into a small parking lot (in connection with our MPC project). After reviewing the 1912 cemetery plot assignment map in the archives, we went out to the site to confirm the location and look at the markers in the area.

CSH was deeply involved in the discovery of lwi during the City's widening of Queen Street (April 1986 to August 1988). A total of 116 burials were recovered, all of them near or adjacent to the sidewalk curbing along our stone wall by Queen Street. Attached to this email are two na iwi discovery maps made by CSH during that time. Actually, one map is just an enlargement of the Diamond Head section of the other.

In observing where we plan to build the parking lot, Dr. Shideler feels that there is a very good possibility that the area will contain at least 20 remains. To ascertain his observation, however, a closer examination (testing) of the area would be advisable.

Based on that advice, I asked Dr. Shideler to submit a plan and proposal on how we should proceed in this matter. I will subsequently turn this matter over to the Na Iwi Committee and Uncle Tin Hu (as Trustee representative) for handling. They will report their progress to the MPCCC. They should also keep Kahu Curt well informed.

I also asked Dr. Shideler to determine/recommend how far mauka we can go with our Queen Street parking lot without disturbing many gravesites.

We are, of course, very anxious to do whatever is necessary to resolve all issues that may arise in this matter. We have fantastic resources (Kuiwalu, OHA, Nanette, etc.) to draw from. We will be counting on all of you for your help.

Dear Senator Inouye and Committee Members,

By now you have received considerable testimony regarding Dawn Chang's potential appointment to chair DLNR, most of it supportive, along with some who have raised questions about possible conflicts of interest, ties with developers, and her work as a mediator on specific cases. I want to address some of these but first, a few preliminaries.

Background

I have known Dawn as a colleague and friend for three decades. Without revealing confidences, we have often consulted with each other on strategies for resolving some of Hawai'i's most stubborn conflicts. She has also for many years been a member of The ACCORD Network, a peer-to-peer learning group that has a long history of personal and professional development with colleagues in Hawai'i, mainland U.S., Australia, and New Zealand. Through experience and temperament, Dawn has the talents and qualities we absolutely require of a DL&NR chair. She is savvy, principled, and diplomatic, especially with critics who may disagree with her on particular cases, issues, or decisions. Dawn has become an experienced, effective, and highly skilled broker between communities and private businesses and government agencies who seek to build something that wasn't there before. There is a Japanese saying that "the go-between wears out a thousand pairs of sandals." Dawn has callouses on her feet and has been an extraordinarily effective intermediary.

In her work, and that of others, communities rarely have the resources to support a mediator though they often make contributions in kind. More often, we are paid by either government or business. In these instances, our starting promises and contracts concerning our roles are <u>always</u> explicit. We will remain neutral, not serve as any one side's agent, and work for solutions equally hard with everyone.

I tell you these things because of the criticisms that have been leveled at her in articles in the Star-Bulletin and Civil Beat. In Dawn, I believe you have an exceptionally qualified candidate. I give her my unqualified endorsement.

Aloha. I am Christina Meller, a retired State planner. I worked with Dawn Chang when she was a deputy AG at DLNR. She is no stranger to working with the community to resolve issues.

She reviewed and contributed to a Hanalei boating issue report that I worked on as a planner in the Office of Planning, Coastal Zone Management Program. The boating issue pitted native Hawaiian families for and against the use of zodiac boats in Hanalei Bay; traditionally used by canoe paddlers, fishermen, and swimmers. The report described State and County roles on jurisdiction. We gave the Legislature a full account with recommendations on how to proceed.

I moved to DLNR and became program manager for the Na Ala Hele Trails under the Division of Forestry and Wildlife. Dawn assisted the program during my four-year tenure to:

- 1. establish cultural native Hawaiian access hunting, fishing and gathering rights over private lands;
- 2. gain access and management of private trails to protect endangered species via firebreaks;
- 3. defend public use of state trails from private interest bent on closing trails for their exclusive use and
- 4. indemnify landowners who allowed public access.

Aloha Chair Inouye and WTL Committee Members Elefante, Chang, Fevella, and McKelvey,

I didn't start out opposed to the nomination of Dawn Chang to serve as DLNR chair, but after watching her in action as the chair designate, HOLY MOLY what a train wreck she is! I've watched the last few month's board meetings to get a sense of her. To her credit, she is professional and courteous to those testifying before the land board. Unfortunately for Hawaii, she doesn't know how to run a meeting that follows Sunshine Laws or the rules for contested cases. That is a huge problem, especially since she took an oath to uphold those laws. Maybe she should read them.

For example, just last week, at a land board meeting (3/24/23), she denied a representative of an environmental non-profit the right to a contested case hearing. DLNR rules for requesting a contested case are provide that one requests it at the board meeting and then one has 10 days to submit their written petition explaining their reasons and standing for making the request. Subsequently, the approval or denial appears on a later BLNR meeting agenda, which must be properly noticed under HRS Ch 92. If so approved, the contested case hearing proceeds. The overriding purpose of the contested case procedures is to ensure that the best and most relevant information is presented to the decision-making body, thereby assuring that the various and often conflicting legal interests of the parties are considered.

However, the land board made a motion to dismiss the testifier's request for a contested case without even giving her the chance to submit her written petition, which she has 10 days to do. **Dawn Chang let her agency's rules take a back seat to expedite her own agency's proposal, and she didn't mind breaking the Sunshine Law to do it.** She allowed the motion to dismiss the contested case to come to a vote without publically noticing it as an agenda item, which denies the public the right to testify on the matter of dismissal.

So, in my opinion, Dawn Chang is going to get the DLNR in a lot of legal trouble should you vote to approve her as Chairperson.

TESTIMONY OF MILILANI B TRASK IN SUPPORT OF THE NOMINATION OF DAWN CHANG AS DLNR CHAIR

WHY I SUPPORT DAWN CHANG AS DLNR CHAIR

Aloha Legislators:

The Department of Land and Natural Resources, (DLNR) has not been a dependable friend of the Hawaiian Community during the previous administration. I know this from my personal experience in the struggle to protect Mauna Kea.

When the development of the Comprehensive Management Plan (CMP) for Mauna Kea began, I did not know Dawn Chang. And I certainly did not think of her as a friend. I wasn't even sure she could be trusted. Then, as I participated in the process in which a variety of people and groups from all over Hawaii Island and the state came forward to provide their mana'o on the future the mauna, I got to know Dawn.

I realized she was sincere about getting all community stakeholders involved in creating a plan that would appropriately govern the way in which Mauna Kea could be protected and cared for. I was especially impressed by her understanding of the cultural significance of the mauna.

She spent a year crisscrossing Hawai'i Island, meeting with cultural practitioners, environmentalists, Hawaiian community leaders, and representatives of the business and educational communities, as well as elected officials and other representatives of the public. Public meetings were held, and discussion grew heated, but Dawn proved a capable facilitator.

I and others had many discussions with Dawn during the community engagement process she designed and managed. We had many disagreements and passionate exchanges, but in the end, we achieved most of what we wanted, but we didn't get everything, at least initially. But I realized Dawn had the difficult job of balancing input from a variety of stakeholders.

It was in these discussions and meetings, I began to appreciate Dawn's skill in listening, letting people express their feelings and ideas, and maintaining a pleasant thoughtful presence, while guiding the discussion in an intelligent and respectful manner.

When I saw the initial draft of the CMP, I was heartened to see the first section was about protecting the mountain as a cultural resource and confirming the rights of Hawaiians to practice their religion and culture in this sacred place. Other sections established processes for managing natural resources, public access, activities and uses, and all types of structures on the mountain.

Dawn's work was the foundation for further negotiations that resulted in sub-plans proposing specific guidelines for cultural and natural resource management, along with a plan for decommissioning the Mauna Kea observatories.

Sadly, the University of Hawaii (UH) and DLNR did not implement these plans consistent with the cultural integrity and community engagement process that informed the CMP which Dawn helped facilitate.

