SUBJECT: SB389 RELATING TO EQUITY

The Hawaii State Council on Developmental Disabilities **SUPPORTS SB389**, which requires all places of public accommodation and state building construction constructed after 12/31/23 to provide universal changing accommodations that are equally accessible to men and women.

Families and caregivers of people with disabilities that require changing facilities want to participate in as many activities and outings as possible. At the same time, they must plan out or research their trip or daily activities to include accessible spaces along their path of travel, taking into consideration the disability-friendly rest areas that provides a safe and dignified toileting area along a certain route.

Senate Bill 389 – Relating to Equity

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports Senate Bill 389 – Relating to Equity. This bill requires places of public accommodation and state building construction constructed after 12/31/23 to provide universal changing accommodations that are equally accessible to men and women.

Aloha Chair McKelvey and Vice Chair Gabbard:

On behalf of the Epilepsy Foundation of Hawaii (EFH), we urge your **SUPPORT** of Senate Bill 389, RELATING TO EQUITY. This bill supports providing universal changing accommodations in all places of public accommodation and state building construction construction after 12/31/23.

The Epilepsy Foundation is the leading national voluntary health organization that speaks on behalf of the at least 3.4 million Americans with epilepsy and seizures. Epilepsy Foundation of Hawaii, advocates and provides services for the almost 14,000 individuals living with epilepsy throughout Hawaii. Collectively, we foster the wellbeing of children and adults affected by seizures through research programs, educational activities, advocacy, and direct services. Epilepsy is a medical condition characterized by seizures, which are sudden surges of electrical activity in the brain, that affects a variety of mental and physical functions. Approximately 1 in 26 Americans will develop epilepsy, and approximately 1 in 10 people will experience a seizure, at some point in their lifetime.

Epilepsy is a chronic medical problem that for many people can be successfully treated. Unfortunately, treatment doesn't work for everyone. AT LEAST 1 million people in the United States have uncontrolled epilepsy, which is considered a disability by the Social Security Administration (SSA). Epilepsy does not discriminate. It can effect anyone at any age, gender, ethnicity, or size, and is often times a comorbidity with other disease states. For many, their epilepsy is debilitating.

Universal changing stations are height adjustable and support weights up to 300+ pounds, alleviating the challenge of caregivers having to navigate changing kupuna, adults and older children with disabilities either in their cars or unsafe and unsanitary spaces. Universal changing stations in state and federal buildings would estability equity and inclusion to people who need a safe and sanitary space to change incontinent supplies in order for them to ensure continuity in community engagement in public spaces.

On behalf of the Epilepsy Foundation of Hawaii and our Board of Directors, we humbly thank you for the opportunity to testify and urge your **SUPPORT for Seanate Bill 389**.

In 2016, the Bathrooms Accessible In Every Situation Act (BABIES Act) requires baby changing accommodations in both male and female restrooms in publicly-accessible federal buildings.

Since then, Arizona, California, New Hampshire, have enacted laws creating Universal Changing Stations which allows changing accommodations to also include adults in public buildings.

A person's inability to utilize conventional restroom facilities directly affects their ability to enjoy and fully participate in community based activities.

At the minimum, public restrooms should be equipped such that a person (or a caregiver) can attend to their sanitary and hygienic needs in a dignified way.

My daughter is 14 years old and has a rare and catastrophic form of epilepsy, called Dravet Syndrome. On good days she enjoys being at the mall but when she goes, she can't stay long, as she still wears diapers. She is too heavy for infant changing tables.

Many of Hawaii's restroom have family bathrooms but these restrooms do not have adequate restroom facilities for larger children and seniors who need to change their incontinent supplies. The lack of access to accommodating changing stations limits a person ability to leave home to engage and participate in every day activities such as attending school activities, doctor appointments, running everyday errands, etc.

We appreciate legislative support to bring about much needed changes to create an inclusive and safer environment for those with disabilities.
