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1 (4) The National Electrical Code, as published by the National Fire Protection Association; and 2 3 4 (5) Hawaii design standards implementing the criteria 5 pursuant to Act 5, Special Session Laws of Hawaii, 2005, as applicable to emergency shelters and 6 7 essential government facilities; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the process to obtain a building permit in the 10 State is often redundant, costly, and time consuming for builders and residents; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the State Building Code Council should be required 13 to take into account the experiences and climate of the current 14 15 building industry, including economic impact on future buyers; now, therefore, 16 17 18 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 19 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Governor is 20 requested to convene a task force to examine and make 21 22 recommendations on the existing procedures for the adoption of 23 the state building code; and 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to: 26 27 (1) Consider whether the current state building code adoption process is effective and relevant; 28 29 30 (2) Consider whether county building codes should be 31 eliminated in favor of a single statewide building 32 code; and 33 34 (3) Examine the extended time frame and financial impacts 35 that building code adoption has on construction and 36 housing prices in the State; and 37 38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to 39 consist of the following individuals: 40
