DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) provides comments on this measure and defers to the Commission on the Status of Women. DHS respectfully requests that any appropriation not replace or reduce priorities identified in the executive budget and forthcoming Governor's Messages.

PURPOSE: This bill establishes and appropriates moneys for the Office of the Reproductive Health Care Access Coordinator within the Department of Human Services for administrative purposes.

DHS recognizes the critical importance of accessing reproductive health care services and appreciates the Legislature's efforts to preserve safe access to reproductive health care services in Hawaii.

Coordination of care for residents on neighbor islands and rural areas is also of critical importance. DHS works toward seamless access and provision of care and has a team of

individuals within the Med-QUEST division coordinating care for those covered by Medicaid. Care for individuals from neighbor islands often requires coordination of travel and coverage of expenses.

To meet the intent of this measure, the Legislature may want to consider placing a coordinator within a community or non-profit organization to assist with the coordination of care. It may be more expeditious and efficient from a community perspective.

The process to develop and introduce this bill is the highest example of good governance.

H.B. 1343 is the outcome of months of close dialogue between legislators and more than just the usual stakeholders on reproductive health care, i.e., physicians, attorneys, and legacy organizations. The Dobb's Response Team listened to a diverse cross-section of Hawai'i: faith leaders, immigrant rights' advocates, domestic violence subject matter experts, sex trafficking survivors, mothers, and youth across the state. This bill reflects the community's needs and solutions to end forced pregnancy throughout Hawai'i.

The strategy of decriminalizing abortion and leaving access up to the private sector has left an estimated 200,000 women, girls, and oppressed gender minorities in Hawai'i at risk of forced pregnancy. It's overtime for us, the government, to take responsibility for ending the crime against humanity that is forced pregnancy. There are a number of important reproductive health bills this Session but none would improve lives on the ground and advance the struggle for women's rights like this bill.

Aloha Chairs Au Belatti and Mizuno, Vice Chairs Takenouchi and Amato, and Committee Members,

I am testifying in support of HB1343 to create a statewide abortion access coordinator office. Hawai'i lacks abortion care infrastructure– the policies, resources, and services necessary for all women, girls, and pregnant people to readily access abortion. We need bills that protect the status quo (e.g. legal shield for providers and language clean-up), **and** bills that address the forced pregnancy crisis on neighbor islands. There are no in-clinic elective abortion providers on Kaua'i, Lana'i, Moloka'i, and only very limited services on Hawai'i Island. Hundreds of thousands (est. minimum of 220,000) of women in Hawai'i have limited or no access to abortion procedures. Air travel can be an insurmountable barrier, especially for women who are homeless, poor, in their teenage years, fearful of an abusive partner, unable to speak English, suffering from substance abuse or mental illness or living in a religiously conservative family or community (Lyte, B., Jan. 30, 2023)

Hawai'i should build government infrastructure by investing in a place where non-profits and patients can go for abortion services, including medically accurate, non-judgmental information, insurance navigation, policy implementation, procedural training, abortion stigma intervention, and the full range of abortion procedures. Hawai'i would be joining a progressive trend in women-friendly states. In 2022, California passed legislation (AB 1918) to establish a "reproductive health care corps" that would develop a robust medical workforce of abortion providers for unmet needs and underserved areas. The Hawai'i State Coalition Against Domestic Violence (HSCADV) addresses the social, political, and economic impacts of domestic violence on individuals, families, and communities. We are a statewide partnership of domestic violence programs and shelters.

On behalf of HSCADV and our 28 member programs statewide, I respectfully submit testimony in **support of HB1343** that would create an Office of the Reproductive Health Care Access Coordinator.



Reproductive health can and has been used as a tactic to control or hold power over an intimate partner in a situation involving domestic violence. Pregnancy has been associated with both an increased initiation of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), as well as the increased severity of IPV. In contrast, pregnant people who were experiencing IPV reported a reduction in abuse following an abortion.

We support HB 1343 because it would build government infrastructure by investing in a place where non-profits and patients can go for abortion services, including medically accurate, non-judgmental information, insurance navigation, policy implementation, procedural training, abortion stigma intervention, and the full range of abortion procedures.

