A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDIA LITERACY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that education is the
bedrock of a healthy democracy. To advance the fundamental
democratic principles of equality, liberty, and justice for all,
a quality school system must deliver instruction that is
historically and scientifically accurate and free from
discrimination.

7 The legislature further finds that disinformation, 8 misinformation, digital discrimination, and online hate speech 9 are pervasive threats to modern society. In a June 2019 report 10 entitled, "Hate Speech on Social Media: Global Comparisons", 11 the Council on Foreign Relations noted that digital hate speech 12 has been linked to a global increase in violence toward 13 minorities and that policies used to curb hate speech are often 14 inconsistently enforced by social media companies. 15 Additionally, disinformation and online hate speech have been linked to outbursts of violence in the real world, including 16

17 mass shootings at a church in Charleston, South Carolina, and a



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1	synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, as well as the
. 2	insurrection that occurred at the United States Capitol on
3	January 6, 2021. Moreover, according to a Kaiser Family
4	Foundation coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) vaccine monitor
5	report published in November 2021, more than seventy-eight per
6	cent of adults in the United States believed or were unsure
7	about at least one of eight false statements about the COVID-19
8	pandemic or COVID-19 vaccines.
9	The purpose of this Act is to:
10	(1) Advance informed digital citizenship in Hawaii's
11	public education system by empowering school complexes
12	to incorporate media literacy into standards-based
13	curriculum as appropriate, including content that
14	prevents the negative impacts of misinformation,
15	disinformation, digital discrimination, and online
16	hate speech; and
17	(2) Remove certain requirements related to standards-based
18	curriculum.
19	SECTION 2. Section 302A-321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended to read as follows:

4	(1)	Be specific in its standards-based scope and sequence

9		standards and related benchmark maps[; and
10	(5)	Be implemented in all appropriate classrooms in the
11		school or complex].
12	(b)	School complexes may choose to develop an articulated
13	and align	ed K-12 standards-based curriculum in one or more of
14	the follo	wing core content areas:
15	(1)	Language arts;
16	(2)	Mathematics;
17	(3)	Science; and
18	(4)	Social studies.
19	[(C)	School complexes shall provide professional
20	developme	nt.

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1	(d) School complexes that develop a standards-based
2	curriculum shall use standards-based formative assessment tools
3	to monitor student progress, not less than on a quarterly basis
4	throughout the school year.
5	(c)] <u>(c)</u> School complexes shall develop rigorous
6	classroom-based performance assessments.
7	[(f)] <u>(d)</u> School complexes may implement software programs
8	at the school level to help to align school course material with
9	Hawaii content and performance and federal educational
10	standards.
11	(e) School complexes shall be authorized to incorporate
12	media literacy into standards-based curriculum as appropriate,
13	including content that prevents the negative impacts of
14	misinformation, disinformation, digital discrimination, and
15	online hate speech."
16	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
17	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
18	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.
