HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS TO CONDUCT A STUDY OF THE EXEMPTIONS TO HAWAII'S MINIMUM WAGE LAW.

1 2	WHEREAS, a living wage is a human right; and
- 3 4	WHEREAS, by Act 114, Session Laws of Hawaii 2022, the State incrementally increased Hawaii's minimum wage from \$12 per hour
4 5 6 7	beginning October 1, 2022, to \$18 per hour beginning January 1, 2028; and
8 9 10 11 12	WHEREAS, numerous exemptions to Hawaii's minimum wage law are contained in section 387-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which lists occupations that are excluded from the applicable definition of "employee"; and
13 14 15 16 17 18 19	WHEREAS, these exemptions include agricultural employees at farms employing less than twenty people, individuals engaged in coffee harvesting, domestic caretakers, administrative and supervisory employees, persons engaged in catching or harvesting fish, student employees of nonprofit schools, and many others; and
20 21 22 23 24 25	WHEREAS, while the federal Fair Labor Standards Act has declared certain jobs to be exempt from state and federal minimum wage laws, many modern scholars have argued that these provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act promote racism, sexism, and pay discrimination; and
26 27 28 29 30 31	WHEREAS, according to the National Low-Income Housing Coalition's Out of Reach 2022 report, a minimum wage employee must work one hundred twenty-three hours per week to afford a modest one-bedroom rental home at fair market rent in Hawaii; and

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WHEREAS, according to the Out of Reach 2022 report, a 1 minimum wage employee must work one hundred sixty-one hours per 2 week to afford a two-bedroom rental home at fair market rent in 3 4 Hawaii; and 5 WHEREAS, over sixty percent of households in the islands 6 7 are severely cost burdened, meaning that they pay more than thirty percent of their income on housing, a number that rises 8 to over eighty percent for extremely low-income households; and 9 10 WHEREAS, this body finds that the exemptions to Hawaii's 11 12 minimum wage law should be evaluated to determine if modifications are appropriate to ensure that working families 13 14 are able to meet their basic needs as Hawaii's high cost of 15 living continues to increase; now, therefore, 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 17 18 Thirty-second Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 19 Session of 2023, that the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations is requested to conduct a study of the exemptions to 20 Hawaii's minimum wage law; and 21 22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study is requested to 23 24 specifically consider the exemptions from the definition of "employee" that are contained in section 387-1, Hawaii Revised 25 Statutes, including whether any of those exemptions should be 26 27 repealed; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Labor and 30 Industrial Relations is requested to submit a report of its 31 findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior 32 to the convening of the Regular Session of 2024; and 33 34 35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 36 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, 37 and Director of Labor and Industrial Relations. 38 39 genipel 40 OFFERED BY:

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