There are no in-clinic elective abortion providers on Kaua'i, Lana'i, Moloka'i, and only limited services on Hawai'i Island. Hundreds of thousands (est. minimum of 220,000) of women in Hawai'i have limited or no access to abortion procedures. Air travel can be an insurmountable barrier, especially for women who are homeless, poor, in their teenage years, fearful of an abusive partner, unable to speak English, suffering from substance abuse or mental illness or living in a religiously conservative family or community (Lyte, B., Jan. 30, 2023). Survivors of domestic violence on our neighbor islands are especially vulnerable to these barriers. Access to abortion services is one way in which survivors can maintain or regain their autonomy.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this important matter.

RATIONALE: Imua Alliance <u>strongly supports</u> HB 1343, relating to reproductive health care access, which establishes and appropriates moneys for the Office of the Reproductive Health Care Access Coordinator within the Department of Human Services for administrative purposes.

Reproductive care is an essential form of healthcare. In March of 1970, Hawai'i became the first state to legalize abortion, three years before the landmark *Roe v. Wade* decision by the United States Supreme Court protected access to abortion nationwide. In so doing, the state recognized that preserving access to safe and legal reproductive care is a vital public health objective for the islands. Yet, Hawai'i's unique geography and high cost of living present barriers to obtaining reproductive care for potential patients. As of 2022, only three abortion providers exist in the islands and only Oahu and Maui host reproductive care clinics. According to Planned Parenthood, the number of abortion providers in the state has been on the decline since the 1990s.

Moreover, studies show that access to abortion care is linked to financial well-being. According to The Turnaway Study conducted by Advancing New Standards in Reproductive Health at the University of California San Francisco, people who were denied access to an abortion experienced an increase in household poverty lasting at least four years relative to those who received an abortion. Women who lacked access to reproductive care were also found to be less able to pay for basic living expenses, had lower credit scores, and had higher rates of debt and eviction than those with access to abortion care.

The U.S. Supreme Court's disastrous ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* overturned *Roe v. Wade* and ended the federal constitutional right to abortion care. In overturning *Roe v. Wade*, the U.S. Supreme Court erased nearly fifty years of legal precedent supporting the fundamental right to reproductive freedom, leading to a wave of abortion restrictions enacted by state legislatures across the country. The Court's decision disproportionately harms black, latino, indigenous, and other people of color, for whom access to healthcare and economic opportunities has historically been impeded by systemic racism.

In response to the Supreme Court's misguided ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, state policymakers must take action to uphold Hawai'i's legacy as a leader in advancing reproductive care and enact policies to strengthen reproductive rights in the islands. Accordingly and for the sake of the numerous sex trafficking survivors whom we have helped to obtain vital reproductive care, we support this bill's establishment of a Reproductive Health Care Access Coordinator to sustain our islands' continuum of abortion services for those in need.

WRITTEN TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT on H.B. 1343

Chairs Mizuno and Belatti, Vice Chairs Amato and Takenouchi, and members of the Committee on Human Services and Committee on Health & Homelessness, thank you for the opportunity to testify in **support H. B. 1343**.

Through Act 46, SLH 2014, Hawai'i became the 8th state in the nation to adopt the national best practices for Advance Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) regulation, the APRN Consensus Model. Thanks to the Legislature's great wisdom, this legislation significantly and positively impacted the number of APRNs working in Hawai'i. The APRN Consensus Model establishes that APRNs can work to the fullest extent of their education and training, including training achieved through continuing professional development. In addition, Hawai'i legislators recognized APRNs in the eligible telehealth workforce, enabling their practices to expand to all people in Hawai'i, regardless of geographic location or island residence.

Even with this favorable regulatory environment, barriers to practice remain. When new practice standards are established, whether by state law or healthcare innovation, new education and training is needed. In addition, when laws or rules outside of the Nurse Practice Act or Rules are not updated to align with the scope of practice that is established within the Nurse Practice Act, challenges and barriers in delivering health care services result. Though APRNs are enabled to provide the service per their practice act, they remain unable to do certain healthcare functions because of disagreement across the constellation of laws and rules in Hawai'i.

In this present day, people needing reproductive care, particularly those on neighbor islands, are prevented from accessing healthcare due to limited providers in their regions who are trained to provider certain services, lack of telehealth infrastructure for those providers with the knowledge, skills, and abilities, as well as regulatory and administrative barriers that continue to impact practices.

While not these are not insurmountable challenges, the lack of resolution continues to prevent or delay people from accessing reproductive healthcare that is high quality, safe, and importantly, timely.

