A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE PROGRAMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Act 46, Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, mandated a common statewide assessment model to assess all students entering kindergarten within the first thirty days of each school year. The Act also provided an option for the assessments to be administered in either English or Hawaiian to reflect the two languages in which kindergarten students in Hawaii are taught.

8 The legislature further finds that assessments in the 9 Hawaiian language for kindergarten students in Hawaii language 10 immersion programs have the potential to derail long-fought 11 efforts to revitalize the Hawaiian language. While some 12 students entering kindergarten in a Hawaiian language immersion 13 program are fluent in the Hawaiian language due to their prior 14 participation in the Aha Punana Leo Hawaiian language medium 15 early learning and care model, other new students have very 16 little experience with or knowledge of the Hawaiian language. 17 Accordingly, any assessment in the Hawaiian language for these



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students who do not speak the Hawaiian language would result in poor assessment scores solely due to the student's inability to understand the language of the questions. This in turn would reflect poorly on the schools, discourage future families from pursuing a free education in the Hawaiian language, and ultimately hinder the decades of progress made toward increasing the number of people fluent in the Hawaiian language.

8 The purpose of this Act is to exempt Hawaiian language 9 immersion programs from the kindergarten assessment requirements 10 under the law.

SECTION 2. Section 302A-1165, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows: "(a) The board of education shall adopt a kindergarten entry assessment, and the department of education shall administer the kindergarten entry assessment [-;]; provided that no assessment shall be administered to any kindergarten child enrolled in a Hawaiian immersion program.

18 (b) The kindergarten entry assessment shall:

19 (1) Be administered within the first thirty days of each
20 child's admission into kindergarten;

2		assessment shall be conducted in English or Hawaiian;]

10	(4)	Be used in conformance with the recommendations of the
11		National Research Council reports on early childhood;

13	(5)	Be valid and reliable for its intended purpose."
14	SECT	ION 3. Section 302A-1166, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended by	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
16	"(a)	At least one parent or guardian of each child
17	entering 1	kindergarten shall disclose to the department the name
18	of, addres	ss of, and duration of attendance at the early learning
19	program t	hat the child attended during the previous academic
20	year. <u>The</u>	e department shall also require disclosure of the
21	primary la	anguage medium of education of the early learning



program attended the previous academic year and if any Hawaiian 1 language, English language, or non-official language of the 2 3 State was taught in addition to the primary language medium of 4 education. The department may also require the disclosure of 5 any other information not otherwise prohibited by law that would 6 assist the department, the department of human services, and the 7 executive office on early learning in developing, assessing, and implementing strategies to meet the early learning needs of 8 9 children in the State. The department and the executive office 10 on early learning shall use the information to assist the 11 executive office on early learning and department of human services in determining the levels of prekindergarten attendance 12 13 and need for child care in geographic regions of the State and 14 identify the highest priority regions requiring prekindergarten programs and child care to meet the needs of unserved or 15 16 underserved eligible children." 17 SECTION 4. Section 302D-37, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

18 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) The commission shall adopt the kindergarten entry
assessment adopted by the board pursuant to section 302A-1165(a)
to assess all charter school students entering kindergarten



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within the first thirty days of admission into kindergarten $[-]_{i}$ 1 2 provided that no assessment shall be administered to any 3 kindergarten child predominately taught in the Hawaiian 4 language." 5 SECTION 5. Section 302D-38, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 6 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 7 "(a) At least one parent or guardian of each child 8 entering kindergarten shall disclose to the public charter 9 school at which the child is enrolled the name and address of 10 the early learning program that the child attended during the previous academic year. The public charter school shall also 11 require disclosure of the primary language medium of education 12 of the early learning program attended by the child for the 13 14 previous academic year and if any Hawaiian language, English language, or non-official language of the State was taught in 15 16 addition to the primary language medium of education. Each 17 public charter school shall provide to the commission the 18 information disclosed pursuant to this section. The commission 19 may also require the disclosure of any other information not 20 otherwise prohibited by law that would assist the department, 21 the department of human services, and the executive office on



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early learning in developing, assessing, and implementing 1 2 strategies to meet the early learning needs of children in the 3 State. The commission and the executive office on early learning shall use the information to assist the department of 4 5 human services and executive office on early learning in 6 determining the levels of prekindergarten attendance and need 7 for child care in geographic regions of the State and identify 8 the highest priority regions requiring prekindergarten programs 9 and child care to meet the needs of unserved or underserved 10 eligible children and shall provide the information to the 11 department of human services."

