# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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SECTION	1.	The	legislature	finds	that	the	Hawaii

- 2 coordinated access resource entry system (Hawaii CARES) is
- 3 overseen by the department of health's behavioral health
- 4 administration and is managed by two separately contracted
- 5 entities: one specializing in mental health crisis response,
- 6 and one specializing in substance use disorder treatment
- 7 referrals. On October 1, 2019, contracts commenced to form a
- 8 statewide network of service providers that is focused around
- 9 crisis intervention, substance use disorder treatment, mental
- 10 health, and other behavioral health services. These service
- 11 providers are contracted through the administration's three
- 12 behavioral health divisions: adult mental health division,
- 13 child and adolescent mental health division, and alcohol and
- 14 drug abuse division.
- 15 Hawaii CARES, through its crisis helpline, a statewide
- 16 crisis call line open twenty-four hours a day, seven days a
- 17 week, connects Hawaii residents who are experiencing a mental



- 1 health crisis with appropriate service providers to reduce
- 2 unnecessary hospitalizations and arrests, and provides continual
- 3 care by staying in touch with the individual and providers
- 4 throughout the duration of treatment. Services provided through
- 5 Hawaii CARES include:

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- 6 (1) Suicide crisis hotline services that provide
  7 therapeutic support and de-escalation techniques to
  8 active suicidal callers and connects them with crisis
  9 services;
- 10 (2) Crisis support management services, a temporary
  11 thirty-day case management service provided when
  12 requested by the crisis mobile outreach team, which
  13 provides face-to-face contact with each individual
  14 within twenty-four hours after receiving a referral
  15 and maximum effort to support and assist while linking
  16 the individual to additional services;
  - (3) Crisis mobile outreach services that send out local crisis therapists to callers experiencing a mental health crisis in a variety of community settings to provide them with face-to-face, short term, intensive mental health services; trauma informed care response

1		with initial screening and comprehensive assessment;
2		and assistance in returning to their baseline level of
3		functionality;
4	(4)	Licensed crisis residential shelters offered on a
5		temporary ten-day admission basis for purposes of
6		stabilizing and preventing serious mental health
7		decompensation, psychotic breaks, or hospitalization
8		to individuals in crisis who would continue to be at
9		high risk without the benefit of the twenty-four-hour
10		support services; and
11	(5)	Bed stabilization services, provided to individuals in
12		crisis with mental health concerns or a substance use
13		disorder and in need of a stabilization bed as a
14		bridge or a long-term solution in their continuum of
15		care, with case managers assigned to individuals to
16		ensure wrap-around service as needed.
17	Hawa	ii CARES will also coordinate crisis intervention and
18	diversion	for individuals who may be appropriate to receive
19	services p	provided through a certified community behavioral
20	health cl	inic. Hawaii's certified community behavioral health

clinic model includes state-operated clinics that are

- 1 responsible for coordinating with contracted service providers
- 2 to provide crisis behavioral health services and integrate
- 3 behavioral health with physical health care.
- 4 In addition to receiving calls made directly to its crisis
- 5 helpline, Hawaii CARES serves as Hawaii's local crisis center
- 6 for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, now known as the
- 7 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, a national network of two
- 8 hundred local crisis centers established by the federal
- 9 government to assist individuals in suicidal crisis or emotional
- 10 distress to connect with suicide prevention and mental health
- 11 support services at any time of the day or night. Calls to the
- 12 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline, which can be made by dialing
- 13 "9-8-8" or a ten-digit, toll-free number, 1-800-273-TALK (8255),
- 14 are routed to a certified local crisis center closest to the
- 15 caller, as determined by the caller's area code. For Hawaii,
- 16 calls made from within the State to the 988 Suicide and Crisis
- 17 Lifeline are routed to the Hawaii CARES crisis helpline.
- In 2020, the Hawaii CARES crisis helpline received 138,856
- 19 calls, which amounts to more than three hundred thirty calls per
- 20 day on average. The volume of calls has increased following the
- 21 transition of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline's

4	that individua	ls who access the Hawaii CARES crisis helpline

7	crisis care co	ordination, the behavioral health administration			
8	requires funds	to improve or establish the necessary technology			
9	and infrastruc	ture, retain necessary personnel, and expand and			
10	enhance existing services provided by contracted service				
11	providers through the Hawaii CARES crisis helpline, including:				
12	(1) Expa	nding and enhancing suicide crisis hotline and			
13	cris	is management services by:			
14	(A)	Providing high-quality crisis counseling;			
15	(B)	Providing in-person intervention by trained			
16		mental health professionals as an alternative to			
17		law enforcement personnel;			
18	(C)	Improving the coordination of linkages for			
19		individuals contacting the Hawaii CARES crisis			
20		helpline directly or through the 988 Suicide and			
21		Crisis Lifeline with ongoing care needs; and			