This measure aims to establish a reproductive health care access coordinator dedicated to resolving access to healthcare challenges by engaging in workforce development, facilitate care through supporting policies and telehealth access, and identify state laws and regulations that may prevent Hawai'i's residents from accessing reproduction healthcare. This measure should be seen for what it is: an exemplary effort to maximize and mobilize healthcare professionals to meet residents' needs by

I am practicing OBGYN and work in in high risk pregnancy care. I routinely encounter women who are located on outlying islands and know first hand the difficulties these patients face accessing healthcare. It is common that all the options for reprodutive health care are not available to patients based on where they live. It is our responsibility as a state and as heatlh care providers to make reproductive healthcare provision as equitable and as far reaching as possible.

HB 1343 would establish moneys at the state level to create the Office of the Reproductive Health Care Access Coordinator within the Department of Human Services for administrative purposes. This would address the issue of access to care at the state level and work to address disparities based on where patients live. A statewide reproductive health coordinator could identify challenges across the state, assist individuals with navigating barriers, and help develop a training program or course for abortion procedures.

We have a problem in our state with access to healthcare - especially abortion access. We need to fix this.

The Hawai'i Section of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (HI ACOG) **supports HB 1343** which would establish and appropriate moneys for the Office of the Reproductive Health Care Access Coordinator within the Department of Human Services for administrative purposes.

Hawai'i has a long history of recognizing the importance of legal abortion care, and protecting this right is widely supported. Hawai'i has a proud history of leading the country in protecting reproductive rights, being one of the first states to legalize abortion in 1970. The right to abortion has always been widely supported in Hawai'i,¹ and our health care organizations also recognize and support legal abortion because health care organizations and professionals know that the abiity to control if and when to become pregnant is not only the very definition of bodily autonomy and important for overall wellbeing, but the ability to terminate a pregnancy is critical to public health and to reducing pregnancy related morbidity and mortality. Every person in Hawai'i should have this right.

Legality does not equal access, and Hawai'i has a major problem with access. Although abortion has been legal in Hawai'i since 1970, access to abortion is not a reality for many of our people. Hawai'i has a serious shortage of healthcare providers who perform abortion procedures, especially on neighbor islands. Many residents must not only gather the funds for a plane ticket, but must take days off from work to travel, must leave their families and communities, must find childcare, must travel and have their procedure without a support person. Some do not have these resources, and end up forced to carry a pregnancy, at whatever risk to themselves that entails.

Efforts within the private sector to address our lack of access to abortion care have not been enough. Although Hawai'i's legislators passed a law in 2021 that allowed advance practice registered nurses (APRN) to perform abortion procedures, and although APRNs have come

forward wanting to provide this care, they have had encountered serious challenges such as difficulty obtaining training, difficulty obtaining malpractice insurance, difficulty with dispensing of medications to name a few. Rather than individual healthcare providers recreating the wheel in each community, a statewide reproductive health coordinator would be able to identify these challenges across the state, assist individuals with navigating these barriers, develop a training program or course for abortion procedures, but also on statewide level coordinate an overall response with the goal to put more healthcare providers who will provide abortions in our communities. Caring for Hawaii's families and communities is all our kuleana.

We appreciate the legislature's efforts to protect legal abortion and protect choice in Hawai'i. When one cannot <u>access</u> abortion care, however, then it's not really a choice, and unfortunately choice is not a reality for many in Hawai'i.

It's time to make being able to choose to access this basic healthcare and being able to choose the best decision for one's self and one's family a reality for everyone in Hawai'i no matter which one of our beautiful islands you live on.

For these reasons, Hawai'i ACOG urges the legislature to pass HB 1343.

While Hawai'i has long been a leader in protecting and expanding access to sexual and reproductive health care, access to abortion services are still limited, and many people in our state still face significant geographical, financial, and logistical barriers when seeking abortion care.

Many people in Hawai'i live without, or with limited access, to a provider who can deliver abortion care. While access to medication abortion and telehealth services has greatly expanded access across all islands, many people – including those on Kauai, Molokai, and Lanai – do not have access to a local abortion provider that can provide in-clinic care, and, in turn, patients are forced to travel to other islands. For those patients, this could mean they have to arrange at least a day's worth of travel and pay for overnight accommodations, forcing them to take time off work and potentially arrange childcare or care for a family member with a health condition. These barriers fall hardest on Pacific Islander and Native Hawaiian communities that are more likely to live in rural areas without a provider. Plus, air travel can be an insurmountable barrier for those who are young, immigrants, survivors of intimate partner violence, or face other barriers to health care.

