Chairperson Gabbard and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 662. This bill appropriates funds for a capital improvement project (CIP) for the Honalo Marshalling Yard. The Department of Agriculture (DOA) supports this measure provided it does not impact the priorities set in the Governor's executive biennium budget.

The Honalo Marshalling Yard is leased by the Kona Producers Cooperative and Hawai'i Ulu Cooperative (Coop) from the DOA. The facility processes breadfruit (ulu) and secondary crops such as sweet potato. The CIP will allow the construction of improvements and enable the Coop to increase its production capacity. This will assist the State in reaching its self-sufficiency goals.

The DOA respectfully recommends the inclusion of a "Construction" cost element to SECTION 2, Item 1.A. The construction cost element is necessary to support the construction of the facility improvements and increase the production capacity of the facility.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of Senate Bill 662, relating to the Capital Improvement Project (CIP) for the Honalo Marshalling Yard. The Honalo Marshaling Yard is one of four agricultural processing and marshaling facilities managed by Hawai'i Department of Agriculture (HDOA) on Hawai'i Island. The Honalo Marshaling Yard, leased from HDOA by the Hawai'i 'Ulu Cooperative (HUC), is an example of vital food infrastructure that requires capital improvements to continue supporting local farms and strengthening our the islands' food system resilience. The HUC utilizes the Honalo Marshaling Yard as the primary aggregation, processing, storage and distribution hub for their 145 members across four islands. The facility processes over 500,000 pounds of indigenous, Hawaii-grown staple crops per year and has become the only dedicated agricultural manufacturing facility in the state committed to local staple crops. To date, they have aggregated, processed and distributed over 1.3 million pounds of locally-produced staple crops to Hawai'i communities. The HUC is a wonderful example of farmers collaborating to add value to their crops and reach larger markets, like the Department of Education, that would be otherwise unattainable for individual producers.

We thank the legislature for its 2019 appropriation of \$1.2 million via both CIP and GIA funds for infrastructure improvements at the Honalo facility to upgrade the base infrastructure (e.g., domestic wastewater and electricity) in order to bring the facility up to Hawai'i County Code. Due to COVID labor shortages and inflation, final state-approved bids were three times (3x) the estimates of both the Co-op and the State's own engineers. As a result, the initial state funds were used for the preliminary engineering report (PER), all project planning and permitting, and Phase 1 upgrades of domestic wastewater (septic) and electrical improvements needed for compliance.

Requested CIP funds under SB 662 will fill the remaining shortfall of \$1,500,000 to complete the project, which includes expansion of the commercial kitchen, construction of a temperature-controlled packing room, and upgrades to the agricultural washing and packing system. Completing the project through SB 662 will result in a 5x increase in operational capacity from 350,000 pounds to 2 million pounds of local staple crops per year, enabling the benefits of this critical infrastructure to be fully realized among state producers and consumers.

My team and I have worked with HDOA and the HUC over the past several years to collaborate around innovation and sustainable development of Hawai'i's agriculture and food sector. Both entities served as key members of the Hawai'i County's EDA Build Back Better Regional Challenge Agricultural Coalition. The HDOA's Phase 2 EDA Build Back Better Regional Challenge application was designed to complete the upgrades at the Hanalo Facility due to the funding shortfall expressed above, but unfortunately, it did not receive a Phase 2 award.

I strongly encourage the Members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environment to support SB 662. This project is a prime example of public-private collaboration that directly impacts smallholder farmers growing indigenous staples, a demographic group that is historically underserved. Food hubs also return a greater portion of each dollar of value to the farmer – far more than conventional distributors of imported food do.

The Honalo Marshaling Yard, owned by the State of Hawai'i and leased to the Hawai'i 'Ulu Cooperative, is an example of vital food infrastructure that requires capital improvements to support local farms and strengthen the islands' food system resilience. 350,00 lbs. to 2 million lbs. per year! The Ulu coop members have already planted enough trees to supply over 1 million lbs. per year, that will be maturing within the next five years.

Thanks to the legislature's 2019 appropriation of \$1.25 million via both CIP and GIA funds for infrastructure improvements at the Honalo facility, our flagship operation located in Kailua Kona, we are currently working in partnership with the Hawai'i Department of Agriculture to upgrade base infrastructure (e.g. wastewater, domestic water, electricity, etc.) in order to bring the facility up to Hawai'i County Code. Due to COVID labor shortages, final state approved bids were three times (3x) the estimates of both the Coop and the State's own engineers. The initial state funds were used for the preliminary engineering report (PER), all project planning and permitting, and phase 1 upgrades of domestic wastewater and electrical improvements needed for compliance.

The construction permitting process is already underway, and the existing budget will be adequate for compliance, but not the capacity upgrades, including expansion of commercial kitchen, temperature controlled packing room, and upgrades to the entire washing and packing system. The Hawaii Ulu Coop has gotten grants and used its own capital to increase the freezer capacity, add the flour mill, and perform other upgrades.

A shortfall of about \$1,500,000 is still needed to complete the project – which will result in a 9x increase in operational capacity from 350,000 pounds to 2 million pounds of local staple crops per year.

The CIP funds now requested through SB 662 will enable this critical infrasturcture project to be completed and the benefits of the Honalo Marshalling Yard as a food hub to be fully realized among state producers and consumers.

We commend the Senate Committee on Agriculture and the Environment for its forwardthinking approach to supporting local food and local farmers, and urge the members of Committee to support this critically important bill. We humbly mahalo the Legislature for its support of local food and local farmers for local people.

The Hawai'i **Farm Bureau supports SB 662,** which appropriates funds for a capital improvement project for the Honalō Marshalling Yard to assist the Hawai'i 'Ulu Producers Cooperative (HUPC) with increasing production and the scaling of 'ulu and other crops.

Cooperatives are needed to help achieve the State's ambitious goals for expanded local food production and agricultural development because Hawai'i's farming community is dominated by small-scale operators (about ninety-five percent of farmers generate less than \$250,000 per year) who must work together to realize economies of scale and meet local food.

The HUPC provides an important service to Hawai'i farmers by aggregating, processing, and marketing 'ulu and associated co-crops grown in diversified farming systems. The Honalō Marshaling Yard facility is owned by the State of Hawai'i and was developed over 25 years ago to support these very activities. The facility is now in gross need of public investment to enable increased production and the scaling of local food industries that have demonstrated the potential for both economic development and long-term food security and sustainability.

By 2025, HUPC anticipates handling nearly 2 million pounds per year of 'ulu and associated co-crops based on existing members' production figures, for an overall farm gate value of over \$6.5 million paid out directly to local farmers. Investing in the Honalō facility today is a worthwhile and vital investment in the capacity of Hawai'i's agricultural sector and in the ability of our islands to not only feed ourselves nutritious food but to export high-value dense crops and processed agricultural products for revenue growth and job creation.
