A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CLIMATE CHANGE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that climate change and
- 2 sea level rise pose significant, dangerous, and imminent threats
- 3 to the State's social and economic well-being, public safety,
- 4 nature and environment, cultural resources, property,
- 5 infrastructure, and government functions and will likely have a
- 6 disproportionate impact on low-income and otherwise vulnerable
- 7 communities. A 2017 report by the National Oceanic and
- 8 Atmospheric Administration projected that 3.2 feet of global
- 9 mean sea level rise will occur by 2100 in an intermediate
- 10 scenario and could occur as early as the 2060s in an extreme
- 11 scenario.
- 12 The climate change adaptation priority guidelines of the
- 13 Hawaii State Planning Act, codified under chapter 226, Hawaii
- 14 Revised Statutes, direct the State to prepare for the impacts of
- 15 climate change. Additionally, section 226-109(8), Hawaii
- 16 Revised Statutes, fosters cross-jurisdictional collaboration
- 17 between county, state, and federal agencies and partnerships

- 1 between government and private entities and other
- 2 nongovernmental entities, including nonprofit entities, to
- 3 address climate change. Also, section 225M-2(b)(9), Hawaii
- 4 Revised Statutes, requires the office of planning and
- 5 sustainable development to work with state agencies to identify
- 6 existing and planned facilities, including critical
- 7 infrastructure, that are vulnerable to sea level rise, flooding
- 8 impacts, and natural hazards, utilizing projections and map data
- 9 from the most recent update of the Hawaii sea level rise
- 10 vulnerability and adaptation report, the state hazard mitigation
- 11 plan, and other pertinent data and scientific reports to aid in
- 12 this planning.
- 13 The legislature recognizes that the Hawaii community
- 14 development authority plans, coordinates, and implements new
- 15 infrastructure and development projects in the Kaka'ako and
- 16 Kalaeloa community development districts on Oahu. Additionally,
- 17 the Kaka'ako community development district will be threatened by
- 18 the effects of climate change, including sea level rise, king
- 19 tides, and heavy rainfall, and the lack of drainage
- 20 infrastructure in the Kalaeloa community development district
- 21 makes it vulnerable to heavy rainfall and other effects of

- 1 climate change. As such, the legislature further finds that it
- 2 is in the State's long-term interest and would serve the highest
- 3 needs and aspirations of Hawaii's people to ensure that
- 4 development in the Kaka'ako and Kalaeloa community development
- 5 districts accounts and plans for the impacts of climate change.
- 6 Furthermore, it is in the long-term interest of the State
- 7 to also consider climate resiliency in the development of these
- 8 communities, which considers strategies to reduce the
- 9 vulnerability from climate-related shocks, such as hurricanes
- 10 and drought, and improves the ability to recover from these
- 11 disasters.
- 12 The purpose of this Act is to require the Hawaii community
- 13 development authority to consider the impacts of climate change,
- 14 sea level rise, and climate resilient development in the design
- 15 and siting of buildings in the Kaka'ako and Kalaeloa community
- 16 development districts.
- 17 SECTION 2. Section 206E-33, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 18 amended to read as follows:
- 20 development guidance policies. The following shall be the
- 21 development guidance policies generally governing the

1 authority's action in the Kakaako community development

2 district:

Development shall result in a community which permits 3 (1) 4 an appropriate land mixture of residential, 5 commercial, industrial, and other uses. In view of 6 the innovative nature of the mixed use approach, urban 7 design policies should be established to provide 8 quidelines for the public and private sectors in the 9 proper development of this district; while the 10 authority's development responsibilities apply only to 11 the area within the district, the authority may engage 12 in any studies or coordinative activities permitted in 13 this chapter which affect areas lying outside the 14 district, where the authority in its discretion 15 decides that those activities are necessary to 16 implement the intent of this chapter. The studies or 17 coordinative activities shall be limited to facility systems, resident and industrial relocation, and other 18 19 activities with the counties and appropriate state 20 agencies. The authority may engage in construction 21 activities outside of the district; provided that such

