A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that career and technical education programs equip students with the skills necessary for 2 3 in-demand jobs in the modern labor market. By linking education 4 with real-world activities, such programs emphasize innovation 5 in high-growth industries and provide students with opportunities to explore career pathways. Career and technical 6 education fields of study include animation, graphic design, 7 8 clinical health, engineering, marketing, environmental resource 9 management, and education, and may provide students with the 10 knowledge needed to perform twenty-first century jobs, such as 11 urban growers, chief sustainability officers, hydrologists, digital animation designers, medical and healthcare 12 13 professionals, regenerative agricultural specialists, software 14 engineers, and teachers.

15 The purpose of this Act is to establish a working group to 16 strengthen career and technical education in Hawaii's public 17 school system.

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1	SECT	ION 2. (a) There is established a career and
2	technical	education working group within the department of
3	education	for administrative purposes.
4	(b)	The working group shall:
5	(1)	Propose actions that the department of education may
6		take to maintain a career and technical education
7		program that prepares students for careers in current
8		or emerging occupations and empowers students to meet
9		the social, economic, and environmental challenges
10		facing Hawaii;
11	(2)	Evaluate the extent to which the department of
12		education's current career and technical education
13		programs equip students with the knowledge and skills
14		necessary to participate in the twenty-first century
15		workforce, particularly with regards to industries
16		that advance the State's goals of economic
17		diversification and transitioning to a clean energy
18		economy;
19	(3)	Recommend ways of expanding career and technical
20		education programs that allow students participating
21		in a career and technical education program to

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1 complete up to twelve credits of the student's 2 graduation requirements through career and technical 3 education courses; Examine processes for providing secondary school 4 (4) 5 students participating in career and technical 6 education programs with for-credit internship or 7 apprenticeship opportunities that result in 8 professional certification or licensure; 9 (5) Assess the potential benefits of offering grade nine 10 students the opportunity to earn credit in a course that describes and explains the school's career and 11 12 technical education programs; 13 (6) Determine the number of teachers currently providing instruction in career and technical education and the 14 15 number of career and technical education teachers who 16 are certified or licensed in the career pathway for 17 which they are responsible for delivering instruction; 18 (7) Analyze methods of strengthening the career and 19 technical education teaching workforce, including by 20 offering sabbaticals to public school teachers to 21 receive career pathway training, providing incentives

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1 to encourage graduates of career and technical 2 education programs to become public school teachers, 3 and allowing teacher to co-teach career and technical 4 education courses with licensed industry professionals 5 and subject matter specialists; 6 (8) Evaluate the number of classrooms that are currently 7 dedicated to career and technical education at each 8 secondary school and the cost of capital improvements 9 that may be necessary to expand access to career and 10 technical education programs; and Perform an analysis of high-performing career and 11 (9) 12 technical education programs in Massachusetts and 13 other states that highlight opportunities for, and 14 costs of, incorporating components of high-performing 15 models into Hawaii's career and technical education 16 programming, including personnel and capital 17 improvements needed to implement those models. 18 (C) The working group shall consist of the following individuals, or their designees: 19 20 (1)The superintendent of education, who shall serve as 21 chairperson of the working group;

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1	(2)	The director of labor and industrial relations;	
2	(3)	The chairperson of the board of education;	
3	(4)	The chairpersons of the education standing committees	
4		of the senate and house of representatives;	
5	(5)	A representative from collective bargaining unit (5);	
6	(6)	A representative from collective bargaining unit (6);	
7	(7)	A public school principal, to be invited by the	
8		superintendent of education;	
9	(8)	Two public school teachers, to be selected by the	
10		representative from collective bargaining unit (5);	
11	(9)	The executive director of Hawaii P-20 Partnerships for	
12		Education; and	
13	(10)	Other interested parties with experience in career and	
14		technical education that the chairperson deems	
15		relevant to the purposes of the working group, as	
16		invited by the chairperson.	
17	(d)	The members of the working group shall serve without	
18	compensat	ion but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including	
19	9 travel expenses, necessary for the performance of their duties.		
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20 No member of the working group shall be subject to chapter 84,

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1 Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because of the member's participation in the working group. 2 3 The working group shall submit a report of its (e) 4 findings and recommendations, including any proposed 5 legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2024. 6 7 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 8 or so 9 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 for 10 costs associated with the working group established by section 2 11 of this Act. 12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of education for the purposes of this Act. 13 14 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.