1		(D)	Improving and expanding the use of tele-crisis
2			support technology;
3	(2)	Expa	nding and enhancing crisis mobile outreach
4	•	serv	ices in each county by:
5		(A)	Ensuring that the mobile crisis outreach system
6			meets standards as defined by title 42 United
7			States Code section 1396w-6; and
8		(B)	Establishing preventive youth crisis teams that
9			respond to calls from law enforcement personnel
10			requesting behavioral health assessment,
11			referral, and crisis care for youth who witnessed
12			or participated in potentially traumatic events,
13			to address current behavioral health crises and
14			also prevent future crises;
15	(3)	Expa	nding licensed crisis residential shelter services
16		by a	cquiring a sixteen-bed facility to house sub-acute
17		beds	to help stabilize youth, improve their condition,
18		and :	prevent future decompensations, homelessness,
19		hosp	italizations, and the involvement of law
20	-	enfo	rcement agencies;

1	(4)	Expanding bed stabilization services by adding forty
2		adult stabilization beds across all counties; and
3	(5)	Expanding the crisis care continuum to include the
4		operation of a certified community behavioral health
5		clinics on Kauai, Maui, and Hawaii islands.
6	The	purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to
7	accommoda	te the increase in the volume of calls received by the
8	Hawaii CA	RES crisis helpline and ensure that individuals who
9	access the	e Hawaii CARES crisis helpline directly or through the
10	988 Suici	de and Crisis Lifeline are provided with appropriate
11	crisis in	tervention services and crisis care coordination.
12	SECT	ION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
13	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
14	much there	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
15	the same	sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
16	year 2024	-2025 to fund the expansion and enhancement of the
17	suicide c	risis hotline and crisis management services provided
18	by contrac	cted service providers through the Hawaii CARES crisis
19	helpline;	provided that the funds shall be used to cover
20	expenses	for services, including the provision of high-quality
21	crisis co	unseling and in-person intervention by trained mental

- 1 health professionals as an alternative to law enforcement
- 2 personnel; improvement of coordination with individuals who
- 3 contact the Hawaii CARES crisis helpline directly or through the
- 4 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline with ongoing care needs; and
- 5 enhancement and expansion of the use of tele-crisis support
- 6 technology.
- 7 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 8 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 9 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 11 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
- 12 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 13 year 2024-2025 for the expansion and enhancement of the crisis
- 14 mobile outreach services provided by contracted service
- 15 providers through the Hawaii CARES crisis helpline; provided
- 16 that, of the sums appropriated:
- 17 (1) \$ shall be expended for providing access to
- an on-call registered nurse, emergency medical
- 19 technician, or paramedic to crisis mobile outreach
- teams for on-call remote real-time consultation;

1	(2)	snail be expended for on-call remote real-
2		time consultation to be used by an on-call registered
3		nurse, emergency medical technician, or paramedic for
4		real-time consultation with crisis mobile outreach
5		teams; and
6	(3)	\$ shall be expended for the establishment of
7		preventive youth crisis teams that respond to calls
8		from law enforcement personnel requesting behavioral
9		health assessment, referral, and crisis care for youth
10		who witnessed or participated in potentially traumatic
11		events.
12	The s	sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
13	of health	for the purposes of this Act.

15	revenues o	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
16	much there	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
17	the same s	sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
18	year 2024-	-2025 for the expansion of licensed crisis residential
19	shelter se	ervices provided by contracted service providers
20	through th	ne Hawaii CARES crisis helpline, by acquiring a
21	facility t	to house sixteen sub-acute beds to help stabilize

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- 1 youth, improve their condition, and prevent future
- 2 decompensations, homelessness, hospitalizations, and involvement
- 3 of law enforcement agencies.
- 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 5 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 8 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
- 9 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 10 year 2024-2025 to fund the expansion of bed stabilization
- 11 services provided by contracted service providers through the
- 12 Hawaii CARES crisis helpline, by adding forty adult
- 13 stabilization beds across all counties.
- 14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 15 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 18 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
- 19 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 20 year 2024-2025 for nineteen full-time equivalent (19.0 FTE)

- 1 positions to support the operations of the certified community
- 2 behavioral health clinics on Kauai, Maui, and Hawaii islands.
- 3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 4 of health for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000.

Appropriates funds for the expansion and enhancement of the suicide crisis hotline and crisis management services provided by contracted service providers through the Hawaii Coordinated Access Resource Entry System (CARES) Crisis Helpline; expansion and enhancement of the crisis mobile outreach services provided by contracted service providers through the Hawaii CARES Crisis Helpline; expansion of licensed crisis residential shelter services provided by contracted service providers through the Hawaii CARES Crisis Helpline; expansion of bed stabilization services provided by contracted service providers through the Hawaii CARES Crisis Helpline; and expansion of certified community behavioral health clinics with services coordinated through the Hawaii CARES crisis helpline.
