A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that pharmacies are vital
- 2 to the State's health care system because of their convenient
- 3 points of access in their communities. Pharmacists are trusted
- 4 health care professionals who have established relationships
- 5 with their patients, medical providers, and hospitals.
- 6 The legislature further finds that the coronavirus disease
- 7 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic highlighted the critical need to
- 8 address health care testing accessibility and streamline
- 9 unnecessary administrative regulations. To increase COVID-19
- 10 testing, in April 2020 the federal government issued an
- 11 emergency declaration under the Public Readiness and Emergency
- 12 Preparedness (PREP) Act, which, among other things, authorized
- 13 pharmacists to order and administer COVID-19 testing and
- 14 increased access to certain pharmacy-administered tests. The
- 15 PREP Act is in effect through the end of 2024; however, there
- 16 are certain provisions in the PREP Act that have not been
- 17 codified in state law.

- 1 In addition to COVID-19 tests, the legislature further
- 2 finds that pharmacists in the State are currently permitted to
- 3 perform certain drug therapy-related tests under the definition
- 4 of "practice of pharmacy" in section 461-1, Hawaii Revised
- 5 Statutes. However, there are differing interpretations under
- 6 state law as to whether pharmacists can explicitly perform tests
- 7 that are classified as waived under the federal Clinical
- 8 Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (CLIA). CLIA-waived
- 9 tests are simple tests that are non-technical and have a low
- 10 risk for erroneous results. Most CLIA-waived tests are approved
- 11 by the federal Food and Drug Administration for home use and
- 12 pose very little reasonable risk of harm to the patient if
- 13 performed incorrectly. Some examples of CLIA-waived tests
- 14 include blood glucose monitoring tests, cholesterol monitoring
- 15 tests, and, recently, SARS CoV-2 (COVID-19) point-of-care or
- "rapid" tests.
- 17 The legislature finds that clarifying the law to allow
- 18 pharmacists to order and perform certain common diagnostic-
- 19 related tests for respiratory illness like influenza,
- 20 streptococcal pharyngitis, and liver function, as well as CLIA-

necessary, but simple, health care.
Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to amend the
pharmacist scope of practice to clarify that pharmacists may
order and perform the collection of specimens for certain
diagnostic-related and CLIA-waived tests.
SECTION 2. Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
and to read as follows:
"§461- Diagnostic and certain other non-technical
health assessment tests; authority; permitting and education
requirements. Unless otherwise authorized by law, a pharmacist
shall only exercise the authority granted in paragraph (5) of
the definition of "practice of pharmacy" under section 461-1, to
order and perform the collection of specimens for certain
diagnostic-related and CLIA-waived tests:
(1) After completing appropriate training that includes
programs approved by the Accreditation Council for
Pharmacy Education, curriculum-based programs from an
Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education-
accredited college of pharmacy, state or local health

5	(2) Upon application for and receipt of a permit pursuant
6	to the requirements of section 321-13."
7	SECTION 3. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended as follows:
9	1. By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
10	and to read:
11	"CLIA-waived tests" means any test that is classified as
12	waived under the federal Clinical Laboratory Improvement
13	Amendments of 1988 (42 U.S.C. 263a)."
14	2. By amending the definition of "practice of pharmacy" to
15	read:
16	""Practice of pharmacy" means:
17	(1) The interpretation and evaluation of prescription
18	orders; the compounding, dispensing, and labeling of
19	drugs and devices (except labeling by a manufacturer,
20	packer, or distributor of nonprescription drugs and
21	commercially legend drugs and devices); the

1		participation in drug selection and drug utilization
2		reviews; the proper and safe storage of drugs and
3		devices and the maintenance of proper records
4		therefore; the responsibility for advising when
5		necessary or where regulated, of therapeutic values,
6		content, hazards, and use of drugs and devices; and
7		the interpretation and evaluation of prescription
8		orders to adjust the supply dispensed for purposes of
9		medication synchronization pursuant to section
10		431:10A-606, 432:1-621, or 432D-30;
11	(2)	Performing the following procedures or functions as
12		part of the care provided by and in concurrence with a
13		"health care facility" and "health care service" as
14		defined in section 323D-2; or a "pharmacy"; or a
15		licensed physician, a licensed physician assistant, or
16		a licensed advanced practice registered nurse with
17		prescriptive authority; or a "managed care plan" as
18		defined in section 432E-1, in accordance with
19		policies, procedures, or protocols developed
20		collaboratively by health professionals, including
21		physicians and surgeons, pharmacists, physician

1	assistants, and registered nurses, and for which a			
2	pharmacist has received appropriate training required			
3	by t	by these policies, procedures, or protocols:		
4	(A)	Ordering or performing routine drug therapy

21		oper	ation, management, and control of pharmacy; [and]

1	(4)	Prescribing and dispensing contraceptive supplies
2		pursuant to section $461-11.6[-]$; and
3	(5)	Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, and in
4		accordance with the requirements of section 461-
5		ordering tests and performing the collection of
6		specimens authorized or approved by the United States
7		Food and Drug Administration that are:
8		(A) Diagnostic-related laboratory tests used to
9		detect or screen for SARS-CoV-2, respiratory
10		illnesses including influenza infection,
11		streptococcal pharyngitis, or liver function
12		issues or infections; provided that no test shall
13		require the use of specimens collected by vaginal
14		swab, venipuncture, or the collection of seminal
15		fluid; or
16		(B) CLIA-waived tests."
