Statement of CHRIS J. SADAYASU Director Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism before the HOUSE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE Monday, February 27, 2023 10:00 AM State Capitol, Conference Room 308 & Videoconference

In consideration of HB1373, HD1 RELATING TO WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT.

Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and members of the Committee. The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) offers comments on HB1373, HD1 which seeks to add a new section to HRS 235-17 which provides an incentive rebate program for independent film and television productions of 50% of Hawaii W-2 wages, capped at \$50,000 per employee and requires the remittance of payment of the rebate within 30 days of the filer submitting the required documentation to DBEDT.

First, it is unclear as to the source of funds which would be required for this rebate program as well as DBEDT's authority to issue rebate payments.

Additionally, in Section 2, item (d) on page 3, the 30-day timeline for payment remittance is an operations concern for the department. This requires DBEDT to review, conduct inquiry as necessary, certify this rebate program and issue a payment. We are conferring with our Deputy AG on the ability to effectuate this aspect of the proposed measure. We defer to DoTAX on the timeline, fiscal and operational aspects of the proposed measure.

Should this measure pass, the management of the film and other tax credits in DBEDT and its Creative Industries Division (CID) requires the addition of one FTE at an SR26 level, exempt from Chapter 76 to provide the industry-specific expertise to manage all statutory and workforce rebate programs in the department.

On this note, we call to your attention that HB1373 HD1 can be a vehicle to support the lower range of short film and independent productions, which are the entry level training ground for the pipeline of creative talent crucial to expanding opportunities for work on larger productions. As this is a key facet of building a thriving workforce for creative and film industries, we must ensure this level of independent productions can also benefit from such an incentive and not be unintentionally left out or negatively impacted.

DBEDT will work with DoTAX, the introducers, lawmakers, and industry on the aspects of concern and make recommendations to the committee as this measure moves through session.

The Department of Taxation ("Department") offers the following <u>comments</u> regarding H.B. 1373, H.D. 1, for your consideration.

H.B. 1373, H.D. 1, creates a workforce development incentive rebate ("rebate") program, to be administered by the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT), to incentivize local independent film and television productions. Section 2, page 4, lines 4 through 9 of the bill, provides that an eligible employer who claims the rebate shall not be eligible for the motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit ("film credit") for the same project and the rebate issued under the program will not be subject to income tax or general excise tax. Additionally, section 3, page 6, lines 5 through 7 of the bill, provides that any taxpayer who claims the film credit shall not be eligible for the rebate for the same project. The bill has a defective effective date of June 30, 3000, provided that section 3 applies to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2022.

The Department defers to DBEDT regarding its ability to administer the rebate program in connection with the film credit. The Department further notes that it is able to administer section 3 of this bill by the current effective date.

Aloha Chair Yamashita, Vice Chair Kitagawa, and Members of the Committee:

Our Background

Island Film Group is a locally owned and operated production company. We began working in Hawaii's film and television industry in 2001 as attorneys at Goodsill Anderson Quinn & Stifel, where we represented filmmakers and other production companies. Since our formation of Island Film Group in 2007, we have been working full-time as producers of feature films such as "Princess Ka`iulani" and "Soul Surfer", network and cable

television movies and series, as well as a variety of commercial productions.

We **SUPPORT** HB 1373 HD1, which provides an alternative to the motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit for smaller, independent local productions.

Currently, the process to claim the production tax credit, HRS 235-17 ("PTC"), is both expensive and time-consuming. Voluminous reports are required, the tax department regulations relating to the tax credit are confusing and cumbersome, and it can take more than two years to receive the tax credit. While these issues do not deter large-budget projects, the burden on smaller, local independent projects is substantial.

Smaller projects, with total budgets in the range of \$5m and wages in the range of \$2m, generally rely more heavily on local crew members since the cost of hiring a non-resident crew member can exceed \$2,000 per week in additional costs (airfare, hotel, per diem, car rental, etc.).

HB 1373 HD1 will **directly benefit smaller**, **local film and television productions** by **encouraging the hiring of local crew members** in order to qualify for the rebate.

In addition, some smaller projects may also attempt to pay crew members as independent contractors in order to save money. That practice does not meet state/federal labor laws, subjects local crew members to potentially uninsured injury claims, and results in a reduction in state tax and unemployment insurance collections. HB 1373 HD1 requires that the production obtain a general excise tax license, hire crewmembers as W-2 workers, and secure production insurance that protects local workers in order to receive the benefits of this incentive.

In short, this program will establish a **strong incentive** that will be **much simpler for the State to administer** than the production tax credit.

Comments:

My name is Anderson Le and I am the artistic director of the Hawaii International Film Festival (HIFF) now in its 43rd year. I have been with the Festival for two decades now and I have seen an increase of quality and craftsmanship in local filmmaking, especially from Kanaka Maoli. We have a competition section for our annual MADE IN HAWAI'I section and the grand prize winner is eligible for Oscar consideration as HIFF is the only festival in the State that is officially an Academy Award qualifying festival for short film in this specific category. I personally have seen this rise in quality from an emerging and vibrant creative class of indie filmmakers. Many of them are graduates of the Academy for Creative Media (ACM) at UH. To see this vertical pipeline of film education to production and exhibition in the last decade has been very exciting. To also see three feature films (all based in Hawai'i) premiere in 3 consecutive Sundance Film Festivals--I WAS A SIMPLE MAN by Christopher Yogi (2021); EVERYDAY IN KAIMUKI (2022) by Alika Tengan; JAMOJAYA (2022) by Justin Chon--is proof that local indie feature films can and will travel to one of the premiere film festivals in the world, showcases that local films are on the rise. In a climate where mainstream media and Hollywood is providing space for Indigenous content is also an opportunity for the State to provide incentives for local and indie film financing. There are many opportunities for content (film and tv) that is produced by Hawai'i-born and raised creatives, especially many of them who are currently employed in Hollywood in creative development. I know of studios, from Disney to Universal to A24, who are developing content to be shot in the islands from a Kamaaina perspective, not diluted and to showcase the myriad of stories and cultural melting pot of the State. But most of all, I see this bill as an opportunity to diversify the economy and thwart the brain drain, and export of the new generation to the Continent. I can see the State providing that push to develop a healthy ecosystem where Hawai'i's extremely talented filmmakers don't have to leave home to make their film and tv. The time is now, because the talent is HERE.

Comments:

I'm a product of the smaller projects, have done many of them! I KNOW that indie films and smaller budgteted shows always give opportunity to local crew who are ready to move up and experience a key position when most times the bigger shows won't. It also is a great place for our college grads to get their first job. On the other side of this, these shows are short and training is not always available, it's more of a "hands on" experience. The smaller projects are assets to our industry, no doubt, but it's not enough time to give our local crew a chance to train 100% so they can continue to elevate into key positions.

WORK FORCE DEVELOPMENT is about training. It shouldn't just be about the smaller projects but all projects. The fact is industry training for our local crew come from the longer terms shows (TV episodics and features shooting over 3 months) by a dept head or someone in a key position. Also, local internships benefit from longer shows. There should be a mandate to enforce training for our local crews and the next generation especially when "distant hires" are brought in season after season and our locals are left behind. I'm sure the unions (mainly IATSE/skilled crafts) would support and welcome a mandate like this that asks for accountability.
