A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that because of Hawaii's 2 high cost of living and food prices, many low-income individuals 3 and families struggle to purchase food. The supplemental 4 nutrition assistance program, formerly known as the food stamp 5 program, is a crucial means of providing necessary assistance in 6 the purchasing of food for some of Hawaii's most disadvantaged 7 citizens. In fiscal year 2019, 157,000 Hawaii residents 8 participated in the supplemental nutrition assistance program, 9 roughly one in nine of the State's population. While Hawaii 10 secures over \$448,000,000 annually in supplemental nutrition 11 assistance program moneys, a 2017 report by the United States 12 Department of Agriculture ranked Hawaii twenty-seventh among 13 states in the percentage of eligible individuals who participate 14 in the supplemental nutrition assistance program.

15 The legislature further finds that if additional eligible 16 individuals participated in the supplemental nutrition 17 assistance program, the State could receive increased federal

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funding. Additionally, Moody's Analytics estimates that every
\$1 given in supplemental nutrition assistance program funds can
generate \$1.70 in the local economy.

4 The legislature also finds that many individuals who are 5 eligible to participate in the supplemental nutrition assistance 6 program do not participate because they are unaware of the 7 supplemental nutrition assistance program's existence or of 8 their eligibility. Authorizing health care providers, nonprofit 9 organizations, businesses, and faith-based organizations to 10 distribute supplemental nutrition assistance program 11 applications to those in need may increase participation in the 12 supplemental nutrition assistance program. Furthermore, authorizing health care providers to report to the department of 13 14 human services an aggregate collection of data about state 15 supplemental nutrition assistance program participation would 16 allow the department of human services to aid policy makers in 17 establishing plans to maximize federal funding and increase 18 access to nutritious foods. Each of these outcomes would result 19 in the State having more supplemental nutrition assistance 20 program participants, which in turn would result in heightened

3	The purpose of this Act is to authorize health care
4	providers, nonprofit organizations, businesses, and faith-based
5	organizations to distribute supplemental nutrition assistance
6	program applications.
7	SECTION 2. Chapter 346, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately
9	designated and to read as follows:
10	" <u>\$346-</u> Supplemental nutrition assistance program
11	participation. Health care providers, nonprofit organizations,
11 12	participation . Health care providers, nonprofit organizations, businesses, and faith-based organizations may distribute
12	businesses, and faith-based organizations may distribute
12 13	businesses, and faith-based organizations may distribute supplemental nutrition assistance program applications to
12 13 14	businesses, and faith-based organizations may distribute supplemental nutrition assistance program applications to prospective applicants."