This failure by UH and DLNR resulted in community outrage and led to the 25,000 people, including 60 kupuna, some in wheelchairs, going to the mauna to protect it from further harm. In response, the state mobilized and militarized law enforcement to intimidate the kia'i, the mauna's protectors, and try to drive them away. This was done at a cost of \$21 million to the taxpayers of the state and further degradation of trust in government, especially UH and DLNR.

If we had someone with Dawn Chang's integrity and capacity then at DLNR, we could have implemented the CMP in the culturally sensitive way that was intended. All of the anger, precious time and wasted taxpayer money could have been avoided.

Having worked with Dawn, I know she can be trusted, she has much-needed leadership skills, and she has no bias for or against any group. Her most important commitment has always been to a fair, inclusive and transparent process. That is why I believe she is the best person at this critical moment to chair the Department and Board of Land and Natural Resources.

I'm opposed to Measure GM516 "Submitting for consideration and confirmation as the Chairperson, Department of Land and Natural Resources, Gubernatorial Nominee, DAWN CHANG, for a term to expire 12-31-2026."

Under Dawn Chang's leadership as Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) Chairperson, the BLNR has violated the public's rights to open governmental processes. Complaints have been filed with the Office of the Ombudsman requesting an investigation into the BLNR for interference with the public's ability to testify at the March 10, 2023 board meeting. An investigation into the BLNR for violation of the Sunshine Law at the March 24, 2023 board meeting has also been requested through the Office of Information Practices.

These investigations are of significant concern, as it appears the BLNR has attempted to silence discussion of very serious information provided in written testimony regarding a planned project that received final approval by the BLNR on March 24, 2023. The suppressed testimony includes peer-reviewed studies about the risks of the project to the environment, native birds, wildlife, and public health. It also includes documentation of procedural errors, specific conflicts of interest, potential interstate transport of pathogens and lack of permitting, failure to receive EPA approval for use of a biopesticide prior to assuring public safety, and EPA discreditation of the article cited in the Final Environmental Assessment asserting that the biopesticide poses no risk to human health.

Additionally, live video testimony at the BLNR meetings on March 10, 2023 and March 24, 2023 noted that both BLNR Chairperson Dawn Chang and Board Member Vernon Char have conflicts of interest regarding the agenda item and must recuse themselves from participating in any discussion or voting on the matter. The BLNR, under Chang's leadership, chose not to address those conflicts of interest at the March 10, 2023 meeting. At the March 24, 2023 meeting, both Chang and Char verbally denied their conflicts of interest and continued to discuss and vote on the agenda item.

The Board of Land and Natural Resources is a government agency that makes crucial decisions affecting the lives of the people of these islands, our environment, and our wildlife. Board members, and the Chairperson in particular, must serve with integrity and honor the laws and procedures enacted to protect the public's rights to open and fair government. Dawn Chang's actions as Chairperson do not qualify her for the position.

I am writing in protest against the appointment of Ms. Dawn Chang for the position of Chairperson on the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

The Chairperson of the DLNR has stewardship over both the natural and cultural resources of the Hawaiian Islands. It is a position that should be filled by someone whose environmental sensitivity, cultural sensitivity, honesty and moral integrity is beyond question. In my opinion, Ms. Chang does not qualify.

Ms. Chang supposedly helped to write the burial laws for Hawai'i. She subsequently advised, encouraged and aided Kawaiaha'o Church, for the purpose of new construction, in a deliberate move to circumvent the very laws she helped to create for the protection of burials. A judge had ordered that, by law, the church must conduct an Archeological Inventory Survey before any construction began. Ms. Chang advised and aided the church to circumvent this law by seeking a Blanket Disenternment Permit for Unknown Burials from the Department of Health. As a result, disenternment began. It was not until an Intermediate Court of Appeals ruling that excavations stopped, but the greatest damage had already occured. Her actions resulted in hundreds of historic graves being desecrated and the disenterment of hundreds of human remains. It is obvious that, anyone who actually cared about cultural resources would *never* have given the church such terrible advice.

I would further like to remind all legislators and state government officials, that as a country we now face terrible threats to democracy on a national level due to people in government with no real public concern, no moral fiber, and no common decency who lie with ease and who are not being held accountable for their actions. It is therefore more important than ever that people can look to their state government and count on public concern, truth, integrity and an investment in what is morally right. I oppose the confirmation of Dawn Chang.

My name is Edward Halealoha Ayau, Executive Director of Hui Iwi Kuamo'o, a non-profit organization dedicated to the repatriation and reburial of ancestral Hawaiian skeletal remains and funerary objects.

Without hesitation, I oppose the confirmation of Ms Dawn Chang for Chair of DLNR.

I helped organize efforts to sign two petitions, an on-line petition through Change.org, which garnered 923 signatures and 82 comments in opposition to Ms Chang's confirmation and a hard copy petition, which has 56 signatures in opposition to Ms. Chang's confirmation.

I have attached the 4 aforementioned documents as part of my testimony to demonstrate that nearly 1,000 people opposed Ms Chang's confirmation based on the following:

- A Pro-Development Consultant should not lead DLNR if land, water and ocean are to be protected. Then Senator Josh Green courageously raised the same concern in 2015 regarding DLNR nominee Carleton Ching who was not confirmed, yet ironically now governor Green nominates a candidate with far worse credentials regarding the protection and preservation of natural and cultural resources.
- 2) Ms Chang advised her client Kawaiaha'o Church to circumvent the law for which the Hawaii Intermediate Court of Appeals ruled against the action which resulted in nearly 900 ancestral skeletal remains being unnecessarily disinterred, the majority of whom are still awaiting reburial while Ms Chang has moved on to seek higher office.
- 3) In an enforcement case involving the bulldozing of 60 ancestral burial sites at Mapulehu, Molokai, then Attorney General Dawn Chang failed to uphold the law letting the violator off with a minimal fine when she was facing fines up to \$600,000 for the violations.
- 4) As a private consultant, Ms Chang submitted an inadequate Comprehensive Management Plan for Mauna Kea, falsely claiming she consulted with cultural and environmental parties and then failed to include an already developed natural resource plan, which the DLNR had to require her to include. Chang's actions are particularly telling with regards to her lack of character vis-à-vis the land and natural resources of Hawai'i and consistent with her pro development stance.
- 5) The bottom line issue is this nominee has repeatedly failed to uphold the integrity of law and failed repeatedly to honestly and accurately represent Hawaiian cultural interests codified in the law. This is not about Ms Chang's (1) gender or her (2) ethnicity--- **it is about her lack of (3) integrity** to uphold the law for all.
- 6) Ms Chang's past work experience creates several **conflicts of interest** for her in terms of burials, certain water issues and Maunakea and proceeding to confirm her given these conflicts seriously undermines public confidence in the legislative process and this administration.
- 7) The Governor should have exercised the wisdom to have nominated Deputy Laura Ka'akua as the DLNR Chairperson, since she clearly meets all three criteria.

We the undersigned, oppose the Senate's confirmation of DAWN CHANG, nominee for the Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) based upon serious concerns as to the integrity of her character and ability to uphold the law. We respectfully request Governor Green to withdraw DAWN CHANG's name and nominate a person who demonstrates (1) respect for the law; (2) awareness of Hawaiian culture; and (3) character of the highest morality and integrity. Our opposition is based on the following record of Ms Chang's disturbing behavior:

1. Governor Green should not nominate a pro-development Consultant

In 2015 then Senator Josh Green said in his opposition to the DLNR Chair nominee Carleton Ching, "We need a Director of DLNR who has a proven record of fighting to protect and preserve our natural and cultural resources, not a career lobbyist for the development industry who has a record of calling for the elimination of cultural and environmental protections," Green said. "This nomination is the wrong choice for Hawai'i, and we should not move forward with it." Indeed, Dawn Chang also lacks "a proven record of fighting to protect and preserve our natural and cultural resources" and like Carleton Ching, she is "the wrong choice for Hawai'i." Dawn Chang worked for General Growth Properties, Howard Hughes, McNaughton Group, Outrigger, Sandwich Isles, Turtle Bay, and Cades Schutte. She worked on the Walmart Ke'eaumoku project, the Lāna'i big wind project, the comprehensive management plan for Mauna Kea, and rail. She is a developer's consultant. Her job has been to obtain community support for development projects. There were highly qualified candidates who demonstrated clear awareness of the law, strong personal principles and integrity for the proper stewardship of our 'āina, wai, and iwi kūpuna on the short list for the Governor's selection. He chose the candidate that has proven repeatedly that she will sell her influence to a developer.

