A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KUPUNA HOUSING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness is one
- 2 of the most pressing problems in Hawaii and requires a robust,
- 3 comprehensive, long-term solution to address the State's
- 4 affordable housing and homelessness crisis. One important
- 5 component of the solution is ensuring that low-income kupuna are
- 6 not forced into homelessness through a combination of fixed
- 7 incomes and rapidly rising rents.
- 8 The legislature further finds that, over the last fifty
- 9 years, the number of cost-burdened renters, or those paying more
- 10 than thirty per cent of their income for rent, has significantly
- 11 increased. Today, almost half of all renters in the State pay
- 12 more than thirty per cent of their income for rent. High
- 13 housing costs have driven more and more Hawaii residents into
- 14 homelessness, and now the homelessness rate per capita in Hawaii
- 15 is among the highest in the nation.
- 16 The legislature additionally finds that, by making smart
- 17 investments in homelessness and housing, using data-driven



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- 1 practices, and improving coordination, Hawaii has gradually
- 2 begun to turn the tide in the homelessness crisis. In 2017,
- 3 Hawaii's homelessness rate went down for the first time in
- 4 years, a trend that continued in 2018. During the regular
- 5 session of 2018, the legislature made unprecedented investments
- 6 in low-income housing and homelessness, appropriating
- 7 \$200,000,000 for the rental housing revolving fund, \$30,000,000
- 8 for ohana zones, and \$13,500,000 for proven-effective and
- 9 promising homelessness programs.
- 10 The legislature also finds that, to turn back fifty years
- 11 of growth in Hawaii's housing and homelessness crisis,
- 12 investments of this scale must be made consistently in the
- 13 coming years. Hawaii must prioritize programs that are the most
- 14 cost-effective and protect the most vulnerable populations,
- 15 including the State's kupuna. The 2017 Hawaii Homeless Service
- 16 Utilization Report found that there are 1,386 homeless elders in
- 17 the State. Many more elders face homelessness as rents
- 18 skyrocket. Due to elders' fixed incomes, a state rent
- 19 supplement program for kupuna is needed to expand on the
- 20 existing state rent supplement program administered by the
- 21 Hawaii public housing authority.

	Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to temporarily		
2	expand the state rent supplement program specifically for		
3	qualified kupuna who are sixty-two years of age or older and ar		
4	homeless, or at imminent risk of becoming homeless, and to		
5	appropriate funds for this purpose.		
6	SECTION 2. Chapter 356D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
7	amended by adding a new section to part VIII to be appropriately		
8	designated and to read as follows:		
9	" <u>§35</u>	6D- State rent supplement program for kupuna. (a)	
10	There is established the state rent supplement program for		
11	kupuna to be administered by the authority to provide state ren		
12	supplement assistance and other services to qualified kupuna		
13	under this section.		
14	(b)	The authority shall:	
15	(1)	Provide state rent supplement assistance to qualified	
16		kupuna; provided that a person who qualifies for the	
17		state rent supplement program for kupuna shall	
18		participate in the continuum of care coordinated entry	
19		system for homeless services;	
20	(2)	Provide housing counseling and landlord assistance to	
21		qualified kupuna; and	

1	<u>(3)</u>	Coordinate with mental health services providers and	
2		other supportive services providers to assist	
3		qualified kupuna in obtaining or retaining permanent	
4		housing.	
5	(c)	The authority may enter into memoranda of agreement	
6	with the	counties or specialized non-profit organizations as	
7	necessary	to implement this section.	
8	<u>(d)</u>	The authority shall be exempt from chapter 103D in	
.9	selecting	a qualified non-profit organization to administer the	
. 10	state ren	t supplement program for kupuna, and shall, without	
11	regard to chapter 91, establish rules and qualification		
12	standards	for recipients of the state rent supplement program	
13	for kupun	<u>a.</u>	
14	(e)	The authority shall submit to the legislature an	
15	annual re	port of its findings and recommendations regarding the	
16	state ren	t supplement program for kupuna, including any proposed	
17	legislati	on, no later than thirty days prior to the convening of	
18	each regu	lar session.	
19	<u>(f)</u>	As used in this section, "qualified kupuna" means a	
20	person wh	o is sixty-two years of age or older and is homeless,	
21	or at imm	inent risk of becoming homeless, and who otherwise	

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1 meets the requirements for a qualified tenant under section 2 356D-153." 3 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so 5 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2023-2024 and 6 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2024-2025 for the state rent supplement program for kupuna 7 8 established under section 356D- , Hawaii Revised Statutes, 9 full-time equivalent (FTE) public housing including 10 specialist positions within the Hawaii public housing authority; 11 provided that any funds appropriated under this section shall be 12 in addition to the base budget of the Hawaii public housing 13 authority for the state rent supplement program. 14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the Hawaii 15 public housing authority for the purposes of this Act. 16 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on June 30, 3000,

and shall be repealed on June 30, 2026.
