
RELATING TO LOBBYISTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that contributions made SECTION 1. 2 during legislative sessions, including extended sessions or 3 special sessions, can create the perception that the 4 contribution is, or is intended, to influence decisions being 5 taken on pending legislation. The legislature's passage of Act 6 283, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, to prohibit elected state and 7 county officials from holding fundraisers during regular and 8 special sessions of the state legislature is one approach to restoring confidence in Hawai'i's legislative process. 9

10 The legislature further finds that a number of states 11 restrict or prohibit contributions from lobbyists during 12 legislative sessions. According to the National Conference of 13 State Legislatures, at least thirteen states have enacted such 14 laws. Some extend the window where contributions cannot be made by lobbyists to the period when legislation from the regular 15 16 session is awaiting gubernatorial action (Arizona and Colorado), 17 a set period following the adjournment of a session (Iowa and Oklahoma), and to only allowing contributions during the 18 2023-2904 SB1493 CD1 SMA.docx 1

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1	expenditures to or on behalf of an elected official, candidate,
2	candidate committee, or any other individual required to file an
3	organizational report pursuant to section 11-321. No elected
4	official, candidate, candidate committee, or other individual
5	required to file an organizational report pursuant to section
6	11-321 shall accept, or agree to accept at a later time, any
7	contribution from a lobbyist during the specified period under
8	this subsection. Any contribution prohibited by this subsection
9	shall escheat to the Hawaii election campaign fund.
10	(b) For the purposes of this section:
11	"Elected official" has the same meaning as in section
12	<u>11-342.</u>
13	"Lobbyist" means any person actively registered as a
14	lobbyist with a state or county ethics board or commission."
15	SECTION 3. Section 97-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended to read as follows:
17	"[{]§97-5[}] Restricted activities. (a) No lobbyist
18	shall accept or agree to accept any payment in any way
19	contingent upon the defeat, enactment, or outcome of any
20	proposed legislative or administrative action. During any
21	regular session or special session of the state legislature,

1	including any extension of any regular session or special
2	session and any legislative recess days, holidays, and weekends,
3	and for five calendar days before and after a session, no
4	lobbyist shall make, or promise to make at a later time, any
5	contributions or expenditures to or on behalf of an elected
6	official, candidate, candidate committee, or any other
7	individual required to file an organizational report pursuant to
8	section 11-321.
9	(b) For the purposes of this section, "elected official"
10	has the same meaning as in section 11-342."
11	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