2. Dawn Chang Advised Her Client to Circumvent the Law.

In 2005, Ms Chang advised Kawaiaha'o Church to circumvent the historic preservation law. Although the law required that the Church prepared an archaeological inventory survey, Chang used her connections as a former deputy attorney general to secure a closed-door meeting with officials at the State Historic Preservation Division. She helped persuade state officials to circumvent the law and use an expedited process. As a result, hundreds of iwi kūpuna were unlawfully removed at a cost of sixteen million dollars. The ancestral remains have not yet been reburied.

3. Mapulehu Burials (60 Individuals Disturbed)

In 1991, there was a disturbance of at least 60 burials at Mapulehu, Molokai. An investigation was conducted. As Deputy Attorney General, Ms Chang was charged with enforcing the legal protections afforded to iwi kūpuna in which violators who cause burial disturbances are held accountable via civil fines and other forms of punishment.

HRS Chapter 6E-11 provides a civil fine of up to \$10,000 for burial disturbance and the minimum number of individuals disturbed at Mapulehu was 60. The maximum fine faced by the violator therefore was \$600,000. State Historic Preservation Division staffer Edward Halealoha Ayau recommended a fine of \$300,000. Chang ignored his recommendation.

Rather than uphold the letter of the law to protect unmarked burial sites, Ms Chang imposed a fine equal to a single violation (\$10,000) and community service hours.

4. Maunakea Comprehensive Management Plan

In 2009, as principal of Ku'iwalu Consulting, Ms. Chang was charged with developing the Mauna Kea Comprehensive Management Plan (CMP). Ms. Chang drafted and presented an inaccurate CMP. After a public hearing before the BLNR in Hilo with dozens of public testifiers -- including Sierra Club members pointing out the plan's deficiencies. The BLNR members determined that the CMP was insufficient because it lacked critical management policies and approved the plan with reservations. In summary, Ms. Chang prepared a wholly inadequate plan for managing Mauna Kea that lacked basic provisions for natural and cultural management, decommissioning, and public access. BLNR determined that the plan led to delays in the Conservation District Use Permit Application for the TMT construction, and the process by which it was drafted and approved undermined the public's trust in BLNR and the University of Hawai'i.

5. Lack of Integrity is the Issue, Not Race or Gender

The misguided narrative that emphasizes Ms Chang's nomination as an uplift to Hawaiian women ignores the third most important component: righteousness. There are many wāhine mana and kāne who meet all three criteria. Unfortunately, in his failed wisdom, the Governor choose to ignore pono in this nominee's character. We require it. Our opposition is not about race or gender, it is about the lack of integrity:

2023 KŪ'E PETITION: Oppose the Confirmation of Dawn Chang as Chair of DLNR

We the undersigned, oppose the Senate's confirmation of DAWN CHANG, nominee for the Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) based upon serious concerns as to the integrity of her character and ability to uphold the law.

We respectfully request Governor Green to withdraw DAWN CHANG's name and nominate a person who demonstrates (1) respect for the law; (2) awareness of Hawaiian culture; and (3) character of the highest morality and integrity.

Our opposition is based on the following record of Ms Chang's disturbing behavior:

1. Governor Green Choose a Developer's Consultant

In 2015 then Senator Josh Green said in his opposition to the DLNR Chair nominee Carleton Ching, "We need a Director of DLNR who has a proven record of fighting to protect and preserve our natural and cultural resources, not a career lobbyist for the development industry who has a record of calling for the elimination of cultural and environmental protections," Green said. "This nomination is the wrong choice for Hawai'i. and we should not move forward with it." Indeed, Dawn Chang also lacks "a proven record of fighting to protect and preserve our natural and cultural resources" and like Carleton Ching, she is "the wrong choice for Hawai'i." Dawn Chang worked for General Growth Properties, Howard Hughes, McNaughton Group, Outrigger, Sandwich Isles, Turtle Bay, and Cades Schutte. She worked on the Walmart Ke'eaumoku project. the Lāna'i big wind project, the comprehensive management plan for Mauna Kea, and rail. She is a developer's consultant. Her job has been to obtain community support for development projects. There were highly qualified candidates who demonstrated clear awareness of the law, strong personal principles and integrity for the proper stewardship of our 'āina, wai, and iwi kūpuna on the short list for the Governor's selection. He chose the candidate that has proven repeatedly that she will sell her influence to a developer.

2. Dawn Chang Advised Her Client to Circumvent the Law.

In 2005, Ms Chang advised Kawaiaha'o Church to circumvent the historic preservation law. Although the law required that the Church prepare an archaeological inventory survey, Chang used her connections as a former deputy attorney general to secure a closed-door meeting with officials at the State Historic Preservation Division. She helped persuade state officials to circumvent the law and use an expedited process. As a result, hundreds of iwi kūpuna were unlawfully removed at a cost of sixteen million dollars. The ancestral remains have not yet been reburied.

3. Mapulehu Burials (60 Individuals Disturbed)

In 1991, there was a disturbance of at least 60 burials at Mapulehu, Molokai. An investigation was conducted. As Deputy Attorney General, Ms Chang was charged with enforcing the legal protections afforded to iwi kūpuna in which violators who cause burial disturbances are held accountable via civil fines and other forms of punishment. HRS Chapter 6E-11 provides a civil fine of up to \$10,000 for burial disturbance and the minimum number of individuals disturbed at Mapulehu was 60. The maximum fine faced by the violator therefore was \$600,000. State Historic Preservation Division staffer Edward Halealoha Ayau recommended a fine of \$300,000. Chang ignored his recommendation. Rather than uphold the letter of the law to protect unmarked burial sites, Ms Chang imposed a fine equal to a single violation (\$10,000) and community service hours.

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4. Maunakea Comprehensive Management Plan

In 2009, as principal of Ku'iwalu Consulting, Ms. Chang was charged with developing the Mauna Kea Comprehensive Management Plan (CMP). Ms. Chang drafted and presented an inaccurate CMP. My name is Corianne Lau. I am a partner at the law firm Dentons US LLP (formerly known as Alston Hunt Floyd & Ing) and have been a licensed attorney in Hawai'i for 38 years. I am a former President of Hawai'i Women Lawyers and the Hawai'i Women's Legal Foundation but I submit this testimony in my individual capacity in support of Dawn Chang's nomination for Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR).

I have known Dawn for 40 years, since we were in law school. I cannot think of a more well-suited person to lead DLNR, which is such a critically important arm of the State. Dawn spent 14 years at the Department of the Attorney General as senior legal counsel in the Land/Transportation Division advising the state on real property law, administrative law, native Hawaiian rights, water rights and environmental laws. She advised State Boards and Commissions like the Land Board, Island Burial Councils, and Water Commission, and provided training to State employees and agencies on native Hawaiian rights, including PASH and burial laws. She has extensive litigation experience in ceded lands, burial laws, historic preservation laws, real property transactions, and quiet title actions.

Her work with the State is well-balanced with 21 years of private sector work as a principal at Ho`ākea LLC, dba Ku`iwalu, a woman-owned, Native Hawaiian business that specializes in strategic planning and facilitating culturally sensitive issues for public and private sector projects. She consulted on cultural resource management and historic preservation issues, including native Hawaiian burials. She gained years of experience in coordinating and managing public meetings, crisis management, and government relations, working with federal, state, and county government agencies. Dawn also conducted training in native Hawaiian rights, traditional and customary practices, and administrative processes.