HB 1343 helps improve access to abortion care in underserved communities by investing in infrastructure like telehealth technology and travel expenses for providers. PPAA believes that all people in Hawai'i deserve timely, safe, and local access to abortion care, and this bill takes steps toward achieving that goal. A pregnant person's freedom to plan their family is a near unanimously held belief among Hawai'i voters – 85 percent of Hawai'i voters believe it is important that women have access to all of the reproductive health care options available, including abortion. We look forward to continuing to work with you to remove barriers to abortion care to ensure that all people in Hawaí'i have full and equal access to the care they need and deserve.

I am a Complex Family Planning Fellow of the University of Hawai'i's Department of OBGYN. I completed my OBGYN residency in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and am currently undergoing a two-year fellowship at the University of Hawai'i to become a subspecialist in complex contraception and abortion care. When I was applying for fellowship, the University of Hawai'i was my number-one choice because of the state's legacy of protecting abortion access, which was personified in its providers and the passion and dedication I saw from them on a national stage.

Despite Hawai'i's incredible legacy of championing reproductive rights, access to abortion on the neighbor islands has always been limited compared to access on Oahu. Many of the patients we see in our clinic that have to travel struggle with not just the cost of the plane ticket, but sometimes also childcare and time off of work. Many of them also have to undertake this journey alone, as their support network cannot travel with them. While increasing access to medication abortion through telemedicine has helped with some of these problems, not everyone wants or is able to have a medication abortion. The dream has always been to have providers on all of Hawai'i's islands, which is why state legislators passed the 2021 law that allowed advance practice registered nurses (APRN) to perform abortion procedures. However, APRNs who want to provide this care have faced serious challenges doing so, including difficulty obtaining training, malpractice insurance, and difficulty with dispensing of medications for medication abortion.

HB 1343 would establish a statewide reproductive health coordinator would be able to identify these challenges across the state, assist individuals with navigating these barriers, develop a training program or course for abortion procedures, but also on statewide level coordinate an overall response with the goal to put more healthcare providers who will provide abortions in our communities. Protecting legal abortion and protecting choice in Hawai'i also means ensuring that everyone in the state can access abortion without significant barriers, regardless of which island they live on. Thus, I strongly believe that Hawai'i should continue to demonstrate its devotion to its people, their families, their communities, and their access to this fundamental piece of healthcare, as it has throughout the last century. Therefore, I urge the state legislature to pass HB 1343.

Abortion is a necessary aspect of comprehensive reproductive health care. One in four women in the US will have an abortion in her lifetime. While Hawai`i has always been a leader in protecting access to abortion care nationally, access locally remains challenging for many Hawaiians, particularly those on neighbor islands.

For patients living in rural areas, the journey to getting an abortion is not always linear. A patient needs to first know where to look to find a provider who can give them the care they need, either through telemedicine or in person appointment. Sometimes they need to get an ultrasound. Finally, for procedure abortion, which can sometimes be a two day process, they need to travel to their appointment, which takes time away from their family, and has financial implications.

A reproductive health coordinator would be a point person to help the most vulnerable patients in our state navigate the complexities of the healthcare system when it comes to time-sensitive care such as pregnancy or abortion care. Not only can they help on a patient level, but on a state level as well, by helping develop training programs for advanced practice providers to expand access on outer islands for example; by organising needs assessments to address the multiple barriers patients face.

Firearms Prohibited in Senstive Places

This measure would have a profound impact on public safety, survivors of domestic violence, their children and the nonprofit organizations that serve them.

Perpetrators of domestic violence with access to guns use the threat of gun violence inflict emotional abuse on their partners or escalate to homicide. The presence of a firearm in domestic violence situations increases the risk of homicide for women by 500%. Additionally, more than half of women killed by gun violence are killed by family members or intimate partners.

And the trend is worsening: in the ten-year period between 2008 and 2017, intimate partner homicides of women involving guns increased by 15 percent. Adults are not the only victims. <u>On March 4, 2022 a father under a restraining order killed his three daughters during a court-ordered family visitation</u> at a church.

We must create safe spaces where survivors of domestic violence are free to heal and seek help after traumatic events. Prohibiting the public carrying of firearms in these spaces is paramount to creating this healing environment without threat of harm, revictimization, or re-traumatization.

