A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many low-income
households struggle to purchase food due to Hawaii's high cost
of living and food prices. The supplemental nutrition
assistance program (SNAP), formerly known as the food stamp
program, is crucial to providing necessary food assistance to
some of Hawaii's most disadvantaged citizens.

7 The legislature also finds that in November 2022, over one 8 hundred fifty thousand people in Hawaii participated in SNAP. Hawaii secures over \$950,000,000 annually in SNAP funding, yet 9 10 the need for food in Hawaii remains unmet. Households with incomes above two hundred per cent of the poverty level, as 11 12 established by the United States Department of Agriculture, are 13 ineligible for SNAP benefits, yet these household are still 14 unable to achieve self-sufficiency. A household of four earning 15 \$64,000 per year is ineligible for SNAP benefits yet earns 16 \$20,000 less than the amount necessary to achieve self-17 sufficiency and afford basic needs.

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1	The legislature further finds that the two hundred per cent
2	poverty level cutoff creates an extreme benefits cliff in which
3	an additional \$1 per month earned by a household can result in
4	over \$2,900 in SNAP benefits lost per year for a single adult.
5	For a household of four, an additional \$1 per month earned can
6	result in \$10,000 in SNAP benefits lost per year. In addition,
7	SNAP's benefits cliff disincentivizes individuals from reaching
8	their greatest potential, since individuals must determine
9	whether the financial benefits of pursuing economic
10	opportunities exceed the potential loss in food assistance.
11	These Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed (ALICE)
12	individuals and households are in dire need of the very
13	assistance from which they are disqualified. Hawaii not only has
14	the opportunity but the responsibility to help these households.
15	The purpose of this Act is to:
16	(1) Establish additional monthly assistance for households
17	that meet all eligibility requirements for the
18	supplemental nutrition assistance program, regardless
19	of income level; and
20	(2) Appropriate funds.

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1	SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§346- Supplemental nutrition assistance program;
5	supplemental monthly benefits. (a) The minimum monthly benefit
6	for a household eligible for supplemental nutrition assistance
7	program benefits and whose household income is below two hundred
8	per cent of the federal poverty level, as established by the
9	United States Department of Agriculture, shall be \$250 per
10	person; provided that the additional benefits shall be
11	supplemented using state general funds.
12	(b) The minimum monthly benefit for a household whose
13	monthly income is above two hundred per cent of the federal
14	poverty level, as established by the United States Department of
15	Agriculture, and that meets all other supplemental nutrition
16	assistance program eligibility requirements shall be \$250 per
17	person; provided that for every \$1 earned in excess of the two
18	hundred per cent poverty level, the household's benefit shall
19	decrease by 20 cents per person."
20	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
21	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so

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1	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
2	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
3	year 2024-2025 for the additional supplemental nutrition
4	assistance program benefits established pursuant to section 2 of
5	this Act.
6	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
7	of human services for the purposes of this Act.
8	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.
9	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 30, 3000.

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program; Minimum Monthly Benefits; Eligibility; Department of Human Services; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes an additional minimum supplemental nutrition assistance program (SNAP) benefit of \$250 per month per person for SNAP-eligible households whose income is below two hundred per cent of the federal poverty level, as established by the United States Department of Agriculture. Requires that SNAPeligible households whose monthly income exceeds two hundred per cent of the federal poverty level receive a graduated decline of additional SNAP benefits. Requires state general funds to be used to supplement the cost of the additional benefits. Appropriates funds. Effective 7/30/3000. (HD1)
