A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that books and other
- 2 instructional materials are needed in alternate accessible
- ${f 3}$ formats for use by elementary and secondary school students who
- 4 are unable to use print as their primary learning media. The
- 5 Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004,
- 6 P.L. 108-446, made important changes to the law, including the
- 7 establishment of the National Instructional Materials
- 8 Accessibility Standard and the National Instructional Materials
- 9 Access Center, which serves as a central repository for files
- 10 formatted in accordance with the National Instructional
- 11 Materials Accessibility Standard and as a conduit for the
- 12 distribution of those files to schools.
- 13 The legislature further finds that existing state law
- 14 pertaining to instructional materials for exceptional children
- 15 directs publishers to meet requirements that are now out of date
- 16 and undesirable due to advances in technology. Thus, a revision
- 17 is necessary to harmonize existing state law with the existing

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- 1 federal law and practice, including technological advancements
- 2 that make more instructional materials available in appropriate
- 3 accessible formats.
- 4 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 5 (1) Provide for the timely availability of accessible
- **6** instructional materials and technology for eliqible
- 7 students; and
- **8** (2) Ensure that such materials are distributed to eliqible
- 9 students in accordance with the Individuals with
- 10 Disabilities Education Act, as amended, and the
- 11 Copyright Act of 1976, as amended.
- 12 SECTION 2. Section 302A-442.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended to read as follows:
- 14 "\$302A-442.5 Instructional materials; exceptional
- 15 children. (a) Whenever used in this section, unless a
- 16 different meaning clearly appears from the context:
- 17 "Accessible format" has the same meaning as in section
- 18 121(d)(1) of the Copyright Act of 1976 (17 U.S.C. 121(d)(1)), as
- 19 amended.
- 20 "Accessible instructional materials" means print
- 21 instructional materials provided to eligible students in the

13	(1)	Is eligible for services under the Individuals with	
14		Disabilities Education Act, as amended;	
15	(2)	Is approved as an eligible person, as defined in	
16		section 121(d)(3) of the Copyright Act of 1976	
17		(17 U.S.C. 121(d)(3)), as amended; and	
18	<u>(3)</u>	Attends a department school, a private school under	
19		chapter 302C, a public charter school under chapter	
20		302D, or an approved alternative education program	
21		under section 302A-1132(a)(5).	

1	"National Instructional Materials Access Center" means the
2	center established pursuant to section 674(e) of the Individuals
3	with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C. 1474(e)), as amended.
4	"National Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard"
5	has the same meaning as in section 674(e)(3)(B) of the
6	Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 U.S.C.
7	1474(e)(3)(B)), as amended.
8	"Print instructional materials" means printed textbooks and
9	related printed core materials that are written and published
10	primarily for use in elementary school and secondary school
11	instruction by students in the classroom, including:
12	(1) Digital instructional materials obtained in an
13	appropriate accessible format for an eligible student;
14	<u>or</u>
15	(2) Materials that can be provided by the National
16	Instructional Materials Access Center in a valid
17	National Instructional Materials Accessibility format.
18	"Technology mediated instruction" means learning that is
19	aided or entirely accomplished through the use of computer-based
20	technology.

1	(b) [All publishers of textbooks and instructional
2	materials sold to the State or any public school shall furnish
3	computer diskettes for literary subjects in the American
4	Standard Code for Information Interchange from which braille
5	versions can be produced. Publishers shall also furnish
6	computer diskettes in American Standard Code for Information
7	Interchange for nonliterary subjects including natural sciences,
8	computer science, mathematics, and music when braille specialty
9	code translation software is available.] In accordance with
10	section 612(a)(23) of the Individuals with Disabilities
11	Education Act (20 U.S.C. 1412(a)(23)), as amended, the State
12	adopts the United States Secretary of Education's National
13	Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard as in effect on
14	the effective date of Act , Session Laws of Hawaii 2023, and
15	as may be subsequently revised. The department shall coordinate
16	with the National Instructional Materials Access Center to
17	obtain the benefits of this service.
18	(c) [This section shall not apply to publishers of
19	textbooks and instructional materials written in the Hawaiian
20	language.] The department, as part of any print instructional
21	materials adoption process, procurement contract, or other

