A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BACKGROUND CHECKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the department of
- 2 human services assists vulnerable persons, including minors,
- 3 young adults, and vulnerable adults. It is therefore necessary
- 4 for the department to exercise caution when employing or
- 5 retaining workers, including volunteers, contractors, and others
- 6 whose positions place them in close proximity with persons who
- 7 may be at risk.
- 8 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to help ensure the
- 9 safety of vulnerable persons by authorizing the department to
- 10 conduct comprehensive background checks on current or
- 11 prospective employees; volunteers; contractors; and contractors'
- 12 employees, agents, and volunteers whose position places or would
- 13 place them in close proximity to certain vulnerable persons.
- 14 SECTION 2. Section 346-2.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended to read as follows:
- "[+]\$346-2.5[] Criminal history record] Background checks.
- 17 (a) The department shall develop procedures for obtaining



- 1 verifiable information regarding the criminal history of any
- 2 person who is employed or seeking employment, including a
- 3 contractor and its employees or agents if prior authority to
- 4 access federal tax information has been provided by the United
- 5 States Department of the Treasury, if the person will require
- 6 access to federal tax information. The procedures shall include
- 7 criminal history record checks in accordance with section
- 8 846-2.7. Information obtained pursuant to this subsection shall
- 9 be used exclusively by the department for the purpose of
- 10 determining whether a person is suitable for accessing federal
- 11 tax information in accordance with applicable federal laws.
- 12 (b) The department may terminate or deny employment to any
- 13 current or prospective employee [or applicant,] or terminate or
- 14 refuse to secure the services of a contractor and its employees
- 15 or agents authorized under subsection (a), if the department
- 16 finds by reason of the nature and circumstances of the
- 17 background investigation conducted under subsection (a) that the
- 18 current or prospective employee[, applicant,] or contractor, or
- 19 contractor's employees or agents pose a risk to the security of
- 20 federal tax information. Termination or denial of employment or
- 21 refusal to secure services under this subsection shall only

1 occur after appropriate notification to the current or 2 prospective employee[, applicant,] or contractor of the findings of the background investigation, and after the current or 3 4 prospective employee[, applicant,] or contractor is given an 5 opportunity to respond to the findings. Nothing in this 6 subsection shall abrogate any applicable appeal rights under 7 chapters 76 and 89, or administrative rules of the department. 8 (c) The department shall develop procedures for obtaining 9 verifiable information regarding the criminal history, and 10 information confirming the reputable and responsible character, of any current or prospective employee; volunteer; contractor; 11 12 or contractor's employee, agent, or volunteer, who will be in 13 close proximity to minors, young adults, or vulnerable adults 14 who are receiving from the department: 15 (1) Child welfare services; 16 (2) Social services; 17 (3) Services intended to prevent abuse or neglect; or 18 (4)Services intended to assist youth aging out of foster 19 care with obtaining and maintaining independent living 20 skills.

20	to work i	n close proximity to minors, young adults, or
21	vulnerabl	e adults.

1	(e) The department may periodically obtain criminal
2	history information on all persons who are subject to this
3	section through the Hawaii criminal justice data center.
4	(f) The department may terminate or deny employment to a
5	current or prospective employee or volunteer, or terminate or
6	refuse to secure the services of a contractor and its employees
7	or agents, if the department finds, based on the results of the
8	background investigation conducted pursuant to subsections (d)
9	and (e), that the current or prospective employee; volunteer;
10	contractor; or contractor's employee, agent, or volunteer may
11	pose a risk to the health, safety, security, or well-being of
12	minors, young adults, or vulnerable adults as described in
13	subsection (c). Termination or denial of employment or refusal
14	to secure services under this subsection shall occur only after
15	the department notifies the current or prospective employee or
16	contractor of the findings of the background investigation, and
17	after the current or prospective employee or contractor is given
18	an opportunity to respond to the findings. Nothing in this
19	subsection shall abrogate any applicable rights to appeal under
20	chapters 76 and 89 or the administrative rules of the
21	department.

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    831-3.1 and need not conduct investigations, notifications, or
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    hearings under this section in accordance with chapter 91.

11	when that section is reenacted on January 1, 2024, pursuant to
12	section 27 of Act 278, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022.