As a State Land Use Commissioner for six years, Dawn ensured that areas of State concern were addressed and considered in the land use decision-making process. As a Commissioner, she worked on establishing the district boundaries for the entire State and acted on petitions for boundary changes submitted by private landowners, developers and State and county agencies. She also has experience in acting on requests for special use permits within the agricultural and rural districts. Dawn greatly impressed me with innovative solutions to hold developers accountable for promises they make for public improvements.

Above all, Dawn has the personal skills needed to succeed as the head of DLNR and a leader of a department faced with multifaceted issues. Not only is Dawn intelligent, insightful and thoughtful, but she truly seeks solutions to problems. As long as I've known her, Dawn has always looked for what unites people rather than what divides them. She knows how to bring people together and to ensure they are heard. Comments:

I am writing to urge you to not to confirm the nomination of Ms.Dawn Chang as Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR).

The basis for my opposition to this appointment is that Ms. Chang's approach to the pressing issues of our time has been too narrowly focused on meeting the needs of her corporate and organizational clients when the focus needs to be on protecting the public trust.

The context for my concerns is the kuleana of the BLNR. While I am sure that you are aware of that responsibility, a reminder is in order given the importance of the appointment being considered.

The Department of Land and Natural Resources, headed by an executive Board of Land and Natural Resources, is responsible for managing, administering, and exercising control over public lands, water resources, ocean waters, navigable streams, coastal areas (except commercial harbors), minerals, and all interests therein. The department's jurisdiction encompasses nearly 1.3 million acres of State lands, beaches, and coastal waters as well as 750 miles of coastline (the fourth longest in the country). It includes state parks; historical sites; forests and forest reserves; aquatic life and its sanctuaries; public fishing areas; boating, ocean recreation, and coastal programs; wildlife and its sanctuaries; game management areas; public hunting areas; and natural area reserves.

A summary of that kuleana is protecting the public trust.

Given this tremendous responsibility, the selection of a Chair should be guided by the highest principles. There is ample evidence that the selection of Ms. Chang does not demonstrate an adherence to that fundamental requirement.

The candidate should have demonstrated unquestionable integrity, a profound understanding of Hawaiian history and, a deep respect for the traditional Hawaiian civilization.

While Ms. Chang's work has been involved in a wide range of relevant areas, an examination of her record in those involvements discloses a bias that disqualifies her from holding the BLNR position. Ms. Chang's career is repeatedly characterized by decisions that ignore the mandates

of history in order to facilitate the colonial mindset of facilitating economic exploitation, rather than acting as a protector of Hawai'i's future. There are other questions about the fitness of Ms. Chang. Some of her actions appear to be unethical, such as advising clients on how to avoid taking legally required actions. For example, she advised Kawaiaha'o Church that its proposal to construct a multi-purpose center did not require an archeological inventory survey, which the law clearly required. Ms. Chang's advice was to ignore the legal requirement to avoid increasing the project cost.

Her advice resulted in lengthy litigation and the illegal disturbing of hundreds of burials.

One of the major issues BLNR must address is the future of Mauna Kea. On that issue, Ms. Chang was responsible for preparing a woefully inadequate comprehensive master plan. I thank you for this opportunity to provide my personal testimony in support of GM516 Submitting for consideration and confirmation as the Chairperson, Department of Land and Natural Resources, Gubernatorial Nominee, DAWN CHANG, for a term to expire 12-31-2026. I strongly support this nomination and confirmation.

I wish to start by saying that while I am a professor at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, I offer this as personal testimony and do not speak on behalf of the University.

I have worked with Dawn Chang through her facilitation of a number of public processes for our Ko'olaupoko community over the past ~20 years that I have known her. I always found her to be a consummate professional who organized, led, and facilitated a wide range of public meetings that I participated in as a community member or UH research faculty member over the years. I really got to know Dawn well when we worked closely on the designation process for the He'eia National Estuarine Research Reserve (NERR). I had the privilege of being the scientific lead for the designation and then serving as the Acting Manager for the He'eia NERR until permanent staff could be hired. Throughout the five-year designation process, I worked closely with Dawn to move through the site selection, development of the nomination package, public scoping meetings for the NEPA process, and development of the management plan. Dawn organized and facilitated numerous focus groups to develop community priorities for research, teaching, management, and outreach as well as the proposed boundary for the He'eia reserve. She consistently went above and beyond to reach out to groups that she felt should have a voice in the process and was consistently fair, open, and always willing to listen and incorporate all input that was offered.

The He'eia NERR was the first Research Reserve in the nation to be community led and explicitly focused on restoring traditional practices instead of a return to pre-human conditions. It was a constant challenge to communicate the importance of Native Hawaiian perspectives to the federal bureaucrats who ran this process, and Dawn assisted in every step of that process. As a result of that action, not only was this the first National Estuarine Research Reserve to focus on Indigenous management and cultural practices, it was also the fastest designation to complete the process in the history of the system. Dawn facilitated all the public meetings and focus groups that helped to develop the Reserve Management Plan, which seeks to remove alien invasives, replant native species, and restore cultural practices throughout the site. The major goal of the management plan is work with the site partners to restore the He'eia NERR to a functional ahupua'a and determine whether the restoration activities, by changing the land use and management practices, results in a more productive and resilient watershed where human and natural communities thrive on the 'āina momona. This was not a typical process for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) and it took considerable effort and coordination to pull it off. Dawn was outstanding throughout the process and I am not sure it would have succeeded without her.

Following on the publication of the 1992 Kāne'ohe Bay Master Plan, the Kāne'ohe Bay Regional Council was established in statute by the 1993 State Legislature. One of the recommendations in that document was the establishment of a Natural Estuarine Research Reserve in Kāne'ohe Bay, but it took until 2017 for this recommendation to come to fruition. Dawn's facilitation of that prolonged process resulted in constant input from He'eia site partners, including, Ko'olaupoko Hawaiian Civic Club, Ko'olaupoko Foundation, Paepae O He'eia, Kāko'o 'Ōiwi, and Kama'āina Kids, as well as the neighborhood boards and a wide swath of the local communities. It is testament to her skills as a facilitator that the process was completed in record time, and it is testament to her dedication and passion for cultural resource management and historic preservation that it is the only reserve in the federal system to focus on Indigenous practices. The He'eia NERR brings in Federal funding to support the efforts of local community groups to restore He'eia and to document traditional Native Hawaiian practices realized under the ahupua'a system provides a better strategy for sustainable management of 'āina momona than what has been implemented in recent history. He'eia NERR is now leading the country in being the first site to explicitly incorporate culture into the reserve design and management, and Dawn was a large part of that effort.

I believe that Dawn has the experience, aptitude and skillset to be an excellent Chairperson. She is consistently fair, open-minded, professional and passionate about this place, its people, history, culture and natural resources. In my experience she has consistently gone above and beyond the call of duty, and is deeply committed to Hawai'i, its natural resources and its people. I can think of no better candidate for the nomination for this position.

In closing, I would like to reiterate my most enthusiastic possible support for GM516 and confirmation of Dawn Chang for Chairperson to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR). I want to thank your committee for the opportunity to offer this testimony.

I am writing to urge you to not to confirm the nomination of Ms.Dawn Chang as Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR).

The basis for my opposition to this appointment is that Ms. Chang's approach to the pressing issues of our time has been too narrowly focused on meeting the needs of her corporate and organizational clients when the focus needs to be on protecting the public trust.

The context for my concerns is the kuleana of the BLNR. While I am sure that you are aware of that responsibility, a reminder is in order given the importance of the appointment being considered.

The Department of Land and Natural Resources, headed by an executive Board of Land and Natural Resources, is responsible for managing, administering, and exercising control over public lands, water resources, ocean waters, navigable streams, coastal areas (except commercial harbors), minerals, and all interests therein. The department's jurisdiction encompasses nearly 1.3 million acres of State lands, beaches, and coastal waters as well as 750 miles of coastline (the fourth longest in the country). It includes state parks; historical sites; forests and forest reserves; aquatic life and its sanctuaries; public fishing areas; boating, ocean recreation, and coastal programs; wildlife and its sanctuaries; game management areas; public hunting areas; and natural area reserves.

