Chair Lee, Vice Chair Inouye and Members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to testify on S.C.R. 148 / S.R. 144.

The Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) stands in Strong

Support on H.C.R. 132 and H.R. 133 and offers the following comments:

- 1. The State Archives, in its role as the Keepers of Public Memory, protects and preserves the documentary heritage of Hawai'i from 1790 to current and is well versed in the history of Hawai'i with professional historians on staff.
- 2. Since the formation of the Archives in 1905, thousands of artifacts were transferred by the Territory to the Archives for safe keeping. In effect, the Archives has served

as a museum of Hawaiian History without display space necessary to share these artifacts with the public. Even with the over 260 objects on loan to Iolani Place and 80 objects on loan to Washington Place, the Archives preserves a number of historically significant pieces worthy of display and capable of educating the public regarding the history of Hawai'i.

3. Given the vested interest DAGS continues to have in seeing a Hawaiian History Museum established within the Capitol District, the State Archivist is appreciative of the generous appointment to the Task Force and looks forward to working with The State Foundation on Cultural and the Arts and the other members of the task force toward the establishment of just such a museum.
