HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES TO STUDY PROVIDING CERTAIN HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR ALL CHILDREN AND PREGNANT PERSONS WHO WOULD OTHERWISE QUALIFY FOR COVERAGE IF NOT FOR THEIR IMMIGRATION STATUS.

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest that all pregnant 1 persons and children receive high quality health care that is 2 accessible, affordable, and equitable; and 3 4 WHEREAS, limitation of access to health care based solely 5 on immigration status results in many immigrants and their 6 families being unable to obtain affordable health care coverage 7 through Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program 8 (CHIP), and health insurance exchanges established under part II 9 of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act 10 (PPACA); and 11 12 WHEREAS, low-income immigrants without prenatal care are 13 seven times more likely to give birth prematurely and five times 14 more likely to experience neonatal death; and 15 16 WHEREAS, the average cost of medical care for health 17 problems resulting from premature birth is \$79,000, compared to 18 \$1,000 for a healthy birth; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the cost of hospitalizations during a severely 21 premature newborn's first year of life can exceed \$500,000, and 22 the cost of intensive care can exceed \$1,000,000; and 23 24 WHEREAS, lack of prenatal care results in health care costs 25 being passed on to taxpayers; and 26 27 WHEREAS, low-income immigrant children without access to 28 health insurance face persistent inequities in the prevention, 29 diagnosis, and treatment of health conditions, including routine 30 health problems and those commonly addressed with necessary 31 specialty care and mental health, substance abuse, and oral 32 33 health services; and 34

WHEREAS, children with special needs, including 1 difficulties with hearing, vision, mobility, self-care, 2 cognitive function, and work limitations may qualify for 3 Medicaid through various disability related pathways; and 4 5 WHEREAS, a 2021 study published in Academic Pediatrics 6 found that for each dollar spent on children through Medicaid, 7 the government saved \$4 on future costs, including 8 hospitalizations and emergency visits, and when the benefits to 9 children themselves are included, each dollar spent on Medicaid 10 coverage generates at least \$12.66; and 11 12 WHEREAS, state and federal laws deny access to Medicaid, 13 CHIP, and health insurance exchanges established under part II 14 of PPACA to all Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) 15 recipients; undocumented persons; and applicants without work 16 authorization attached to the applicant's request for registry, 17 order of supervision, cancellation of removal or suspension of 18 deportation, legalization under the Immigration Reform and 19 Control Act, legalization under the Legal Immigration Family 20 Equity Act, and asylum, except asylee children under fourteen 21 years old; and 22 23 WHEREAS, the State is home to an estimated 41,246 24 undocumented persons; and 25 26 WHEREAS, the State's undocumented and DACA-eligible 27 residents were born in the Philippines (54.6 percent); Japan 28 (9.3 percent); China (8.8 percent); Korea (6.2 percent); Mexico 29 (4.6 percent); and Europe, Canada, and other countries (16.5 30 percent) and paid an estimated \$66,000,000 in federal income 31 taxes and nearly \$45,000,000 in state and local taxes in 2018; 32 and 33 34 WHEREAS, approximately eleven thousand of the State's 35 undocumented persons are uninsured, and many who are insured 36 receive individual and family health insurance through the 37 Prepaid Health Care Act; and 38 39 WHEREAS, twenty-five states provide or will soon provide 40 health care coverage for prenatal care for all persons, 41 regardless of immigration status, and eleven states provide or 42

will soon provide CHIP benefits or coverage similar to Medicaid 1 to all children, regardless of immigration status; now, 2 3 therefore. 4 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 5 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 6 Session of 2023, that the Department of Human Services is 7 requested to study providing Medicaid, the Children's Health 8 Insurance Program, or similar health insurance coverage for all 9 children and pregnant persons who would otherwise qualify for 10 coverage under these programs if not for their immigration 11 status; and 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study include the health 14 care opportunities, resources, and costs relating to providing 15 the described coverages; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Human 18 Services is requested to engage applicable stakeholders in the 19 study, including immigrant health care providers, social service 20 providers, and advocacy groups; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Human 23 Services is requested to submit a report regarding the findings 24 of the study, including any proposed legislation, to the 25 Legislature no later than October 31, 2023; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 28 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Attorney General, 29 Director of Human Services, and President of the Inter-Agency 30 Council for Immigrant and Refugee Services. 31 32 33 34 OFFERED BY:
