A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE NEIGHBOR ISLANDS BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED SERVICE PILOT PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that thousands of Hawaii
- 2 residents have visual disabilities that hamper daily living and
- 3 may lead to isolation, limited productivity, loss of
- 4 independence, and lack of social integration. The department of
- 5 human services estimates that there are twelve thousand Hawaii
- 6 residents who are blind or have a significant visual impairment,
- 7 many of whom live on Oahu where access to opportunities and
- 8 services are better organized and readily available compared to
- 9 the neighbor islands.
- 10 The legislature further finds that state and local support
- 11 services for blind or visually impaired individuals, including
- 12 training, adjustment to blindness services, and transportation
- 13 services, are provided through economies of scale, and therefore
- 14 tend to benefit residents in populated areas as compared to
- 15 those in sparsely populated areas. As such, approximately two
- 16 thousand neighbor island residents who are blind or visually

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1	impaired are i	ert with the choice of either moving to dand of
2	living without	the opportunity to have full and integrated lives
3	in their exist	ing communities.
4	According	ly, the legislature finds that there is a need for
5	a supplemental	service program that provides additional support
6	services to bl	ind and visually impaired individuals residing on
7	neighbor islan	ds.
8	The purpo	se of this Act is to:
9	(1) Requ	ire the department of human services to:
10	(A)	Establish a neighbor islands blind and visually
11		impaired service pilot program that supplements
12		existing statewide services by providing training
13		and other services to neighbor island residents
14		who are blind or visually impaired;
15	(B)	Establish a neighbor islands blind and visually
16		impaired service pilot program working group to
17		develop a pilot program implementation plan and
18		submit the plan to the legislature before the
19		regular session of 2024; and
20	(C)	Submit a report on the neighbor islands blind and
21		visually impaired service pilot program to the

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1	legislature prior to the regular session of 2029
2	and
3	(2) Appropriate funds for the establishment and operation
4	of the neighbor islands blind and visually impaired
5	service pilot program and working group.
6	SECTION 2. (a) The department shall establish a neighbor
7	islands blind and visually impaired service pilot program to
8	provide training and other services to blind and visually
9	impaired individuals residing on the neighbor islands.
10	(b) The pilot program shall provide peer-to-peer outreach
11	sight loss adjustment, peer counseling support, and mobility
12	training to program participants, including:
13	(1) Outreach efforts to identify individual and program
14	needs;
15	(2) Coordination with existing programs to ensure that
16	existing services are identified and used to the
17	maximum extent possible;
18	(3) Adjustment services, including individual and group
19	counseling;

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1	(4)	Access to and training for use of telecommunications
2		services to receive current news, weather alerts, and
3		other vital public information;
4	(5)	Awareness development and training for the use of
5		computers, smart phones, and other communications
6		devices;
7	(6)	Daily living, self-care, and home management skills;
8	(7)	Orientation and mobility training;
9	(8)	Advocacy training and assistance to secure needed
10		benefits, services, and individual rights; and
- 11	(9)	Other services, including peer support needed for
12		program participants to sustain independence and
13		social integration.
14	The services provided by the pilot program pursuant to this	
15	subsection shall be provided by volunteers, who shall be	
16	recruited, assigned, and supervised by the department or an	
17	entity contracted by the department to organize and implement	
18	the pilot	program. All volunteers shall have the necessary
19	qualifica	tions, be chosen based on experience and training, and
20	use train	ing methods consistent with the structured discovery
21	approach	used by the new visions program operated by the Ho'opon

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- 1 services for the blind branch within the department's division'
- 2 of vocational rehabilitation.
- 3 (c) The pilot program shall also provide program
- 4 participants with special needs transportation assistance. The
- 5 department shall work with neighbor island transportation
- 6 service providers and other individuals and entities to develop
- 7 a special needs transportation assistance service network to
- 8 serve program participants.
- 9 (d) Applications for participation in the pilot program
- 10 shall be submitted on a form furnished by the department. The
- 11 department shall establish procedures and requirements for
- 12 accepting program participants.
- 13 (e) The pilot program shall be authorized to extend and
- 14 supplement the existing services provided by the Ho'opono
- 15 services for the blind branch.
- (f) The department shall enter into a contract with a
- 17 nonprofit organization to recruit, train, and supervise
- 18 volunteer service corps members and oversee the pilot program;
- 19 provided that existing department personnel may be assigned to
- 20 fulfill administrative and fiscal responsibilities of the pilot
- 21 program. Any contract entered into pursuant to this subsection

