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S.B. NO. ¹⁰²² H.D. 1

RELATING TO THE EARLY LEARNING BOARD.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 302L, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 "§302L- Early learning board; qualifications; 5 administration priorities. (a) Upon the nomination of any voting member to the board established pursuant to section 6 7 302L-1.6, the governor shall provide written documentation articulating the administration's goals and priorities with 8 9 respect to the formation of a highly-functioning, well-balanced 10 board and describing the nominee's qualifications. 11 (b) Each nominee shall meet the following minimum 12 qualifications: 13 (1)Demonstrate integrity, civic virtue, and high ethical 14 standards and be willing to hold fellow board members 15 to the same; 16 (2) Commit to being a conscientious and attentive board 17 member;

14	their designees, the members of the board shall serve staggered
15	terms as follows:

10	(3)	Three voting members shall serve three-year terms;
11	provided	that the term of the voting members shall be three
12	years, ex	cept as provided for in the initial appointment in this
13	subsectio	n; provided further that voting members shall serve no
14	more than	three consecutive three-year terms; provided further
15	that the	voting members who are initially appointed to terms of
16	two years	or less pursuant to this subsection may be reappointed

Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 15 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval; 16 provided that the amendments made to section 302L-1.6, Hawaii 17 Revised Statutes, shall not be repealed when that section is 18 reenacted on June 30, 2025, pursuant to Act 173, Session Laws of 19 Hawaii 2021, section 3, as amended by Act 109, Session Laws of 20 Hawaii 2022, section 14.
