A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EMERGENCY MEDICAL RESPONSE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I			
2	SECTION 1. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of			
3	the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,			
4	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the			
5	appropriations contained in H.B. No. 300, H.D. 1, S.D. 1,			
6	C.D. 1, and this Act will cause the state general fund			
7	expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2023-2024 to be exceeded by			
8	\$1,064,267,367 or 11.0 per cent. This current declaration takes			
9	into account general fund appropriations authorized for fiscal			
10	year 2023-2024 in H.B. No. 300, H.D. 1, S.D. 1, C.D. 1, and this			
11	Act only. The reasons for exceeding the general fund			
12	expenditure ceiling are that:			
13	(1) The appropriations made in this Act are necessary to			
14	serve the public interest; and			
15	(2) The appropriations made in this Act meet the needs			
16	addressed by this Act.			
17	SECTION 2. The legislature finds that in critical medical

- 2 some types of emergencies. Whether it is a student choking or a
- 3 teacher experiencing cardiac arrest, help provided within four
- 4 minutes, rather than eight minutes, can save a life.
- 5 The legislature further finds that while the department of
- 6 education currently has basic emergency response guidance, there
- 7 is a gap between the guidance provided to "administer first aid"
- 8 and the training and preparedness of personnel in the case of an
- 9 unforeseen critical medical emergency.
- 10 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 11 (1) Establish within the department of education, a one-
- 12 year critical emergency response pilot program to
- establish a critical emergency response team for each
- department school located in central Oahu selected by
- 15 the department of education to participate in the
- pilot program;

8	SECT	ION 3. (a) There is established within the department
9	of educat	ion, a one-year critical emergency response pilot
10	program to establish a critical emergency response team for each	
11	departmen	t school located in central Oahu selected by the
12	departmen	t of education to participate in the pilot program.
13	(b)	The critical emergency response team for each
14	department	t school participating in the pilot program shall
15	consist of	f critical emergency response team members, each of
16	whom shall	1:
17	(1)	Maintain active certifications in first aid,
18		cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and automated external
19		defibrillator from organizations approved by the
20		department; provided that any certification more than

1	two years old shall not be valid for purposes of this

19	in immediate danger of loss of life, including from cardiac
20	arrest, choking, or uncontrolled bleeding.

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1	"First aid" means lifesaving help given in a critical			
2	emergency, including providing abdominal thrusts when someone is			
3	choking, performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation when someone			
4	is unconscious and does not have a pulse, or applying pressure			
5	or a tourniquet in an uncontrolled bleeding.			
6	SECTION 4. The department of education shall submit a			
7	report of its findings and recommendations, including any			
8	proposed legislation, for the critical emergency response pilot			
9	program to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to			
10	the convening of the regular session of 2024. The report shall			
11	include the department of education's recommendations as to			
12	whether the pilot program should be extended or expanded to			
13	include all department schools within the State.			
14	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general			
15	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$350,000 or so much			
16	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 for the			
17	department of education to implement the critical emergency			
18	response pilot program established pursuant to this part.			
19	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of			
20	education for the purposes of this part.

1	SECTION 6. (a) There is established within the state
2	public charter school commission, a one-year critical emergency
3	response pilot program to establish critical emergency response
4	teams for certain public charter schools within the State. The
5	state public charter school commission shall select the public
6	charter schools that shall participate in the pilot program.
7	(b) The critical emergency response team for each public
8	charter school participating in the pilot program shall consist
9	of critical emergency response team members, each of whom shall
10	(1) Maintain active certifications in first aid,
11	cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and automated external
12	defibrillator from organizations approved by the
13	department; provided that any certification more than
14	two years old shall not be valid for purposes of this
15	paragraph; and
16	(2) Respond in good faith when activated.
17	(c) Any person who acts in accordance with the
18	requirements of this part shall be immune from any civil or
19	criminal liability arising from these acts, except where the
20	person's conduct would constitute gross negligence, willful and
21	wanton misconduct, or intentional misconduct.

1	(d)	Each public charter school participating in the pilot	
2	program shall:

5		emergency response team members; and

11	in immediate danger of loss of life, including from cardiac		
12	arrest, choking, or uncontrolled bleeding.		
13	"Fir	st aid" means lifesaving help given in a critical	
14	emergency	, including providing abdominal thrusts when someone is	
15	choking, performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation when someone		
16	is unconscious and does not have a pulse, or applying pressure		
17	or a tour	niquet in an uncontrolled bleeding.	
18	SECT	ION 7. The state public charter school commission	
19	shall sub	mit a report of its findings and recommendations,	
20	including	any proposed legislation, for the critical emergency	

response pilot program to the legislature no later than twenty

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- 1 days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024. The
- 2 report shall include the state public charter school
- 3 commission's recommendations as to whether the pilot program
- 4 should be extended or expanded to include all public charter
- 5 schools within the State.
- 6 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$150,000 or so much
- 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 for the
- 9 state public charter school commission to implement the critical
- 10 emergency response pilot program established pursuant to this
- 11 part.
- 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the state public
- 13 charter school commission for the purposes of this part.
- 14 PART IV
- 15 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
