A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PURCHASES OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to amend the procurement laws relating to the purchase of health and human services to promote procurement efficiency, program success, and government accountability. This Act increases the efficiency of short-term treatment purchase of services and increases the small purchase threshold for health and human services from less than \$25,000 to less than \$100,000.

8 SECTION 2. Section 103F-404, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is9 amended to read as follows:

10 "[+]\$103F-404[+] Treatment purchase of services. (a)
11 Treatment services may be purchased in accordance with this
12 section if [either or both of] the following circumstances [are
13 applicable:
14 (1) Such services may become necessary from time to time,

but cannot be anticipated accurately on an annual or

5	Contracts	for treatment services shall be awarded on the basis

8	(1)	The need for treatment services is unanticipated and
9		arises from time to time;
10	(2)	The required treatment services are for a one-time
11		purchase of no more than \$100,000 and last no longer
12		than one year;
13	(3)	The treatment services are generally accepted
14		practices by the industry or profession; and
15	(4)	The award of a contract is based on demonstrated
16		competence and qualification for the type of treatment
17		service required and at fair and reasonable prices.
18	(b)	[At a minimum, before the beginning of each fiscal
19	year, the	administrator] The head of the purchasing agency or
20	the purcha	asing agency's designee shall, at a minimum, publish a
21	notice des	scribing the types of treatment services that may be

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1 needed throughout the fiscal year on [a periodic] an as-needed 2 basis and inviting providers engaged in providing these 3 treatment services to submit current statements of qualification 4 and expressions of interest to the [office. The chief 5 procurement officer may specify a uniform format for statements 6 of qualifications.] purchasing agency. Providers may amend 7 these statements by filing an amended or new statement prior to 8 the date designated for submission. 9 The [administrator] head of the purchasing agency or (C) 10 the purchasing agency's designee shall form an initial review 11 committee for each profession, consisting of a minimum of three 12 employees from a state agency or agencies with sufficient 13 education, training, and licenses or credentials to evaluate the 14 statements of qualifications [which] that the [administrator] 15 head of the purchasing agency or the purchasing agency's 16 designee receives in response to the notice published pursuant 17 to subsection (b). The committee shall review and evaluate the 18 submissions and other pertinent information, including 19 references and reports, and prepare a list of qualified 20 providers to provide treatment services during the fiscal year. 21 Providers included on the list of qualified treatment providers

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1 may amend their statements of qualifications as necessary or 2 appropriate. Providers shall immediately inform the 3 [administrator] head of the purchasing agency of any changes in 4 information furnished [which] that would disqualify the provider 5 from being considered for a contract award.

6 (d) When the need to purchase treatment <u>services</u> arises,
7 the head of a purchasing agency shall select the provider most
8 qualified to provide the needed treatment <u>services</u> from the list
9 of qualified providers.

10 (e) The head of the purchasing agency $[\tau]$ or $[\frac{1}{2}]$ the 11 purchasing agency's designee $[\tau]$ shall negotiate a contract, 12 including a rate of compensation [which] that is fair and 13 reasonable, established in writing, and based upon the estimated 14 value, scope, nature, and complexity of the treatment services 15 to be rendered, or use the rate established by the 16 [administrator,] head of the purchasing agency, if any. Ιf 17 negotiations fail, upon written notice of an impasse to the 18 provider selected under subsection (d), the head of the 19 purchasing agency shall choose another provider from the list of 20 qualified providers, and conduct further negotiations.

21 Negotiations shall be conducted confidentially.

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1	(f) Contracts for treatment <u>services</u> in excess of \$100,000		
2	or <u>that last for more than</u> one year shall [be procured using		
3	section-103F-402, competitive purchase of services, unless a		
4	waiver of this-subsection is approved by the chief procurement		
5	officer.] utilize an alternative applicable method of		
6	procurement pursuant to section 103F-401."		
7	SECTION 3. Section 103F-405, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
8	amended to read as follows:		
9	"[+]§103F-405[+] Small purchases. Purchases of health and		
10	human services of less than $[\frac{25,000}{5}]$ are small		
11	purchases, and shall be made in accordance with [section 103D-		
12	305 and] rules adopted by the policy board to implement [that]		
13	this section. The threshold amount for goods and services set		
14	out in section 103D-305 shall also apply to this section."		
15	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed		
16	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.		
17	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.