12 SECTION 6. Section 302D-39, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 13 amended to read as follows:

14 "§302D-39 Public early learning and preschool programs; 15 administrative authority. (a) The commission shall have 16 administrative authority over all state-funded early learning 17 programs and private partnership-funded preschool programs in 18 public charter schools except for [special]:

19 (1) Special education [and] programs;

20 (2) Title I-funded prekindergarten programs [-;]; and



1	(3) Laboratory school programs of the Hawaiian language
2	college as specified in subsection (n).
3	(b) The early learning programs in charter schools
4	shall enroll no more than a maximum of twenty children per
5	classroom who are three- or four-years-old on or before
6	July 31 of the school year, as aligned with the department's
7	kindergarten age entry requirements.
8	(c) Subject to the availability of funding, the commission
9	shall implement an application process for schools to establish
10	an early learning program.
11	(d) Each early learning program and preschool program
12	shall meet the following requirements:
13	(1) The availability of a classroom and outdoor play area
14	that meet department of human services requirements
15	for the health and safety of three- and four-year-old
16	children and is exempt from section 346-161 as a
17	public preschool provider;
18	(2) The commitment of the principal to implementing an
19	early learning program, including through active
20	participation in professional development sessions
21	offered through the commission, and promoting

8	(5)	The enrollment shall not exceed twenty children per
9		classroom; and
10	(6)	The incorporation of standards that are research-based
11		and developmentally-appropriate practices associated
12		with improved educational outcomes for children, such
13		as:
14		(A) Positive teacher-child interactions that shall be
15		evaluated through observations conducted by the
16		commission using a research-based tool at least
17		twice a year, for the purposes of professional
18		development; provided that the observations shall
19		not be used for the purposes of teacher
20		evaluation;



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1 (B) The early learning environment shall be assessed 2 using a tool that measures its effectiveness and 3 shall be conducted at least two times per school 4 year by a certified observer who is employed or 5 contracted by the commission; provided that the 6 teaching staff shall use the assessment data and 7 feedback to improve the quality of the learning 8 environment; provided further that observations 9 shall be used for the purposes of professional 10 development and shall not be used for the 11 purposes of teacher evaluation; 12 (C) Use of individual child formative assessments 13 that are used for ongoing planning relating to 14 all areas of child development and learning

15 including cognitive, linguistic, social emotional 16 approaches to learning, and health and physical 17 development;

18 (D) Family engagement in partnership with charter
19 schools, including conducting outreach for
20 enrollment and engagement of families in their
21 children's education in recognition of families'



1		role as their child's first and most important
2		teacher;
3	(E)	Alignment with the Hawaii early learning and
4		development standards, department standards,
5		state content and performance standards, and
6		general learner outcomes for grades kindergarten
7		to twelve to facilitate a seamless educational
8		experience for children;
9	(F)	Requirements that any teacher shall have
10		coursework in early childhood education pursuant
11		to Hawaii teacher standards board licensing
12		requirements for a prekindergarten teacher or be
13		enrolled in a state-approved teacher education
14		program and be working toward satisfying the
15		Hawaii teacher standards board licensing
16		requirements; and
17	(G)	Requirements that any educational assistant has a
18		current child development associate credential,
19		coursework for a certificate that meets the
20		requirements for child development associate
21		credential preparation, or be enrolled in and



1 working toward completing a program that prepares 2 the individual to obtain the credential. 3 (e) The commission shall monitor the implementation of the 4 educational experience for children. 5 (f) The commission shall provide support to incorporate 6 the standards developed pursuant to subsection (d), including 7 support related to teacher-child interactions, early childhood 8 learning environment, individual child assessments, and family 9 engagement. 10 (q) Teaching staff participating in a program established 11 pursuant to this section shall participate in coaching and 12 mentoring and professional development opportunities offered 13 through the commission; provided that the commission shall cover 14 the associated travel and substitute teacher costs, contingent 15 upon funding availability. The commission may extend this 16 support, excluding travel and substitute teacher costs, to 17 individuals who are not participating in the program to promote 18 alignment between all grade levels, programs, and settings. 19 School leaders shall attend professional development (h) 20 sessions related to P-3 (preschool to grade three) alignment

21 offered through the commission. The commission shall cover the



costs associated with travel and substitute teacher
 expenditures, contingent upon the availability of funding. The
 commission may extend this support, excluding travel and
 substitute teacher costs, to individuals who are not
 participating in the program to promote alignment between all
 grade levels, programs, and settings.

