A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO COFFEE PEST CONTROL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that coffee is one of the 2 largest agricultural crops in the State and is a highly valued 3 commodity in Hawai'i's economy. In recent years, the coffee 4 berry borer, a small beetle, has infested coffee crops in the 5 Kona and Ka'ū regions of Hawai'i island, and more recently has been detected on O'ahu, Maui, Kaua'i, and Lana'i. In 2020, coffee 6 7 leaf rust, caused by a fungal pathogen, was discovered for the first time in the State on Maui and Hawai'i island. These two 8 9 pests threaten the viability of the State's entire coffee 10 industry. Efforts to control coffee berry borer and coffee leaf 11 rust are critical to the local coffee industry, and it is 12 incumbent upon the State to continue to support these efforts. 13 The legislature further finds that in response to these 14 threats to the industry, the coffee berry borer pesticide 15 subsidy program was established by Act 105, Session Laws of 16 Hawaii 2014 (Act 105), to assist Hawai'i coffee farmers with 17 cffsetting the cost of pesticides containing the fungus

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1 Beauveria bassiana, which is known to control coffee berry 2 borer. Due to a longer-than-anticipated implementation of Act 3 105, in 2017, the legislature extended the pesticide subsidy 4 program from its original sunset date of June 30, 2019, to 5 June 30, 2021, via Act 65, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017 (Act 65). 6 After continued programmatic success and the initial discovery 7 of coffee leaf rust in the islands, in 2021, the legislature 8 extended the pesticide subsidy program for another two years, 9 adding a subsidy for coffee leaf rust pesticides.

10 As of December 9, 2022, the department of agriculture has 11 received nine hundred eighty receipts for reimbursement under 12 the coffee berry borer pesticide subsidy program, expending a 13 total of \$812,319.99 for the mitigation of coffee berry borer 14 and coffee leaf rust throughout the State. The legislature 15 finds that, as illustrated by program demand, coffee berry borer 16 and coffee leaf rust continue to pose a severe threat to the 17 State's coffee industry, and it is incumbent upon the State to 18 continue supporting farmers' mitigative efforts, including 19 through reducing the financial burden of having to purchase 20 certain pesticides at market value.

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1	The	legislature additionally finds that in addition to
2	pesticide	s, fertilizers are also vital to soil health and plant
3	nutrition	, which can improve the health of coffee plants and
4	their res	istance to pests and thereby ultimately increase the
5	quantity	and quality of Hawaii's premium coffee crop.
6	Ассо	rdingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
7	(1)	Include the costs to purchase certain fertilizers
8		under the grant subsidies provided through the
9		pesticide subsidy program;
10	(2)	Rename the program as the pesticide and fertilizer
11		subsidy program and the manager position as the
12		pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program manager;
13	(3)	Extend the pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program to
14		June 30, 2025;
15	(4)	Extend the pesticide and fertilizer subsidy manager
16		position, including the position's exemptions from
17		civil service and collective bargaining laws, until
18		June 30, 2026; and
19	(5)	Appropriate funds for the program and program manager
20		position.

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1 SECTION 2. Act 105, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014, as 2 amended by section 1 of Act 152, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015, as 3 amended by section 2 of Act 65, Session Laws of Hawaii 2017, as amended by section 2 of Act 32, Session Laws of Hawaii 2018, as 4 5 amended by section 43 of Act 111, Session Laws of Hawaii 2019, 6 as amended by section 2 of Act 138, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021, 7 is amended as follows: 8 1. By amending section 3 to read: 9 "SECTION 3. (a) There is established in the department of 10 agriculture a pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program to be administered by the department beginning on July 1, 2014, and 11 12 ending on June 30, [2023.] 2025. The department shall grant 13 subsidies to coffee growers to assist the coffee growers in 14 cffsetting the costs of purchasing any pesticide or fertilizer 15 that is listed by the department pursuant to subsection (f). 16 (b) Applications for subsidies by coffee growers shall be 17 submitted on a form furnished by the department and shall be 18 filed with accompanying documentation of the costs of purchasing the pesticide[;] or fertilizer; provided that: 19 20 (1)The applicant shall indemnify and hold harmless the 21 State and its officers, agents, and employees from all

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1 claims arising out of or resulting from the pesticide 2 or fertilizer purchased; and 3 The department may request that an applicant provide (2) 4 necessary information for the purposes of verifying 5 the size or sale weight, as applicable, and amount of 6 the pesticide or fertilizer purchased. 7 Documentation of pesticide or fertilizer costs, as (C) 8 requested by the department, shall be filed for pesticides or 9 fertilizers purchased within the immediately preceding fiscal 10 year of filing and shall be effective for pesticide or 11 fertilizer costs incurred after June 30, 2014, and before July 12 1, [2023.] 2025. 13 (d) Funds shall be disbursed upon approval on an annual basis by the department to the coffee grower for up to 14 15 [seventy-five]: 16 Seventy-five per cent of the costs incurred for the (1)17 purchase of the pesticide or fertilizer before July 1, 18 2016[, and for up to fifty]; 19 (2) Fifty per cent of the costs incurred for the purchase 20 of the pesticide or fertilizer for the period

