**Bill No. and Title:** Senate Bill No. 990, Relating to Traffic Infractions.

# Testimony of Matson Navigation Company, Inc. Comments on SB990 Before the Committee on Transportation and Culture and the Arts January 31, 2023

Dear Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye, and Members of the Committee:

Matson Navigation Company, Inc. (Matson) appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on SB990, which establishes a task force to examine whether the Finnish tired traffic fines system could be implemented in Hawaii. The Finnish system imposes fines based on the defendant's income, with higher incomes resulting in higher fines.

As an island state, Hawaii is very dependent upon our commercial harbors and commercial truckers to ensure the continued and unimpeded flow of cargo in and out of our State. It is estimated that over 90 percent Hawaii's imported goods pass through our commercial harbors, including consumer goods, motor vehicles, construction materials, and fuel. Given the critical role of our commercial harbors, it is imperative that the State support dependable and efficient cargo transportation and handling to service our residents and businesses.

Matson appreciates the intent of this measure. If your Committee passes this measure, Matson respectfully requests that a representative of the commercial shipping industry and a representative of the commercial trucking industry be included on the task force.