A summary of that kuleana is protecting the public trust.

Given this tremendous responsibility, the selection of a Chair should be guided by the highest principles. There is ample evidence that the selection of Ms. Chang does not demonstrate an adherence to that fundamental requirement.

The candidate should have demonstrated unquestionable integrity, a profound understanding of Hawaiian history and, a deep respect for the traditional Hawaiian civilization.

While Ms. Chang's work has been involved in a wide range of relevant areas, an examination of her record in those involvements discloses a bias that disqualifies her from holding the BLNR position. Ms. Chang's career is repeatedly characterized by decisions that ignore the mandates

She has come to Hawaii island, met with the livestock/ranching community, listened to their concerns, understands their need to have long term leases, so that they can invest in the infrastructure (fencing, water systems, roadways, facilities, etc.) that is required to ensure food security in our State. She is moving forward on the requirements of Act 90, even though it has languished for years.
- b. She visited the Country Club Condo project on Banyan Drive, before the decision to move forward on a long-term lease was voted on (3/24/23), so that she could see first-hand, the concerns raised by the residents of that facility and from members of our community. She was able to

obtain approval from the Board to renovate this aging facility and ensure that it is an asset to our residents, as well as the Hilo community.

- c. On the recent yacht grounding at Honolua Bay (Maui), she was there on that Sunday, along with Mayor Bissen, to monitor the salvage operations, to gain first hand knowledge that our natural resources were being protected, during this less than ideal situation.
- d. Chair Chang, due to her legal background, as well as that as a facilitator and mediator, is able to explain to the rest of us on the Board, the consequences of our decisions and how we must all focus on the best interests of the State, in how we vote on matters that come before us. When we've all heard the evidence and discussion is done, under her leadership, we are all ready and able to make those critical decisions.
- e. One of her current goals, is to bring our Board meetings out to the communities in which we serve. Her plan is to schedule off Oahu meetings, so that we decide issues that pertain to each community, in front of that community. BLNR has not typically conducted its meetings in this manner, even though the Hawaiian Homes Commission, Land Use Commission and Commission on Water Resource Management does. Her desire to be transparent and open in decision making is commendable. Each member of the Board will benefit from listening to public testimony, in person, in front of those that are impacted by the decisions we are tasked to make.
- f. Sometimes we overlook the importance of the host culture in how we conduct business in Hawaii. Chair Chang is a native Hawaiian. Her two deputies are also Hawaiian. All seven members of the Board are also part Hawaiian. Making difficult decisions, with compassion and aloha is part of our culture and is how we should all conduct ourselves. Dawn exemplifies this trait in everything she does.

For the above reasons, I wholeheartedly support Dawn Chang as Chair of the Department of Land and Natural Resources.

I'm **opposed** to Measure GM516 "Submitting for consideration and confirmation as the Chairperson, Department of Land and Natural Resources, Gubernatorial Nominee, DAWN CHANG, for a term to expire 12-31-2026."

I was witness to lack of leadership and understanding of meeting protocols for contested case during a recent BNLR meeting run by Ms. Chang who failed to look deeper into critical testimonies that contained peer reviewed studies and government documentation that lends itself to serious concerns for human health and the environment.

Under Dawn Chang's leadership as Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) Chairperson, the BLNR has violated the public's rights to open governmental processes. Complaints have been filed with the Office of the Ombudsman requesting an investigation into the BLNR for interference with the public's ability to testify at the March 10, 2023 board meeting. An investigation into the BLNR for violation of the Sunshine Law at the March 24, 2023 board meeting has also been requested through the Office of Information Practices.

These investigations are of significant concern, as it appears the BLNR has attempted to silence discussion of very serious information provided in written testimony regarding a planned project that received final approval by the BLNR on March 24, 2023. The suppressed testimony includes peer-reviewed studies about the risks of the project to the environment, native birds, wildlife, and public health. It also includes documentation of procedural errors, specific conflicts of interest, potential interstate transport of pathogens and lack of permitting, failure to receive EPA approval for use of a biopesticide prior to assuring public safety, and EPA discreditation of the article cited in the Final Environmental Assessment asserting that the biopesticide poses no risk to human health.

Additionally, live video testimony at the BLNR meetings on March 10, 2023 and March 24, 2023 noted that both BLNR Chairperson Dawn Chang and Board Member Vernon Char have conflicts of interest regarding the agenda item and must recuse themselves from participating in any discussion or voting on the matter. The BLNR, under Chang's leadership, chose not to address those conflicts of interest at the March 10, 2023 meeting. At the March 24, 2023 meeting, both Chang and Char verbally denied their conflicts of interest and continued to discuss and vote on the agenda item.

I do not feel Ms. Chang's actions qualify her in a leadership role as Chairperson. The Board of Land and Natural Resources is a government agency that makes crucial decisions affecting the lives of the people of these islands, our environment, and our wildlife. Board members, and the Chairperson in particular, **must serve with integrity and honor the laws and procedures enacted to protect the public's rights to open and fair government.**

I am writing to urge you to not to confirm the nomination of Ms.Dawn Chang as Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR).

The basis for my opposition to this appointment is that Ms. Chang's approach to the pressing issues of our time has been too narrowly focused on meeting the needs of her corporate and organizational clients when the focus needs to be on protecting the public trust.

The context for my concerns is the kuleana of the BLNR. While I am sure that you are aware of that responsibility, a reminder is in order given the importance of the appointment being considered.

The Department of Land and Natural Resources, headed by an executive Board of Land and Natural Resources, is responsible for managing, administering, and exercising control over public lands, water resources, ocean waters, navigable streams, coastal areas (except commercial harbors), minerals, and all interests therein. The department's jurisdiction encompasses nearly 1.3 million acres of State lands, beaches, and coastal waters as well as 750 miles of coastline (the fourth longest in the country). It includes state parks; historical sites; forests and forest reserves; aquatic life and its sanctuaries; public fishing areas; boating, ocean recreation, and coastal programs; wildlife and its sanctuaries; game management areas; public hunting areas; and natural area reserves.

A summary of that kuleana is protecting the public trust.

Given this tremendous responsibility, the selection of a Chair should be guided by the highest principles. There is ample evidence that the selection of Ms. Chang does not demonstrate an adherence to that fundamental requirement.

The candidate should have demonstrated unquestionable integrity, a profound understanding of Hawaiian history and, a deep respect for the traditional Hawaiian civilization.

While Ms. Chang's work has been involved in a wide range of relevant areas, an examination of her record in those involvements discloses a bias that disqualifies her from holding the BLNR position. Ms. Chang's career is repeatedly characterized by decisions that ignore the mandates of history in order to facilitate the colonial mindset of facilitating economic exploitation, rather than acting as a protector of Hawai'i's future. Her long list of corporate clients is the visible manifestation of her true professional commitments. Her company belongs in the company of businesses that prepare environmental assessments and environmental impact statements which give developers the cover of a document that says what the developer needs to justify the project at issue.

There are other questions about the fitness of Ms. Chang. Some of her actions appear to be unethical, such as advising clients on how to avoid taking legally required actions. For example, she advised Kawaiaha'o Church that its proposal to construct a multi-purpose center did not require an archeological inventory survey, which the law clearly required. Ms. Chang's advice was to ignore the legal requirement to avoid increasing the project cost.

Her advice resulted in lengthy litigation and the illegal disturbing of hundreds of burials. One of the major issues BLNR must address is the future of Mauna Kea. On that issue, Ms. Chang was responsible for preparing a woefully inadequate comprehensive master plan. Her plan was missing provisions for natural and cultural management, decommissioning, and public access. BLNR determined that the plan was deficient. The delay in approving the missing critical pieces of the plan led to delays in the CDUA for the TMT construction. The BLNR had to step in to require compliance with the law lacking in Ms. Chang's plan.

