I work for Mental Health Kokua and run the residential program in Kailua-Kona and work directly with individuals with a mental health diagnoses. I am someone who believes we all have mental health needs and some have more significant needs than other but that there is a place for mental health and we need to advocate more to better understand, treat and support mental health. I have had family, friends and colleagues struggle with mental health and want to strongly support these individuals as well as the greater community to support the needs and educate the community to better understand the needs of others.

I would love to find more housing and increase the payrates to a livable wage in all Hawaiian Islands. I would like to educate the police department and first responders on how to communicate better and create more resources so individuals suffering and possibly homeless don't find themselves abusing drugs or getting into trouble with the law and finding themselves in the courts or jail when medication and other supports could better assist these individuals.

(5) Name three qualities that best describe you and that would make you stand out. How would these qualities benefit the State Council on Mental Health?

I'm a strong Advocator and driven to help people in need and find resources and ways to support people who struggle to care for themselves.

(6) Name one previous experience that would make you stand out. How would this benefit the State Council on Mental Health?

I have supported families whose child was newly diagnosed to help them understand and educate themselves at a time when they are most in need. I work with individuals to support them in housing maintain medication compliance and sobriety and work with them to be more productive

individuals. I work tirelessly to remove the stigma of mental health as we all struggle at some point with mental health on a spectrum and it is not limited but affects us all.

(7) Can you foresee any possible conflicts of interests that could arise during your service on the State Council on Mental Health? How would you overcome any possible conflicts of interest?

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Division (CAMHD) and the Department of Education. She is an vocal advocate for better data that can be used by the SCMH, the Department and the public to understand ways to improve mental health services.

Ms. Ilyavi is deeply motivated by the clients she works with. She imparts that they are the most beautiful people and deserved to be cared for and live well. She advocates for caregivers by attending service coordination meetings and providing technical assistance with completing paperwork to access benefits and services. Her firsthand knowledge as a parent of a youth and her perspective on the needs, resources and service gaps of the behavioral health support system will be an asset to the Council's deliberations.