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1	shall be	exempt from chapters 103D and 103F. Any nonprofit
2	organizat	ion contracted under this subsection shall have:
3	(1)	The knowledge, experience, and qualifications
4		necessary to provide peer support services to program
5		participants;
6	(2)	A management team, consisting of officers and
7		directors, of whom a majority are blind or visually
8		impaired; and
9	(3)	Membership chapters or organization subunits located
10		on the neighbor islands that will be served by the
11		pilot program.
12	(g)	The department shall establish a neighbor islands
13	blind and	visually impaired service pilot program working group
14	composed	of neighbor island residents who are blind or visually
15	impaired	to make recommendations regarding the establishment and
16	implementation of the pilot program. The department, in	
17	collaboration with the working group, shall develop a written	
18	implementation plan that includes a pilot program performance	
19	period an	nd program budget, and shall submit the plan, including
20	any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than	
21	twentv da	evs prior to the convening of the regular session of

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- 1 2024. The working group shall be exempt from the requirements
- 2 of part I of chapter 92, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- 3 (h) The department shall submit a report of its findings
- 4 and recommendations pertaining to the neighbor islands blind and
- 5 visually impaired service pilot program to the legislature no
- 6 later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular
- 7 session of 2029. The report shall include:
- 8 (1) A record of pilot program activities and
- 9 accomplishments;
- 10 (2) A recommendation on whether to extend the pilot
- 11 program; and
- 12 (3) Any proposed legislation.
- 13 (i) The department shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter
- 14 91, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and prescribe forms necessary to
- 15 carry out the purposes of this Act.
- 16 (j) The pilot program shall begin no later than January 1,
- 17 2024, and shall cease to exist on July 30, 2029.
- 18 (k) For purposes of this section:
- "Department" means the department of human services.
- 20 "Neighbor island" means a county with a population less
- 21 than five hundred thousand.

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- 1 "Pilot program" means the neighbor islands blind and
- 2 visually impaired service pilot program established pursuant to
- 3 this Act.
- 4 "Program participant" means a resident of a neighbor island
- 5 whose mobility or ability to live independently is substantially
- 6 limited due to loss of sight and who is participating in the
- 7 neighbor islands blind and visually impaired service pilot
- 8 program.
- 9 "Special needs transportation" means transportation
- 10 provided to program participants at times or for trips when
- 11 public transportation is not a reasonable option.
- 12 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$93,000 or so much
- 14 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 to fund
- 15 the establishment and operation of the neighbor islands blind
- 16 and visually impaired service pilot program and working group,
- 17 including the contracting of services to coordinate the
- 18 convening of the working group and implementation of the pilot
- 19 program; provided that:

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1	(1) The department of human services shall include funding		
2	for the pilot program in its regular budget request		
3	submitted in 2024; and		
4	(2) Any funds appropriated pursuant to this section shall		
5	be in addition to and shall not supplant any portion		
6	of the base budget for any state or county agency		
7	providing services for blind or visually impaired		
8	persons.		
9	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of		
10	human services for the purposes of this Act.		
11	SECTION 4. In accordance with section 9 of article VII of		
12	the Hawaii State Constitution and sections 37-91 and 37-93,		
13	Hawaii Revised Statutes, the legislature has determined that the		
14	appropriations contained in H.B. No. 300, H.D. 1, S.D. 1,		
15	C.D. 1, will cause the state general fund expenditure ceiling		
16	for fiscal year 2023-2024 to be exceeded by \$1,063,767,367 or		
17	10 per cent. In addition, the appropriations contained in this		
18	Act will cause the general fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal		
19	year 2023-2024 to be further exceeded by \$93,000 or 1 per cent.		
20	The combined total amount of general fund appropriations		
21	contained in only these two Acts will cause the state general		

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- 1 fund expenditure ceiling for fiscal year 2023-2024 to be
- 2 exceeded by \$1,063,860,367 or 11 per cent. The reasons for
- 3 exceeding the general fund expenditure ceiling are that:
- 4 (1) The appropriation made in this Act is necessary to
- 5 serve the public interest; and
- 6 (2) The appropriation made in this Act meets the needs
- 7 addressed by this Act.
- 8 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023, and
- 9 shall be repealed on June 30, 2029.
