A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that career and technical 2 education programs equip students with the skills necessary for 3 in-demand jobs in the modern labor market. By linking education with real-world activities, such programs emphasize innovation 4 5 in high-growth industries and provide students with 6 opportunities to explore career pathways. Career and technical 7 education fields of study include animation, graphic design, 8 clinical health, engineering, marketing, environmental resource 9 management, and education, and may provide students with the 10 knowledge needed to perform twenty-first century jobs, such as 11 urban growers; chief sustainability officers; hydrologists; 12 digital animation designers; medical and healthcare 13 professionals; regenerative agricultural specialists; software 14 engineers; and teachers.

15 The purpose of this Act is to establish a working group to 16 strengthen career and technical education in Hawaii's public 17 school system.