1	practice	or instrument used for purchase of print instructional
2	materials	, including digital materials, shall obtain
3	instructi	onal materials from the publisher or other source that
4	are in, o	r can be rendered in, the appropriate accessible format
5	for the e	ligible student using the instructional material;
6	provided	that:
7	(1)	If the needed instructional materials cannot be
8		obtained in the eligible student's appropriate
9		accessible format, the department may enter into a
10		written contract with the publisher of the print
11		instructional materials to require the publisher to
12		prepare and, on or before delivery of the print
13		instructional materials, provide to the National
14		Instructional Materials Access Center electronic files
15		containing the contents of the print instructional
16		materials using the National Instructional Materials
17		Accessibility Standard; or
18	(2)	If the needed instructional materials cannot be
19		obtained in the eligible student's appropriate
20		accessible format due to being new or innovative
21		start-up instructional materials or a Hawaii-based

1	publisher, the department may purchase materials as a
2	pilot for up to one calendar year.
3	(d) The department shall obtain accessible instructional
4	materials for eligible students attending any department school
5	and, to the maximum extent allowed, assist any private school
6	under chapter 302C, public charter school under chapter 302D, or
7	eligible student enrolled in an approved alternative education
8	program pursuant to section 302A-1132(a)(5), to obtain
9	instructional materials in accessible formats when the
10	department receives a request from the school or program;
11	provided that the department shall not be liable for the expense
12	of any instructional materials obtained other than the expense
13	for instructional materials obtained for eligible students
14	attending department schools.
15	(e) Each eligible student shall receive accessible
16	instructional materials without regard to whether the accessible
17	instructional materials have been purchased in accordance with
18	subsection (c). Eligible students shall receive accessible
19	instructional materials at the same time the corresponding print
20	instructional materials are provided to all other students in
21	the classroom, including any assistive technology device and

1	assistive	tech	nology service to be provided in advance and
2	needed fo	r the	eligible student to use the accessible
3	instructi	onal	materials.
4	<u>(f)</u>	Tech	nology shall be provided to each eligible student
5	receiving	tech	nology mediated instruction, including any
6	assistive	tech	nology device and assistive technology service
7	needed fo	r the	technology to be accessible to and usable by the
8	eligible	stude	nt.
9	(g)	The	individualized education program for an eligible
10	student s	hall:	
11	(1)	Cont	ain information sufficient to document approval of
12		the	student as an eligible person, as defined in
13		sect	ion 121(d)(3) of the Copyright Act of 1976
14		(17	U.S.C. 121(d)(3)), as amended;
15	(2)	Iden	tify:
16		<u>(A)</u>	The print instructional materials to be used by
17			the students without disabilities;
18		(B)	All accessible formats of the instructional
19			materials; and
20		<u>(C)</u>	The services and instruction to be provided to
21			convert the print instructional materials into

1		accessible instructional materials and enable the
2		eligible student to use the instructional
3		materials in one or more accessible formats
4		usable by the eligible student;
5	(3)	Specify the supplementary aids and services the
6		individualized education program reasonably
7		anticipates the eligible student will need to receive
8		for the duration of the individualized education
9		program for reasonable access to classroom materials
10		and media not identified in paragraph (2)(A);
11	(4)	If the eligible student is blind and receiving
12		instruction in braille or the use of braille, ensure
13		that instructional materials are provided in braille
14		and may be used by the eligible student in addition to
15		other accessible formats available;
16	(5)	List any assistive technology device and assistive
17		technology service needed for the eligible student to
18		use accessible instructional materials and technology
19		mediated instruction, including timely and appropriate
20		instruction to enable the eligible student to use the

1		technology to access age-appropriate content
2		independently;
3	(6)	Ensure that any assistive technology device or
4		assistive technology service used for accessible
5		instructional materials is available for use by the
6		eligible student in school, at home, and in other
7		settings to the same extent that print instructional
8		materials are available to other students; and
9	(7)	Identify and provide technology to be used by an
10		eligible student when receiving technology mediated
11		instruction, including any assistive technology device
12		and assistive technology service needed for the
13		technology to be accessible to and usable by the
14		eligible student."
15	SECT	ION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECT	ION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