7 The commission shall work with each charter school to (i) 8 develop and annually update a written three-year plan that 9 promotes, within the school and community, alignment of and 10 transitions between learning experiences, and report on the 11 progress made toward the plan by the end of the school year. 12 (ij) The commission shall coordinate with other agencies and programs to facilitate comprehensive services for early 13

14 learning.

(k) The commission shall promote the development of a
cohesive, comprehensive, and sustainable early learning system.
The commission shall coordinate with other early learning
providers, including those providing the programs and services,
to promote alignment between prekindergarten and elementary
school programs and to support children and their families in



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1 making successful transitions from prekindergarten into 2 kindergarten. 3 (1) Each early learning program and preschool program may use available classrooms for public preschool programs 4 5 statewide. 6 (m) The commission shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 7 91 for the purpose of this section. 8 (n) Laboratory school programs of the Hawaiian language 9 college shall be exempt from the requirement of this section; provided that the Hawaiian language college shall work annually 10 11 with: 12 Its laboratory school programs to improve language and (1) 13 academic outcomes; and 14 (2) The commission to collect appropriate data from the 15 laboratory school programs to be shared with the 16 department of human services, the department of 17 education, and the executive office on early learning. $\left[\frac{(n)}{(n)}\right]$ (o) The commission shall submit a report to the 18 19 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 20 each regular session regarding state-funded early learning



1	programs	in charter schools. The report shall include, as
2	related t	o each type of program:
3	(1)	The number and location of classrooms;
4	(2)	Sources of funding for each classroom;
5	(3)	Aggregated data reflecting the quality of
6		teacher-child interactions relating to emotional

9	(4)	Aggregated data reflecting the quality of the early
10		learning environment and the teacher-child
11		interactions that maximize the learning opportunities
12		of the environment; and
13	(5)	Aggregated student outcomes related to all areas of
14		child development and learning, including cognitive,
15		linguistic, social and emotional approaches to
16		learning and health and physical development, as
17		assessed using a formative assessment tool selected or
18		approved by the commission.

1	SECT	ION 7. Section 304A-1302, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to	o read as follows:

5	language,	the Hawaiian language college shall:
6	(1)	Provide an indigenous language outreach program to
7		involve indigenous language scholars and to maintain
8		and develop the program's Polynesian language
9		database;
10	(2)	Provide a Hawaiian medium teacher training program
11		incorporating Nawahiokalani`opu`u school and other
12		schools, as appropriate, as laboratory schools; [and]
13	(3)	Provide oversight, administer, and determine
14		appropriate standards, assessments, performance
15		ratings, staff qualifications, staff training
16		requirements, and exemptions needed to meet Hawaiian
17		language revitalization goals and constitutional
18		mandates; and
19	[(3)]	(4) Maintain a Hawaiian language support center with
20		educational specialists in the areas of research,

3	SECTION 8. Section 304A-2356, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
5	"(b) The university of Hawaii at Hilo college of Hawaiian
6	language shall expend moneys in the trust fund for purposes of
7	Hawaiian medium or immersion early learning."
8	SECTION 9. Section 346-184, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
10	"(a) Each service provider of the preschool open doors
11	program shall be accredited or shall obtain accreditation within
12	seven calendar years of first receiving any funds from the
13	preschool open doors program; provided that any existing service
14	provider unaccredited on July 1, 2022, shall commence the
15	accreditation process no later than July 1, 2024, and obtain
16	accreditation by July 1, 2029; provided further that the
17	director may grant to any service provider one or more
18	extensions to obtain accreditation on a case-by-case basis[\pm];
19	provided further that the requirement to obtain accreditation
20	after receiving any funds from the preschool open doors program



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1	shall not apply to service providers that teach solely in
2	Hawaiian to promote fluency in the Hawaiian language."
3	SECTION 10. Act 46, Session Laws of Hawaii 2020, as
4	amended by Act 210, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, is amended by
5	amending section 16 to read as follows:
6	"SECTION 16. The standards, assessments, performance
7	ratings, staff qualifications, and staff training requirements
8	established by this Act shall not apply to any laboratory school
9	program of the Hawaiian language college at the University of
10	Hawaii at Hilo [until July 1, 2026]; provided that all child
11	care centers at any applicable college shall be licensed by the
12	department of human services prior to accepting children into
13	care."
14	SECTION 11. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
15	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
16	SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
