A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that facilities funding
- 2 has been a long-standing issue for charter schools nationally
- 3 and locally. In Hawaii, start-up charter schools have paid for
- 4 the costs of their facilities from operational funds. However,
- 5 section 302D-29, Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides that the
- 6 legislature can make appropriations to and authorize bonds for
- 7 the state public charter school commission for public charter
- 8 school improvements to address issues of health, safety, and
- 9 legal compliance; expand or improve instructional space; provide
- 10 for food services; or provide restroom facilities.
- 11 Additionally, Act 234, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015,
- 12 authorized a framework for providing facilities funding and
- 13 support for public charter school facilities with adequate
- 14 prioritization, oversight, and accountability by the charter
- 15 school facilities funding working group.
- On March 11, 2019, the charter school facilities funding
- 17 working group issued its report providing the framework and

3	(1)	The needs of the charter school, overall benefit to
4		the surrounding community, amount of risk and
5		availability of recourse to the State, and whether a
6		particular charter school received facilities funding
7		through other state funding, including grants-in-aid
8		or a separate appropriation;
9	(2)	The existence of substandard facilities; the need to
10		address providing equity and adequacy as well as
11		issues of health, safety, and legal compliance;
12	(3)	Whether a school's facilities are located on state
13		property or under an agreement whereby the State
14		controls the property with at least twenty years
15		remaining;
16	(4)	Benefits to the surrounding community, including:
17		(A) Relieving overcrowding in district schools caused
18		by an increasing student population;
19		(B) Providing families an option when schools in
20		their district are low performing; and

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1	(C)	Requiring schools to provide a clear statement of	
2		public need along with policies and guidelines	
3		for public use if requesting funds for a new	
4		building or renovating an existing space,	
5		including cafeterias, libraries, or auditoriums,	
6		that would be made available to the public;	
7	(5) Titl	e I schools; and	
8	(6) Faci	lities to be built or repaired meet requirements	
9	for	or have been issued building permits and comply	
10	with	county laws.	
11	The legis	lature further finds that public charter schools	
12	receive inadeq	uate funding to support student learning and that	
13	more funding f	or charter school facilities needs to be made.	
14	Public charter schools that lack adequate building facilities		
15	are sometimes forced to hold classes outdoors, on covered		
16	lanais, or in unstable temporary structures and need sufficient		
17	funding to address these inadequacies.		
18	The purpo	se of this Act is to provide funding to the state	
19	public charter	school commission for distribution to public	
20	charter school	s, based on the distribution methodology	
21	determined by	the charter school facilities funding working	

- 1 group report, for infrastructure costs, the rental or lease of
- 2 charter school facilities, and the repair and maintenance of
- 3 network infrastructure for charter schools.
- 4 SECTION 2. Section 302D-29.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 5 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- 6 "(a) Beginning with the $[\frac{2016-2017}{2016-2017}]$ 2023-2024 fiscal year,
- 7 and each fiscal year thereafter, the legislature shall consider
- 8 making an appropriation and bond authorization to the commission
- 9 for the design, planning, construction, repair, and maintenance
- 10 of public charter school improvements to address issues of
- 11 health, safety, and legal compliance; expand or improve
- 12 instructional space; provide for rental or lease of facilities;
- 13 provide for food services; or provide restroom facilities. The
- 14 appropriation and bond authorization for charter schools shall
- 15 be separate from, and in addition to, any appropriation made to
- 16 charter schools pursuant to [this section and] section 302D-28.
- 17 These amounts shall be prioritized for allocation by the charter
- 18 school facilities funding working group."
- 19 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 20 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 21 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and

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- 1 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 2 year 2024-2025 for the state public charter school commission to
- 3 allocate to charter schools, based on the distribution
- 4 methodology determined by the charter school facilities funding
- 5 working group, for infrastructure costs, lease or rent
- 6 assistance based in part on the need and financial performance
- 7 of the charter schools, and repair and maintenance of network
- 8 infrastructure.
- 9 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the state public
- 10 charter school commission for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.

Charter Schools; Facilities Funding; Infrastructure; Appropriation

Description:

Provides funding for rental or lease of facilities under legislative appropriations and bond authorizations to the state public charter school commission for the design, planning, construction, repair, and maintenance of public charter school improvements. Appropriates general funds for infrastructure costs, rental or lease assistance, and the repair and maintenance of network infrastructure for charter schools. Effective 6/30/3000. (HD1)

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
