## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION TO DEVELOP A STRATEGIC PLAN TO MEET THE LOCALLY SOURCED FOOD GOALS ESTABLISHED IN ACTS 175 AND 176, SESSION LAWS OF HAWAII 2021.

WHEREAS, the Department of Education (Department) provides 1 an estimated 120,000 meals per day to Hawaii's keiki; and 2 3 WHEREAS, pursuant to Act 175, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021 4 (Act 175), the Department has a school food goal of thirty 5 percent of food served in public schools to consist of locally 6 sourced products by 2030; and 7 8 9 WHEREAS, pursuant to Act 176, Session Laws of Hawaii 2021 (Act 176), each principal department of the State that purchases 10 produce is required to ensure that a certain percentage of 11 produce purchased is fresh local agricultural products and local 12 value-added, processed, agricultural or food products, with a 13 fifty percent minimum by 2050; and 14 15 WHEREAS, local farm to school and institution goals were 16 17 set years out to provide the Department with ample time to coordinate with local producers to develop long-term commitments 18 and scale production through 2050 and beyond; and 19 20 21 WHEREAS, the Department's existing budget for the School Food Services Program is estimated at \$100,000,000, with 22 23 \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000 dedicated to food purchasing; and 24 25 WHEREAS, according to the Department's 2022 report to the Legislature, the Department encumbered ten percent of its total 26 food budget on local fresh and processed food for its meal 27 28 programs; and 29



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1 WHEREAS, according to the Department's 2023 report to the 2 Legislature, the Department encumbered 6.2 percent of its 2022 total food budget of \$50,500,000 on local fresh and processed 3 food for its meal programs; and 4 5 WHEREAS, according to the Department of Agriculture, in 6 2021-2022, Hawaii fresh produce sales for vegetables, melons, 7 tropical fruits, eggs, bananas, papayas, and taro were 8 \$118,700,000; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the Department's local produce purchases during 11 the 2022 calendar year are equal to 0.82 percent of a sample of 12 Hawaii grown fresh produce sales, showing that local producers 13 are able to provide more than enough local products to meet our 14 local food goals; and 15 16 WHEREAS, considering that the Department buys local produce 17 from large distributors that markup the price charged by the 18 farmer by an estimated 50 percent, it is likely that the 19 Department's local produce purchases in 2022 are actually 0.54 20 percent of the sample of Hawaii grown fresh produce sales that 21 can be verified with Department of Agriculture reports; and 22 23 24 WHEREAS, the Department has learned many valuable lessons with the Farm to School pilot programs in Kohala and Mililani, 25 demonstrating that school menu development, local food 26 purchasing, and scratch cooking can all provide healthy, 27 nutritious meals to our children while also responsibly saving 28 millions of dollars due to less waste and inefficiencies; and 29 30 WHEREAS, during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Department 31 cancelled farm to school contracts like the Hawaii Ulu 32 Cooperative and the 'Aina Pono Meal of the Month program; and 33 34 WHEREAS, the Department's Farm to School Coordinator is an 35 important position to support connecting the Department with 36 local farmers and ranchers to increase local food procurement, 37 38 however that position was vacant for years; and 39 40 WHEREAS, the Department has stated that they will seek a central kitchen model on Oahu to achieve its local food 41 42 procurement meals goal; and
