Chairperson Gabbard and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 520. This bill establishes the farmer succession pilot program within the Department of Agriculture. Requires a report to the Legislature. Appropriates funds for the pilot program and farmer apprentice mentoring program. The Department respectfully provides comments.

The Department of Agriculture appreciates the intent of this measure. We agree that there is interest in this type of training. While we would be very pleased to participate in the creation of this program, we respectfully recommend that it be housed in the University of Hawaii's community college program which has expertise setting up vocational training programs. Education and training do not fall within any of our existing divisions.

Should this measure move to the next committee as is, in addition to the appropriation to implement the program, add a full time, permanent position under the Chairperson's office (AGR192), to direct this endeavor. We foresee this as a higher level General Professional V position, SR-24, with a budgeted salary of \$84,000.

Dear Chair Gabbard and Members of the Committee:

My name is Micah Munekata, and I am the Director of Government Affairs at Ulupono Initiative. We are a Hawai'i-focused impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life throughout the islands by helping our communities become more resilient and self-sufficient through locally produced food, renewable energy and clean transportation choices, and better management of freshwater resources.

Ulupono <u>supports</u> **SB 520**, which establishes the Farmer Succession Pilot Program within the Department of Agriculture and appropriates funds for the pilot program and the Farmer Apprentice Mentoring Program.

According to the 2017 USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) Census of Agriculture, the average age of a Hawai'i farmer was 60.1 years. Additionally, 66% of Hawai'i's 7,328 farms statewide, or 4,868 farms, are between 1–9 acres and 78%, or 5,701 farms, produce less than \$25,000 in sales.¹ This data shows that there is an aging farmer workforce that works off of extremely tight profit margins. This measure is helpful in developing the next generation of local, successful producers here in Hawai'i.

We ask the committee to consider adding in an appropriation for the GoFarm Hawai'i statewide beginning farmer training program, as this effort has proven successful in teaching young, interested farmers not just how to grow products, but also the importance of business and market development.

As Hawai'i's local food issues become increasingly complex and challenging, we appreciate this committee's efforts to look at policies that support the future of local food production.

Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,800 farm family members statewide and serves as Hawai'i's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic, and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawai'i **Farm Bureau supports SB 520,** which establishes the farmer succession pilot program within the Department of Agriculture and appropriates funds for the pilot program and farmer apprentice mentoring program.

Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers are aging. The average age of the Hawai'i farmer exceeds 60 years old, and if they were in other professions would most likely be retired. Dear AEN Committee, I hope this finds you well.

My name is Saleh Azizi Fardkhales. In 2019, I completed my dissertation on community-led policies to promote food hubs and local farmers via the department of Urban and Regional Planning at UH Manoa.

For years, I have been hearing from like-minded advocates in the food system that we need to strengthen our supports that create more farmers including strengthening the pathway for people who have worked as volunteers, interns, apprentices and farm workers. The biggest problem with food security is not that we import 90% of the food we eat, that is in my view only a consequence of the problem. The real problem is that we do not listen our communities. When I began working with the food hubs, I spent time engaged in deep listening and learning from food hub owners and the farmers they serve.

Based on my experience with Kahumana Food Hub & Organic Farms and stories shared by MA'O Organic Farms, I can confirm that what many of our prospective farmers need is a bill that provides support services for folks who have decided to be farmers and need to find land, resources, establish business plans, seek financial support etc. If we do not offer these services, prospective farmers may move to places outside of Hawai'i where these support services are already exist. I am thrilled to see that such a bill has been offered through this measure of SB520. I strongly support this bill.

From the bill language, the farm succession pilot program shall -

(1) Encourage matchmaking between incoming and outgoing farmers to ensure succession of agricultural lands and productive resources;

(2) Encourage matchmaking between recently trained farmers and available jobs in agriculture and food systems;

(3) Provide technical assistance and coordination to assist prospective farmers with access to land, finance, counseling, business planning and management, and grant writing;

(4) Continue and fund programs that provide education and training to beginning farmers and ranchers, including agricultural rehabilitation and vocational training programs; and

(5) Advancement of land partnerships such as farm incubator programs and educational programs on commercial farms that teach agricultural and business skills.
