## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that access to health
 care is often complicated for rural residents. Many of the
 State's specialty practices are located in the urban portions of
 Oahu, and many medical specialists are unwilling to practice in
 underserved rural areas of the State. This inherent barrier to
 care underscores the severe need for comprehensive health care
 coordination in rural areas.

8 The legislature further finds that the department of 9 health's office of primary care and rural health, in partnership 10 with community organizations such as Community First, conducted 11 a community health needs assessment for Hawaii island titled "Access to Care -- Health for Our Communities". The assessment 12 13 analyzes 3,287 resident survey responses and identifies delays 14 in health care delivery as residents' greatest obstacle to care. 15 Nearly six in ten respondents report delays, often due to the 16 limited availability of specialists.

The legislature further finds that larger societal 1 concerns, including affordable housing, the State's high cost of 2 living, transportation difficulties, and child care challenges 3 4 are barriers to care that disproportionately affect residents of underserved rural areas. To ensure health equity, the State 5 must look beyond the symptoms of social determinants of health 6 7 to address the root causes of negative health outcomes that 8 disproportionately affect rural communities, low-income 9 communities, communities of color, and sexual and gender 10 minorities.

The legislature further finds that coordinated efforts at 11 12 all levels are necessary to examine social determinants that impact a community's access to health care resources and to 13 14 improve public health. The establishment of a strong health 15 network in underserved areas would allow these areas to 16 efficiently develop health care plans that encompass preventative and primary health care, specialty care, and urgent 17 18 and emergency care. Comprehensive plans to align health care 19 priorities with existing resources will foster collaboration 20 between providers, avoid service duplication, and streamline 21 care delivery for the State's most vulnerable residents.

There is appropriated out of the general 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 8 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 9 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 10 year 2024-2025 for the establishment of one permanent full-time 11 equivalent (1.0 FTE) program specialist IV position within the 12 department of health's family health services division to: 13 (1) Oversee the development of community plans; and 14 (2) Coordinate efforts across departments and nonprofit 15 community partners to address the social determinants 16 of health and health equity issues affecting 17 underserved rural areas statewide: 18 provided that the funds shall support travel and activities 19 necessary for the development of the community plans. 20 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 21 of health for the purposes of this Act.
