## TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL 1332 RELATING TO EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Dear Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committee:

The City and County of Honolulu ("City") Office of Climate Change, Sustainability and Resiliency ("Resilience Office") **supports** SB1332, which clarifies the scope of the Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan and increases the amount of additional funds that may be made available for the purpose of matching federal disaster relief funds.

The City, through the Department of Emergency Management and with support from the Resilience Office, manages a multi-hazard pre-disaster mitigation plan with the goal of protecting Oʻahu residents and mitigating losses. The plan coordinates City actions and policies related to hazard mitigation and incorporates mitigation goals established by the state's Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan. Changes proposed by SB1332 would clarify the scope of the state's Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan on how the state not only addresses but prepares for, mitigates against, and recovers from emergencies and disaster events. This supports a more holistic and cost-effective approach to emergency management and disaster response and recovery.

Over the past two years the City, from coordination through the Resilience Office, has initiated multiple hazard mitigation projects with federal disaster relief program funding. However, these programs often require a cost-match of between 10-25% from the affected communities. Increasing the limit of money available for the

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purpose of matching federal disaster relief funds will further support cost-effective community recovery and resilience. The Federal Emergency Management Agency has identified for every dollar of federal grant funding spent on natural hazard mitigation, an average of six dollars is saved during disaster recovery. Thus, the changes proposed by SB1332 would better enable the City to protect and promote public health, safety, and welfare before, during, and after an emergency or disaster event.