3		provided further, notwithstanding section 206E-7, that
4		such construction shall comply with the general plan,
5		development plan, ordinances, and rules of the county
6		in which the district is located;
7	(2)	Existing and future industrial uses shall be permitted
8		and encouraged in appropriate locations within the
9		district. No plan or implementation strategy shall
10		prevent continued activity or redevelopment of
11		industrial and commercial uses which meet reasonable
12		performance standards;
13	(3)	Activities shall be located so as to provide primary
14		reliance on public transportation and pedestrian
15		facilities for internal circulation within the
16		district or designated subareas;
17	(4)	Major view planes, view corridors, and other
18		environmental elements such as natural light and
19		prevailing winds, shall be preserved through necessary
20		regulation and design review; provided that no portion

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1		of any building or structure in the Kakaako Mauka area
2		shall exceed four hundred eighteen feet in height;
3	(5)	Redevelopment of the district shall be compatible with
4		plans and special districts established for the Hawaii
5		Capital District, and other areas surrounding the
6		Kakaako district;
7	(6)	Historic sites and culturally significant facilities,
8		settings, or locations shall be preserved;
9	(7)	Land use activities within the district, where
10		compatible, shall to the greatest possible extent be
11		mixed horizontally, that is, within blocks or other
12		land areas, and vertically, as integral units of
13		multi-purpose structures;
14	(8)	Residential development may require a mixture of
15		densities, building types, and configurations in
16		accordance with appropriate urban design guidelines;
17		integration both vertically and horizontally of
18		residents of varying incomes, ages, and family groups;
19		and an increased supply of housing for residents of
20		low- or moderate-income may be required as a condition
21		of redevelopment in residential use. Residential

1		development shall provide necessary community
2		facilities, such as open space, parks, community
3		meeting places, child care centers, and other
4		services, within and adjacent to residential
5		development; [and]
6	(9)	Public facilities within the district shall be
7		planned, located, and developed so as to support the
8		redevelopment policies for the district established by
9		this chapter and plans and rules adopted pursuant to
10		it[+];
11	(10)	Development shall consider the impacts of climate
12		change, sea level rise, and climate resilient
13		development in the design and siting of buildings; and
14	(11)	Development shall implement design standards for new
15		construction that require the lowest finished floor to
16		elevate a minimum of two feet above the flood
17		insurance rate map base flood elevation or 5.8 feet
18		above mean higher high water, whichever is higher,
19		based on the latest guidance from the climate change
20		commission of the city and county of Honolulu."

- 5 (4) The authority may engage in planning, design, and construction activities within and outside of the 6 7 district; provided that activities outside of the district shall relate to infrastructure development, 8 9 area-wide drainage improvements, roadways realignments and improvements, business and industrial relocation, 10 11 and other activities the authority deems necessary to 12 carry out redevelopment of the district and implement 13 this chapter. Studies or coordinating activities may 14 be undertaken by the authority in conjunction with the 15 county and appropriate state agencies and may address facility systems, industrial relocation, and other 16 17 activities;
 - (5) Planning, replanning, rehabilitation, development, redevelopment, and other preparation for reuse of Barbers Point Naval Air Station under this chapter are

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1		public uses and purposes for which public money may be
2		spent and private property acquired;
3	(6)	Hawaiian archaeological, historic, and cultural sites
4		shall be preserved and protected. Endangered species
5		of flora and fauna and significant military facilities
6		shall be preserved to the extent feasible;
7	(7)	Land use and redevelopment activities within the
8		district shall be coordinated with and to the extent
9		possible complement existing county and state
10		policies, plans, and programs affecting the district;
11		[and]
12	(8)	Public facilities within the district shall be
13		planned, located, and developed to support the
14		redevelopment policies established by this chapter for
15		the district, the reuse plan approved by the governor,
16		and rules adopted pursuant to this chapter $[+]_{\underline{i}}$
17	(9)	Development shall consider the impacts of climate
18		change, sea level rise, and climate resilient
19		development in the design and siting of buildings; and
20	(10)	Development shall implement design standards for new
21		construction that require lowest finished floor to



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1	elevate a minimum of two feet above the flood
2	insurance rate map base flood elevation or 5.8 feet
3	above mean higher high water, whichever is higher,
4	based on the latest guidance from the climate change
5	commission of the city and county of Honolulu."
6	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
7	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
8	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
