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Hawaii design standards implementing the criteria (5) 1 pursuant to Act 5, Special Session Laws of Hawaii, 2 2005, as applicable to emergency shelters and 3 essential government facilities; and 4 5 WHEREAS, the process to obtain a building permit in the 6 State is often redundant, costly, and time consuming for 7 8 builders and residents; and 9 WHEREAS, the State Building Code Council should be required 10 to take into account the experiences and climate of the current 11 building industry, including economic impact on future buyers; 12 now, therefore, 13 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 15 16 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 17 Session of 2023, that the Governor is requested to convene a task force to examine and make recommendations on the existing 18 procedures for the adoption of the state building code; and 19 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to: 22 Consider whether the current state building code 23 (1) 24 adoption process is effective and relevant; 25 Consider whether county building codes should be (2) 26 eliminated in favor of a single statewide building 27 28 code; and 29 Examine the extended time frame and financial impacts 30 (3) that building code adoption has on construction and 31 32 housing prices in the State; and 33 34 (4) Review educational programs for stakeholders on impact 35 of building code changes; and 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to 37 consist of the following individuals: 38 39 40 (1)The Governor, or the Governor's designee, who is 41 requested to serve as the chairperson of the task 42 force;