DLNR is currently plagued by weak leadership, with multiple conflicts between offices and divisions, many due to conflicting mandates. The chronic understaffing and underfunding leads to ineffectiveness and institutional frustration. The loss of institutional knowledge has led to a serious degradation of our cultural heritage.

Ms. Chang does not demonstrate the skills to address these issues, and could serve to exacerbate the problems. Ms Chang is not the right person to be confirmed as Chair. I ask you to oppose her appointment. Thank you Barbara Wiedner 1774 Puu Kaa St Kapaa Hi 96746 808 635 2593

Aloha e Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and Members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land,

I submit this testimony in SUPPORT of GM 516, appointing Dawn Chang as the Chairperson of the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) for a term to expire on December 31, 2026.

I am a partner at Carlsmith Ball LLP and the current Chair of the State Environmental Advisory Council (Council). I first became acquainted with Dawn in my capacity as an attorney practicing before the State Land Use Commission (LUC) while she served as a member of the LUC. Dawn was very professional as an LUC commissioner. Her questions and comments for the parties indicated that she carefully reviewed the materials submitted and put great thought into her consideration of the matters before the LUC. This left an impression on me both as an attorney representing clients before a volunteer commission, but also as a member of the public who serves as a volunteer on the Council. Most volunteers for state and county boards and commissions hold full time jobs outside of their civic roles, so it is greatly appreciated when a member takes the time necessary to meaningfully review pleadings, exhibits, and testimony that the parties spend so much time preparing.

Another great quality that I observed in Dawn is her ability to analyze the evidence presented before her and to make decisions based on that evidence and the criteria for the permit or approval before the LUC, rather than solely based on personal passions or pressure from outside forces. Furthermore, Dawn has the temperament to effectively lead the DLNR. She is thoughtful in her deliberations and patient when listening and speaking with others. These are qualities that will be required in her role as Chairperson of both the DLNR and the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

I have also gotten to know Dawn outside of her role as an LUC member. Last year, she invited me to speak with her and several others on a panel about the *Ka Pa'akai* case and analysis. Our preparation sessions for the panel presentation gave me an opportunity to better acquaint myself with Dawn's perspective on the role that the *Ka Pa'akai* analysis should play in state land use decisionmaking. Although Dawn and I may disagree on certain points, our interactions were respectful. She is able to work gracefully with folks who hold very different viewpoints and find common ground.

Dawn's professional and community service experience is impressive. In addition to serving as an LUC commissioner, Dawn has extensive legal experience as a former deputy attorney general practicing in the areas of law that the DLNR deals with, such as environmental law, administrative law, native Hawaiian rights, and water law. Dawn also has private sector experience as the principal of her consulting firm which focused on cultural resource management, among other things. The expertise that Dawn has obtained over the years working for the State, in the private sector, and with community and environmental groups make her a well-rounded candidate for Chairperson of the DLNR. Dawn is willing to serve the State in this capacity and is certainly qualified to do so.

For these reasons, I support GM 516 and ask that this Committee please vote in favor of confirming Dawn Chang's appointment as Chairperson of the DLNR.

Aloha Sen Inouye

Dawn Chang is Governor Josh Green's nominee to lead the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR). She would be the first native Hawaiian woman in that position and would make us proud as chairperson of the DLNR.

I know her personally and have seen how she works with people. It didn't take long to realize that her values were the same as mine. Dawn is an honorable person with the best interests of the Hawaiian people at heart, and I support her appointment one hundred percent.

I would stake my reputation on her.

Dawn Chang is an expert on land issues and regulatory requirements. She's been Deputy Attorney General for the DLNR, served on the State Land Use Commission, and worked with the Queen Lili'uokalani Children's Center. She also ranKu'iwalu, which helped communities, especially Native Hawaiian ones, ensure compliance with federal, state, and local regulations.

I asked her to tell me what she brings to the DLNR appointmentand wanted to share with you what she told me.

Dawn Chang's family and work background

My mother's last name is Ho'okano, and we come from the ahupua'a of Kahalu'u on O'ahu. I have been grounded in Hawaiian cultural values. My mother's family were lawai'a, fishermen. We also had kuleana lands. We were embroiled in 25-year litigation on our kuleana lands to get access.

Professionally, I started as a community organizer with the Queen Lili 'uokalani Children's Center. My passion was to work with the Hawaiian community for self-empowerment, but as a social worker doing community organizing in Waimanalo, I realized that there were systemic problems, whether they were housing, education, or health, that required a much broader intervention. More than social work.

I am so grateful for Chief Justice Richardson, who established UH's Richardson School of Law, because he had two missions, at least in my mind. The two missions were to provide access to affordable legal education, primarily to local residents, including native Hawaiians. Then the kuleana or responsibility was to provide access to legal services as a graduate.

She says it's a time for healing

The DLNR cannot steward 1.3 million acres by itself. We need to do that in partnership with

the community, but the community has not trusted government. In particular, native Hawaiians have felt disengaged from the public process. It's a time of healing with the community, especially the native Hawaiian community, whether it be about Mauna Kea, marine resources, or forestry lands.

What Dawn Chang wants for DLNR

I realized as deputy attorney general that many people would come before the Board of Land and Natural Resources or the Water Commission, and that's the first time they heard about a controversial project. I said, There's got to be a better way. It cannot be checking off the box and people just come to DLNR decision-making, because they're angry at that time.

So I dedicated my practice, a small consulting firm, not as a lawyer but as a consultant, to design and facilitate culturally sensitive proactive outreach plans. For example, when I did the comprehensive management plan on Mauna Kea, I met with 200 small group talk stories before we had any public meetings. I'm willing to do a lot more engagement to go out to the communities to meet with people. The community needs to feel a sense of partnership with us in the management of these public lands.

I also want to see greater coordination internally within DLNR. It's our obligation to be much more coordinated and much more transparent, and engaging with the community. We're going towork very hard to reestablish trust.

I'd also like us to spend a lot more time on education rather than just regulations and enforcement. These are sort of long-term goals, but they are some of the major initiatives I'd like us to move into.

Opposition to her nomination

I think people don't understand the roles I've played. I have taken on extremely contentious issues. My role was to design a process that first educated the client – a private client, a private developer or government agency – about the need to do more than check off the box and have a public meeting when you have an environmental assessment. It's a need to go out into the community and really talk to people, to understand their connection to this land and why they are so angry.

I really tried to create a sensitivity because, I said, somebody is going to do these meetings. And isn't it better that we have someone who comes with some cultural sensitivity and creates a safe space for a community that has been historically disenfranchised from the public process?

I think Mauna Kea and the kia'i movement have demonstrated that many in the community, particularly the Hawaiian community and younger generations, have somewhat drawn aline in the sand and said, Enough, we're not going to take it anymore. Is that constructive? It has brought a lot of issues up to the front, but in the long run, we really need to do a better job of communicating and engaging the community in meaningful ways.

So that's what I'm hoping to bring to my term, assuming I get past confirmation. There are people who oppose my confirmation, mostly, I believe, because they don't understand the role I've played. I also understand, because it comes with the territory, that the higher the risk, the

more criticism. I'm willing to do it because I think the time is right for these kinds of skillsets to work with our community towards healing.

I couldn't have more confidence in Dawn Chang and hope you will take this into consideration.

Questions for Dawn Chang

1. "Property rights" of ceded land beneficiaries (Mauna Kea) (cite Supreme Court)

A native Hawaiian practitioner whose great grandparents resided on the slope of Mauna Kea, and who today uses traditional ceremony and ritual practices for healing in the Conservation District of Mauna Kea recently requested a Contested Case Hearing regarding the Supplement to the Comprehensive Management Plan, based on her property interest in the ceded land held in trust by the State of Hawaii for native Hawaiian beneficiaries. DLNR staff submittal stated that...

""To have a property interest in a benefit, a person clearly must have more than an abstract need or desire for it. He must have more than a unilateral expectation of it. He must, instead, have a legitimate claim of entitlement to it."3 In this instance, the Petitioner cannot show a property interest in the 2022 Supplement or that the 2022 Supplement will affect any property in which the Petitioner has an interest.

The staff submittal also states that the "owner" of the land in question is the State of Hawaii.

QUESTION: What is your position regarding the rights and property interest of native Hawaiians on Crown and Government lands held in trust, and the fiduciary duties of the DLNR toward the beneficiaries? How will you assure that these rights are addressed and protected? What about DLNR's approach should be improved?

Do you believe that the State of Hawaii "owns" the land in question, or does it have a trust relationship. How would you approach the fiduciary responsibilities as a trustee?

1. Rights of Hawaiian traditional and customary practitioners (application of Ka Pa`akai ruling)

The Comprehensive Management Plan (CMP) Supplement does not address the concerns you raised in the review of the 2009 CMP review, regarding consultation with native Hawaiians. In

fact, the Supplement treats all visitors to the UH Managed Lands the same, without regard to the traditional and customary practices of native Hawaiian practitioners.

QUESTION: Would you support the development of a subplan for Mauna Kea, or the development of a management document for all the stolen lands to address the constitutional rights of native Hawaiians?

1. Enforcement and fines for violations

Peaceful protectors including local residents and kupuna with ancestral ties to land were arrested for holding a vigil in front of a road already closed by order of the governor. Their cases were dismissed after months of litigation and tremendous cost to both the state and the arrestees.

QUESTION: How do you view the rights of native Hawaiian protectors making peaceful statements regarding the lands being held in trust for their benefit? How would you recommend that DLNR handle such a case in the future?

1. Freedom of spiritual practice

Native Hawaiian practitioners constructed `ahu on Mauna Kea Lands traditional used and recognized as a heritage site and TCP. The `ahu were removed by UH personnel. They sought no advice from burial council, sought no permit to deconstruct, and made no record of the location.

QUESTION: Do you believe that a native Hawaiian spiritual practitioner should be required to have a permit to build a `ahu on lands held in trust, as set out in the Mauna Kea comprehensive management plan you wrote?

1. Climate change management

The immediate and impending effects of climate change are reflected in increased storm surges, king tides that flow into previously higher ground, and sea level rise affecting infrastructure and facilities along the shoreline. The fluctuations of temperature and rainfall are leading to intense droughts, heavy flooding, and generally warmer temperatures. These changes are affecting near-shore coastal waters and the organisms that live there, as well as birds, insects, and plants unique to Hawaii that are under challenge of extinction.

QUESTION: What steps should **DLNR** be taking to address the lands held in trust to mitigate these challenges?

1. Marine reserves and community -based management

QUESTION: Do you support community-based management of marine reserves? How should DLNR better protect the near-shore coastal fauna and coral reefs to address the rights of native Hawaiian gatherers?

1. 65 year leases along shoreline (Waiakea peninsula)

A former hotel now managed as decrepit accommodations for houseless residents has been proposed for a 65-year lease and renovation. The bottom floor, now used as a meeting area, has been inundated with wave wash repeatedly, and the building is within several feet of the shoreline. The county SMA rules would not permit new development this close to the shoreline.

QUESTION: Do you believe that a 65 year lease makes sense in the Waiakea peninsula, given sea level rise and storm surge predictions?

1. Aquarium collecting vs Hawaiian cultural gathering (West Hawaii)

Commercial aquarium collecting takes close to a million fish a year from our near shore reefs for sale to a worldwide trade. Despite marine reserves, the populations of coastal fish for subsistence gathering have declined, to the detriment of local residents and native pratitioners.

The cruel treatment of captive fish, and the high mortality of these animals is not addressed.

QUESTION: Now that West Hawaii EIS has been approved, but is subject to court challenge, would you support allowing permits for aquarium collecting to be issued by DLNR?

1. Transfer of DLNR managed land to DOA for ranching (Kapapala)

There is demand from the cattle ranching interests to transfer DLNR managed lands to the Department of Agriculture. These lands can be comprised of native forest and provide watershed services, keeping a diverse overstory of vegetation more resilient to effects of climate change. Conversion of forest lands to grassland would not provide the same ability of the land to absorb and hold rainwater, particularly when grassland is subject to invasion by invasive insects such as the two-spotted leaf hopper currently decimating grasslands on the Big Island.

QUESTION: How would you propose that DLNR evaluate these requests for transfer from DLNR management to DOA management? Would you require that public hearings be held on the island of proposed transfer?

10) Respect for `iwi and Hawaiian culture

Dawn Chang advised Kawaiaha'o Church that its proposal to construct a multi-purpose center did not require an archeological inventory survey, which the law clearly required. Ms. Chang's advice was to ignore the legal requirement to avoid increasing the project cost. Her advice resulted in lengthy litigation and the illegal disturbing of hundreds of burials.

QUESTION: How would you address the issue of `iwi protection and respect if you were chair of DLNR?

DLNR is currently plagued by weak leadership, with multiple conflicts between offices and divisions, many due to conflicting mandates. The chronic understaffing and underfunding leads to ineffectiveness and institutional frustration. The loss of institutional knowledge has led to a serious degradation of our cultural heritage.

QUESTION: What changes would you make to address DLNR's current situation?

Re: Appointment of Dawn Chang

I am writing to urge you not to confirm Dawn Chang to be Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR). I know that you will be hearing deep concerns about that appointment from many people, who consider this nomination to be a threat to protection of the natural environment and to the rights of those engaged in practicing the traditional Hawaiian faith.

The context for those concerns is the kuleana of the BLNR. While I am sure that you are aware of that responsibility, a reminder is in order given the importance of the appointment being considered.

"The Department of Land and Natural Resources, headed by an executive Board of Land and Natural Resources, is responsible for managing, administering, and exercising control over public lands, water resources, ocean waters, navigable streams, coastal areas (except commercial harbors), minerals, and all interests therein. The department's jurisdiction encompasses nearly 1.3 million acres of State lands, beaches, and coastal waters as well as 750 miles of coastline (the fourth longest in the country). It includes state parks; historical sites; forests and forest reserves; aquatic life and its sanctuaries; public fishing areas; boating, ocean recreation, and coastal programs; wildlife and its sanctuaries; game management areas; public hunting areas; and natural area reserves."

Given this tremendous responsibility, the selection of a Chair should be guided by the highest principles. There is ample evidence that the selection of Ms. Chang does not demonstrate an adherence to that fundamental requirement.

The candidate should have demonstrated unquestionable integrity, a profound understanding of Hawaiian history and, a deep respect for the traditional Hawaiian civilization.

Recently, the a majority of the BLNR denied a request for a contested case involving the Comprehensive Management Plan for Mauna Kea. In doing so, they accepted the staff's position that Native Hawaiians have no property interest in the lands in question. While Ms. Chang recused herself from the Board's discussion of the contested case request, she should be asked at this point whether she agrees with the Board's embracing this profound misunderstanding of the law and history. If so, that position would be sufficient in and or itself to disqualify her from being confirmed as Chair.

While Ms. Chang's work has been involved in a wide range of relevant areas, an examination of her record in those involvements discloses a bias that disqualifies her from holding the BLNR position. Ms. Chang's career is repeatedly characterized by decisions that ignore the mandates of history in order to facilitate the colonial mindset of facilitating economic exploitation, rather than acting as a protector of Hawai'i's future. Her long list of corporate clients is the visible manifestation of her true professional commitments. Her business belongs in the company of businesses that prepare environmental assessments and environmental impact statements which give developers the cover of a document that says what the developer needs to justify the project at issue.

There are other questions about the fitness of Ms. Chang. Some of her actions appear to be unethical, such as advising clients on how to avoid taking legally required actions. For example, she advised Kawaiaha'o Church that its proposal to construct a multi-purpose center did not require an archeological inventory survey, which the law

clearly required. Ms. Chang's advice was to ignore the legal requirement to avoid increasing the project cost.

Her advice resulted in lengthy litigation and the illegal disturbing of hundreds of burials.

