Chairperson Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 1382 HD2. The bill amends Section 145D-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes to add the donation of livestock or wild game meat; provided that the good-faith donor harvested the meat in a food safe manner, processed the meat in accordance with section 159-25 and the distributor reasonably believes that the food is fit for human consumption, as an exception from liability. The measure also establishes a meat processing taskforce and appropriates funds. The Department supports this measure and provides comments.

The definition of "donor" in 145D-2, HRS includes that the food in question has been prepared and packaged in a facility meeting all relevant food safety guidelines, certifications, and requirements and has passed all food safety inspections. Therefore, inspection of the food is still needed. If the intent is to provide state meat inspection, the state currently does not have meat inspection capabilities and it will take time to restart that program. The meat processing taskforce detailed in this measure should be able to account for this time and include it as part of the master plan it is tasked to produce.

Hawai'i's farmers and ranchers are working to provide Hawai'i with an increased level of self-sufficiency, but will not be able to do so if their products are consumed or damaged

by feral animals. Axis Deer, feral pigs, and other invasive species can cause major damage to property, agriculture (crops and livestock), Hawai'i's native species and ecosystems, and Hawai'i's cultural and historic resources. They can also threaten the health of people, wildlife, pets, and other domestic animals. As Hawai'i's feral animal populations continue to expand, these damages, costs, and risks will only keep rising

Current state law specifically prohibits the inclusion of meats as a donation. Wild game can be a significant source of protein for Hawai'i's residents in need. Wild game can provide a beneficial outlet for meat harvested from invasive species and provide a tool for long-term sustainable invasive management for Axis Deer and Feral Pigs.
