A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PRESCRIPTION DRUGS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that prescription drugs
- 2 may not be dispensed unless the label of the container
- 3 identifies the drug prescribed and provides other specific
- 4 information that is considered essential for public health and
- 5 safety. Nonetheless, individuals may often have difficulty
- 6 reading the labels on the prescription drug containers due to
- 7 age or disability, including persons with low vision or
- 8 blindness. Difficulty in reading the labels on prescription
- 9 drug containers may affect as many as sixty thousand residents
- 10 in the State. The legislature further finds that certain
- 11 technologies provide the prescription drug label information in
- 12 alternate formats that are more accessible to persons who have
- 13 difficulty seeing or reading standard printed labels on
- 14 prescription drug containers.
- 15 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 16 (1) Require certain pharmacies to:



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1	(A)	Provide accessible prescription drug label	
2		information to individuals who have difficulty	
3		seeing or reading standard printed labels on	
4		prescription drug containers; and	
5	(B)	Make sustained, periodic, and reasonable efforts	
6		to inform the public that prescription drug label	
7		information is available in alternate accessible	
8		formats for individuals who have difficulty	
9		seeing or reading standard printed labels on	
10		prescription drug containers; and	
11	(2) Require the board of pharmacy to adopt certain rules		
12	nece	ssary for the purposes of this Act before	
13	Dece	mber 31, 2024.	
14	SECTION 2	. Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
15	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated		
16	and to read as follows:		
17	" <u>§</u> 461	Pharmacies; prescription drug label information;	
18	accessibility.	(a) When dispensing a prescription drug to an	
19	individual who	, as acknowledged by the individual, has	
20	difficulty see	ing or reading standard printed labels on	
21	prescription d	rug containers, the dispensing pharmacy shall	

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1	provide the individual with a means of access to obtain the		
2	prescript	ion drug label information required pursuant to section	
3	328-16(a)	by:	
4	(1)	Including an electronic label affixed to the	
5		prescription drug container that transmits	
6		prescription drug label information, directions, and	
7		written instructions to an end-user's external	
8		accessible device, including an individual's	
9		compatible prescription drug reader; or	
10	(2)	Providing a prescription drug reader at no cost to the	
11		individual.	
12	(b)	Dispensing pharmacies shall make sustained, periodic,	
13	and reasonable efforts to inform the public that prescription		
14	drug label information is available in accessible formats for		
15	individuals who have difficulty seeing or reading standard		
16	printed labels on prescription drug containers.		
17	(c)	Dispensing pharmacies shall otherwise follow the best	
18	practices as recommended by the United States Access Board for		
19	pharmacies in providing independent access to prescription drug		
20	label information.		

1 (d) This section shall not apply to a pharmacy that is a 2 sole proprietorship with no more than two pharmacists; provided 3 that the pharmacy has requested and been granted an exemption 4 from the requirements of this section by the board; provided 5 further that the exemption shall be subject to an annual review 6 and approval that the board may grant on a case-by-case basis 7 upon a finding that compliance with this section would result in 8 an undue burden for the pharmacy, determined by the board in 9 accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 10 12182)." 11 SECTION 3. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 12 amended by adding two new definitions to be appropriately 13 inserted and to read as follows: ""End-user's external accessible device" means a 14 15 commercially available computer, mobile phone, or other 16 communications device that is able to receive electronic 17 information transmitted from an external source and provide the 18 electronic information in a form and format accessible to the 19 individual.

"Prescription drug reader" means a dedicated electronic

device that is able to obtain information from an electronic

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1 label affixed to a container of prescription drugs and provide 2 the information in an audio format accessible to the 3 individual." 4 SECTION 4. No later than December 31, 2024, the board of 5 pharmacy shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91, Hawaii 6 Revised Statutes, necessary to carry out the purposes of this 7 Act. The rules adopted by the board of pharmacy shall: 8 (1) Set forth rules in accordance with this Act applicable 9 to hospital pharmacies and manufacturers of 10 prescription drugs that provide their products 11 directly to consumers; and 12 (2) Allow the board of pharmacy to deny, revoke, or 13 suspend a pharmacy license or impose a fine not to 14 exceed \$1,000 per violation for failure to comply with 15 the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 5. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.

Description:

Requires certain pharmacies to provide accessible prescription drug label information to individuals who have difficulty seeing or reading standard printed labels on prescription drug containers and inform the public that prescription drug label information is available in alternate accessible formats for individuals who have difficulty seeing or reading prescription drug container labels. Requires the Board of Pharmacy to adopt certain rules by 12/31/2024. (CD1)

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