Abortion Access Coordinator

Reproductive health can and has been used as a tactic to control or hold power over an intimate partner in a situation involving domestic violence. Pregnancy has been associated with both an increased initiation of Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), as well as the increased severity of IPV. In contrast, pregnant people who were experiencing IPV reported a reduction in abuse following an abortion.

We support HB 1343 because it would build government infrastructure by investing in a place where non-profits and patients can go for abortion services, including medically accurate, non-judgmental information, insurance navigation, policy implementation, procedural training, abortion stigma intervention, and the full range of abortion procedures.

There are no in-clinic elective abortion providers on Kaua'i, Lana'i, Moloka'i, and only limited services on Hawai'i Island. Hundreds of thousands (est. minimum of 220,000) of women in Hawai'i have limited or no access to abortion procedures. Air travel can be an

insurmountable barrier, especially for women who are homeless, poor, in their teenage years, fearful of an abusive partner, unable to speak English, suffering from substance abuse or mental illness or living in a religiously conservative family or community (Lyte, B., Jan. 30, 2023). Survivors of domestic violence on our neighbor islands are especially vulnerable to these barriers. Access to abortion services is one way in which survivors can maintain or regain their autonomy.

SB236

Expansion of Victim Counselor Privilege to Campus Advocates and Increases DV training to 35 hours

This bill expands the victim-counselor privilege under Rule 505.5 of the Hawai'i Rules of Evidence to include confidential advocates employed by the University of Hawai'i, and increases the training requirements for domestic violence advocates from 25 hours to 35 hours.

Survivors within the University of Hawai'i system, whether they are students or employees, should be afforded the same confidentiality protections as they would receive from community advocates and other service providers. This measure would enable more students and employees would be willing to disclose their victimization and in doing so, the opportunity to receive critical services such as safety planning. Currently, there are gaps in confidentiality and for many survivors in higher education, it can dissuade them from seeking the appropriate assistance, access to justice and resources to heal from their trauma.

Increasing the minimum number of hours of training a domestic violence advocate from 25 to 35 would better prepare them to work with survivors of domestic violence in a traumainformed and survivor-centered manner. This requirement is overdue for an update -Hawai'i has one of the lowest training requirements in the nation, with most states requiring an average of 35 hours.

I have cared for many patients that have had to fly to Oahu for abortion care, but that is not a financially accessible option for many people. Having a reproductive care coordinator will not only improve access to abortions, but also general baseline OBGYN care. Just a few weeks ago, I took care of a patient from Big Island that could not get an appointment for her bleeding after a miscarriage because of how far she lived from a clinic with reproductive health providers. Her symptoms worsened while she was visiting Honolulu and she ended up receiving care in the ER. I strongly support HB 1343 because our patients deserve to be able to access care close to their homes and with affordable transportation, and we need a dedicated coordinator to improve our care system for this issue.

Dear Committee Members,

I offer this testimony in my personal capacity to strongly support HB 1343 which would increase access to abortion and other reproductive health care in Hawai'i. In my professional work as the Legal Director of the Medical-Legal Partnership for Children in Hawai'i, I have seen the impact of the limited resources for young and low-income people who need access to immediate, safe, and confidential abortion care. Even with Hawaii's dedicated corps of abortion care providers, we have a critical need for more trained professionals and better coordinated services, especially for neighbor island and rural communities.

The state of Hawai'i has protected abortion rights for over 50 years, and Native Hawaiians have recognized abortion care as "a fundamental part of our *maoli ola*, our health care," long before colonization.¹ Unfortunately, the U.S. Supreme Court case of *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health* changes the calculus for everyone. Medical providers and others have enumerated barriers to access in Hawai'i, including the lack of clinical services on neighbor islands, the limited number of medical providers trained in abortion care, travel, cost, and the stigma fueled by *Dobbs*.² Hawai'i must respond by recommitting to safe and accessible abortion care as a normal part of pregnancy care.

HB 1343 provides essential coordination for existing services and expands training for eligible licensed healthcare professionals in comprehensive reproductive care including abortion care. HB 1343 has the potential to significantly change the landscape for healthcare access to neighbor island communities. Investing in reproductive health care infrastructure positively impacts the physical and mental health, economic independence, and safety of women and pregnant people, and it also strengthens all families and communities in Hawai'i.

Thank you for this opportunity to submit testimony in support of HB 1343.