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1 beginning after June 30, 2016, and before July 1, 2 2023[-]; and 3 (3) Seventy-five per cent of the costs incurred for the 4 purchase of the pesticide or fertilizer for the period 5 beginning July 1, 2023, through June 30, 2025. 6 (e) The department shall aggregate the total subsidy 7 applications pursuant to this section and divide and distribute 8 the available subsidy funds on a pro rata basis; provided that 9 no single coffee grower shall receive subsidies that are more 10 than \$600 per year for coffee berry borer control and more than 11 \$600 per year for coffee leaf rust control per acre of land in 12 coffee production; provided further that no single coffee grower 13 shall receive subsidies that are more than \$9,000 per year; provided further that no single coffee grower shall receive 14 15 subsidies that total more than \$6,000 per year for the period 16 after June 30, 2018, and before July 1, 2021; provided further 17 that no single coffee grower shall receive subsidies that total 18 more than \$12,000 per year for the period after June 30, 2021, 19 and before July 1, [2023.] 2025.

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(f) The department shall establish a list of [pesticides]:

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1	(1)	Pesticides that are registered with the United States
2		Environmental Protection Agency and are licensed with
3		the State that contain <i>Beauveria bassiana</i> , a fungus
4		known to eradicate the coffee berry borer, as an
5		active ingredient[. The department shall also
6		establish a list of pesticides];
7	(2)	Pesticides that are registered with the United States
8		Environmental Protection Agency; are licensed with the
9		State; and are contact and systemic fungicides that,
10		when combined, are effective against coffee leaf
11		<pre>rust[-]; and</pre>
12	(3)	Fertilizers that are synthetic substances allowed for
13		use in organic crop production under the National List
14		of Allowed and Prohibited Substances pursuant to
15		title 7 Code of Federal Regulations section 205.601
16		and approved by the department for use on coffee
17		plants.
18	(g)	There is established within the department a pesticide
19	and ferti	lizer subsidy program manager position, which shall be
20	a full-ti	me, temporary position exempt from chapters 76 and 89,
21	Hawaii Re	vised Statutes. The pesticide <u>and fertilizer</u> subsidy

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1	program manager shall possess a requisite level of knowledge and
2	expertise in the area of program management necessary to carry
3	out the duties of the position. The pesticide and fertilizer
4	subsidy program manager shall:
5	(1) Facilitate the efficient division and distribution of
6	available subsidy funds; and
7	(2) Manage the day-to-day coordination for the pesticide
8	and fertilizer subsidy program.
9	The pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program manager shall
10	receive a salary of not more than \$50,000 per year. The
11	pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program manager position,
12	including the position's exemption from chapters 76 and 89,
13	Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall expire on June 30, [2024.] <u>2026.</u>
14	(h) Not later than twenty days prior to the convening of
15	the regular session of $[\frac{2023}{7}]$ 2025, the department shall submit
16	a report of its findings and recommendations, including any
17	proposed legislation, to the legislature on the results of the
18	subsidy program and whether the program should be allowed to
19	expire or be extended, and if extended, with or without
20	modification.

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1	(i) Actions taken by the department pursuant to this	
2	section shall be exempt from the rulemaking requirements of	
3	section 91-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes.	
4	(j) As used in this Act, "department" means the department	
5	of agriculture."	
6	2. By amending section 6 to read:	
7	"SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2014;	
8	provided that:	
9	(1) Section 3 shall be repealed on June 30, [2023,] <u>2025,</u>	
10	except that section 3(g) shall be repealed on June 30,

12	(2) The amendment made to section 149A-13.5(b), Hawaii

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1 and best practices in a manner consistent with state 2 and federal law; 3 (3) To develop integrated pest management strategies, the 4 pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program created under 5 Act 105, Session Laws of Hawaii 2014, and other 6 services for pesticide users such as the agricultural 7 pest control industry, the structural pest control 8 industry, and consumer users of pesticides, which 9 provide pesticide instruction in areas, including but 10 not limited to the collection, disposal, and recycling 11 of pesticide containers; and 12 (4) For all other pesticide services deemed necessary by 13 the department. 14 Moneys from the revolving fund may be used for personnel, 15 services, materials, and equipment for the purposes of this 16 section. 17 Moneys expended by the department from the pesticide use 18 revolving fund for training workshops, educational programs, and other services for the agricultural pest control industry, the 19

20 structural pest control industry, and consumer groups shall be

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1 expended in a manner that appropriately addresses the needs of 2 each category of pesticide user."

3 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and
6 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
7 year 2024-2025 to be deposited into the pesticide use revolving
8 fund established under section 149A-13.5, Hawaii Revised
9 Statutes.

SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the pesticide use revolving fund the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the operation and implementation of the pesticide subsidy and fertilizer program.

16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department17 of agriculture for the purposes of this Act.

18 SECTION 6 Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed19 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

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SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000;
 provided that sections 4 and 5 of this Act shall take effect on
 July 1, 2050.

Extends the sunset date for the coffee berry borer and coffee leaf rust pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program to 6/30/2025 and the program manager position, including the position's civil service and collective bargaining laws exemption, to 6/30/2026. Requires the Department of Agriculture to report to the Legislature. Appropriates funds for the operation and implementation of the pesticide and fertilizer subsidy program. Effective 6/30/3000; provided that the appropriation shall take effect on 7/1/2050. (HD1)