One of the major issues BLNR must address is the future of Mauna Kea. On that issue, Ms. Chang was responsible for preparing a woefully inadequate comprehensive master plan. Her plan was missing provisions for natural and cultural management, decommissioning, and public access.

BLNR determined that the plan was deficient. The delay in approving the missing critical pieces of the plan led to delays in the CDUA for the TMT construction.

The BLNR had to step in to require compliance with the law lacking in Ms. Chang's plan.

The current status of the proposed Thirty Meter Telescope is a standoff. The politics of that issue are intractable. Either the telescope will be built or it will not. There really is no middle ground. The new Authority cannot change that reality.

Addressing the issue of the Mauna will require great sensitivity on the part of BLNR leadership and a Chair that is trusted by the community, particularly the Hawaiian community. Ms. Chang's record will preclude that needed trust, as her corporate bias is transparent.

There is also the potential for significant damage to the community, if there is an attempt to forcibly remove those who gather to prevent any attempt at construction. Bringing in law enforcement personnel from other islands will only make the political situation worse. There is a heightened need for a Chair that is not tainted by prior demonstrable bias. Ms. Chang is not the right person to be confirmed as Chair.

Richardson School of Law Alumni Association, Waimanalo Teen Project, Hawai'i Youth Opera Chorus, Ho'okano Family Land Trust, Planned Parenthood, and Pacific Islands Land Institute.

My name is Jun Shin. I am a recent graduate of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and a member of the Hawai'i State Youth Commission, testifying as an <u>individual</u> in **STRONG OPPOSITION** to **GM516**, Submitting for Consideration and Confirmation as the Chairperson, Department of Land and Natural Resources, Gubernatorial Nominee, Dawn Chang, for a Term to Expire 12-31-2026.

In 2015, Governor Josh Green said this about the failed nomination of development lobbyist Carleton Ching to the position of Chairperson of the Department of Land & Natural Resources while as a member of the Hawai'i State Senate, "We need a Director of DLNR who has a proven record of fighting to protect and preserve our natural and cultural resources, not a career lobbyist for the development industry who has a record of calling for the elimination of cultural and environmental protections"¹. CWRM works on important issues like groundwater contamination at Red Hill and setting standards for keeping enough water in our streams to support healthy ecosystems including native aquatic life and cultural practices like kalo farming. <u>Will the nominee be willing</u> to stand for our water and against real estate, development, and military interests, even if it <u>involves previous clients?</u>The DLNR Director also serves as the chief historic preservation officer who is in charge of, amongst other things, the protection of iwi kūpuna. This is particularly concerning given Ms. Chang's past contracts with developers who have desecrated burials at places like Kawaiaha'o Church and the Ke'eaumoku Wal-Mart.

It is true that Ms. Chang states that she will disclose any potential conflicts and will even appoint someone other than herself to the newly formed Mauna Kea Stewardship Oversight Authority². Where will the opportunities for public oversight be when she chooses a delegate? With a substantial client list of some of Hawai'i's most controversial projects, we can expect lots of disclosures, delegations and recusals. How will any work get done? The DLNR is in serious need of principled leadership that is dedicated to the public trust and willing to get to work in order to address existing conflicts as well as the issues of underfunding and understaffing that is plaguing the department.

I ask that your committee recommends that the Senate <u>NOT CONSENT</u> to the nomination of Ms. Dawn Chang to the position of Chairperson of the Department of Land & Natural Resources.

Moses K. N. Haia III's Testimony in Opposition to the Nomination of Dawn Chang as Chair of BLNR, GM 516

Chair Inouye, Vice Chair Elefante, and members of Committee on Water and Land. Aloha and mahalo for providing me with this opportunity to testify in strong opposition to the nomination of Ms. Dawn Chang as Chair of the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

On or about August 16, 2005, while a staff attorney with the Native Hawaiian Legal Corporation, Dawn Chang, through her business Ku'iwalu, recommended to the Board of Kawaiahao Church, her client at the time, that "it is very likely that known and unknown archaeological, historical and cultural resources, including native Hawaiian human burial remains will be discovered on the Project site." Using her knowledge of the system as a former deputy attorney general for the State Historic Preservation Division (hereinafter, "SHPD"), Dawn Chang warned Kawaiahao Church that it "may not be able to relocate the human remains discovered if an archaeological inventory survey (hereinafter, "AIS") of the proposed project site was performed and burials were discovered via that process. She, as such, proposed the following action, "[w]e may want to ask SHPD to reconsider" the requirement to prepare an archaeological inventory survey.

Knowing that most burials identified through an AIS would likely be preserved in place and result in some potentially devastating consequences on their project, Dawn Chang suggested they attempt to convince the SHPD to do a monitoring plan instead as any burial discovery would be considered by SHPD an inadvertent find, which could allow a quick approval to relocate those remains. Dawn Chang clearly chose to game our H.R.S. Chapter 6E system for her client by recommending they work the system to ensure a process excluding Hawaiian descendants of the burials from meaningfully participating in decisionmaking.

As the Intermediate Court of Appeals observed after reading these same emails, Dawn Chang "advised Kawaiaha'o Church that preparation of an AIS would be costly and take considerable time. In particular, the consultant advised that any human remains found during an AIS would be considered 'previously identified,' a designation that would require publication of notices and consultation with lineal and cultural descendants, involve the OIBC, and could preclude the relocation of human remains and require their preservation in place." Hall v. Department of Land and Natural Resources, 128 Hawai'i 455, 459, 290 P.3d 525, 529 (ICA 2012). The Church and SHPD violated the law. Dawn Chang's emails speak volumes. She advised her client to circumvent the law, arranging a behind closed door meeting with regulators to fast-track the project. As a former deputy attorney general, she obviously knew better. She should not be given the privilege of running the Department of Land and Natural Resources, which is charged with enforcing the law and protecting historic sites.

TO the honorable Chair, Vice Chair and Committee Members:

With apologies for tardy nature of this testimony.

I oppose the nomination of Dawn Chang to this position. While undoubtedly a woman of merit and accomplishment, it is that same accomplishment that disqualifies her for this position. Chang is not someone suited to lead an agency who's primary task is conservation because her accomplishments are in defeating conservationists.

Her actions as acting head reflect this. The most concerning item is her cancellation of the 30x30 plan for nearshore ocean conservation. This program, as reported by CivilBeat and others, was broadly supported by the public and fishermen alike. Indeed, the critique most keenly leveled in a CivilBeat article on the initiative from November 2022, A *Massive Effort To Manage Hawaii's Nearshore Waters Just Launched On Maui*, was that it was not enough. A more recent poll found 80% of voters want more conservation of near shor resources. And no wonder: near shore fish stocks have declined by as much as 50%.

Despite this acting Director Chang ended the intiative, cancelling 8 years of work, and has no plan to replace it. This is a travesty that demonstrates that despite her clear competence, her expertise is in clearing a legal path for bulldozers: not in protecting our environment.

Another concerning example of this is the recent grounding of Nakoa. While the grounding itself can hardly be blamed on acting Director Chang, and the lack of enforcement that lead to is a problem systemic to the agency, the subsequent botched removal can and revealed a lack of systematic planning. Despite the fact that any ship grounded for so long is at substantial risk of sinking, no plans were made for this. Videos on social media after the sinking showed insufficient preparation for this eventuality: deck chairs, cushions and other fixtures of the ship floated on the surface generating additional pollutants as a final insult from the entire affair. While the sinking may have been inevitable, it is clear that the DLNR--under Chang's direction--did not even consider the possibility and so did not ever direct that the ship be prepared for that eventuality.

It represents a shocking lack of foresight and basic planning on part of DLNR. The lack of basic planning going into an environmental crisis with high visibility and indeed the near invisibility of the Chang's leadership through that crisis speak to a leader who just doesn't get conservation.

I appreciate the opportunity to testify and hope that you weigh the short sighted actions of acting Director Chang appropriately in considering whether or not to accept her nomination.
