## SENATE RESOLUTION

URGING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY AND ITS SUCCESSOR AGENCY, THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS AND REHABILITATION, TO ACQUIRE THE HONOLULU FEDERAL DETENTION CENTER AND REQUESTING HAWAII'S CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO ASSIST IN NEGOTIATING WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE ACQUISITION OF THE HONOLULU FEDERAL DETENTION CENTER.

1 WHEREAS, in 2001, the federal Bureau of Prisons opened the Honolulu Federal Detention Center, located west of Daniel K. 2 Inouye International Airport; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Honolulu Federal Detention Center houses male 5 and female federal pre-trial detainees, sentenced felons who 6 have nearly completed their prison terms, and Hawaii inmates who 7 are awaiting trial in state court, at an occupancy rate far 8 9 below the facility's potential capacity of one thousand two hundred beds; and 10 11 WHEREAS, the Honolulu Federal Detention Center currently 12 houses approximately four hundred inmates, approximately one 13 hundred seventy of whom are state detainees, in an efficient 14 vertical design structure that requires fewer workers to manage 15 detainees than antiquated state facilities; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, the Honolulu Federal Detention Center also includes integrated state-of-the-art surveillance and management 19 technologies, and includes cells, office areas, medical 20 facilities, recreational areas, storage rooms, food preparation 21 areas, laundry areas, mechanical rooms, security systems, and 22 communications systems; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, the State has struggled for years to find additional bed capacity for its overcrowded jails and prisons, 26 which were designed to hold a combined total of 2,491 inmates 27 but currently hold approximately 5,161 inmates; and 28 29



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WHEREAS, replacing or refurbishing state prisons and jails 1 to meet the current demand for adequate space and services would 2 cost an estimated \$1,500,000,000 to \$2,000,000,000; and 3 4 WHEREAS, since June 2001, the State has leased bed space at 5 the Honolulu Federal Detention Center to relieve jail 6 overcrowding; and 7 8 WHEREAS, in September 2019, Honolulu Federal Detention 9 Center housed one hundred eighty-six male and female inmates 10 under the Department of Public Safety's jurisdiction at a daily 11 cost of \$129.48 per inmate; and 12 13 14 WHEREAS, State acquisition of the Honolulu Federal Detention Center will expand the bed capacity of the Department 15 of Public Safety, help alleviate overcrowding at the Oahu 16 Community Correctional Center and the State's other jails and 17 18 prisons, and eliminate the immediate burden of building a new state jail; and 19 20 WHEREAS, in 2016, House Resolution No. 31 requested 21 Hawaii's congressional delegation to assist the State in 22 negotiating with the federal government for the acquisition of 23 24 the Honolulu Federal Detention Center; now, therefore, 25 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Thirty-second 26 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2023, 27 that the Department of Public Safety and its successor agency, 28 the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, is urged to 29 acquire the Honolulu Federal Detention Center; and 30 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Hawaii's congressional 32 delegation is requested to assist the State in negotiating with 33 the federal government for the acquisition of the Honolulu 34 Federal Detention Center; and 35 36 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that parties to the negotiations are 37 requested to consider continued housing of federal pre-trial 38 detainees and federal inmates serving brief sentences at the 39 facility, under terms favorable to the federal Bureau of 40 Prisons, as a condition of the State's acquisition of the 41 42 facility; and



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 2 3 Resolution be transmitted to the members of Hawaii's congressional delegation, Director of the federal Bureau of 4 5 Prisons, and Director of Public Safety.
